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

MTN READY TO ROLL OUT 4G

→ he telecommunication revolution has caught up with the country as 4G LTE will be launched in the country within the next 10 days. This turn of events was revealed by MTN Swaziland Chief Executive Officer, Ambrose Dlamini, during an interview where he revealed that it was time the country moved to a higher level in the telecommunications industry. Explaining what the introduction of 4G means to a lay man using the internet, Dlamini explained that it was high speed

 "With the roll out of 4G about to take place, communication will be faster, social media platforms will be a breeze, while research will be simplified"

The faster internet offering will enable faster browsing allowing for the downloading of bulky files to take place within seconds.

"4G allows one to watch a movie seamlessly (without gaps or interruptions) as you download it, as there will be no buffering," the CEO explained. Mobile device owners who use the internet may have noticed the different letters which appear near the signal strength icon on their devices. Explaining what these have

meant, Dlamini recalled how when cellular phone came into the country, 2G was used which allowed for calls and short message sending only.

"When requirements and needs grew, EDGE was introduced which allowed for the sending of data at low speeds because technology is all about speed," he said.

After EDGE, 3G was introduced into the country which equated to higher speed allowing for one to browse easily, watch movies and do a whole

lot more using data. "With the roll out of 4G which is about to take place, communication will be faster, social media platforms will be a breeze while research will be simplified," Dlamini explained adding how companies had more options of using the internet as it was not just for personal use. "It will heighten interests as it will be used by small medium and large enterprises and the impact on services and jobs will be immense as this project will enable Swaziland to rank among the best within the telecommunication industry,' he said reiterating how 4G will put the country on par with first world countries in terms of

This was revealed by CEO Ambrose Dlamini who said despite costs associated with the evolution, customers would not be burdened by extra costs.

"The only thing they might need to do will be to upgrade their cellular phones and dongles if they are not 4G enabled," he said adding that the company would advise the public as days go by on how changes

will be structured.

He assured that comprehensive education about 4G will be readily available for their customers and those who are perceptive will get information on what 4G is and how it will work.

Reiterated

He further reiterated how infrastructure would be ready at the end of June.

Concerning data costs to the consumer, Dlamini assured that they were working around the clock to introduce packages which are affordable and will ensure that users get their value for money.

4G to improve **SADC Summit** Communication

he evolution towards 4G was one of commitments MTN Swaziland made towards their contribution for the Southern African Development Community (SADC) Summit which take place in less than two months time. MTN Chief Executive Officer Ambrose Dlamini revealed that they had already had trial runs of their infrastructure and everything was in place for the anticipated transition which will happen at the end of this month, whereas a commercial launch will take place in July. "While rolling it out, we are modernising the network and other relevant technologies," he said.

The summit, which will take place in the country for the first time will see representatives of 15 member states and their delegates come to the country. During the summit the economies of the SADC states will be high on the agenda while contribution for the region towards other organisations will be deliberated

In short, the SADC Summit is responsible for the overall policy direction and control of functions of the community, ultimately making it the policy-making institution of SADC

That is the difference between 2G, 3G & 4G LTE?

Before breaking down the differences in the various technologies, it is worth noting that MTN Swaziland first introduced 2G technology as part of its quest for innovation. It then evolved to

3G and now aiming at launching 4G LTE, the fastest internet technolo-

With 2G phone conversations digitally encrypted, it also introduced data services for mobile starting with Short Messaging Service (SMS), picture messages and MMS -(Multimedia messages).

Since these messages sent over the 2G networks were encrypted, it allows only the intended recipient to receive and read it.

EDGE - Enhanced Data-rates for GSM (Global System of Mobile communication) Evolution - was an easy way for mobile operators to squeeze more out of

compatible phones, customers could get improved speeds over double what they would get from GPRS.

Then came 3G around the same time some mobile operators were rolling out EDGE around 2003/4.

The 3G network was the first technology with sufficient speed to proence on a smartphone.

The 4G LTE technology is the successor to the 3G technology. Mobile Operators are still building out their 4G LTE networks.

LTE stands for Long Term Evolution. It is a term used for 4G LTE that delivers the fastest mobile Internet experi-

omen are under attack, and in recent months, police have revealed six reported cases of women who died after being attacked by their spouses.

While six lives have ended violently from the beginning of the year, more have been nearly killed by these men who pledged their love.

Sadly, more women are going to be killed by their partners as abuse is symptomatic of a variety of social ills, which are entrenched as normality in the country.

These sentiments were shared by women activist Doo Aphane this past week.

Irked by the incessant reports of women who are either killed by their partners or little girls raped by outon-bail suspects, Aphane revealed that these were a result of the way of life which has been adopted as normal, something contrary to nature and God's intention.

"All animals are looked after and nurtured by their mothers from a young age whereas we humans have delegated the responsibility to relatives such as aunts," she said.

Stating that this then resulted in a populace which does not know the love of a mother, abuse becomes rampant as men fail to note the importance and value of the female species.

"Thinking that a person can be balanced without the love of a mother after being dumped by her creates a problematic person who will be society's burden in future," she said.

Telling the nation to stop lying to itself about children striving under the love of paternal families only, she said human beings were programmed to flourish under the care and guidance of both parents, with a mother's love primary.

"Society is breeding hardened people who are now more than a nuisance since mothers are better equipped to keep children in check even where discipline from an early age is concerned," she said.

Calling to mind children born of polygamous families where wives were not treated equally she said, "Those who came from the family where the father was hardly around, but watched how other children strived under both parents' care later become a nuisance," Aphane said.

Valuing

She revealed how families had stopped valuing the girl child to the point of some not being aware of their comings and goings within the homestead.

"David Simelane, the man who eats eggs at correctional services as a guest, didn't take advantage of people who were valued.

He took advantage of people who were an afterthought," she alleged further stating how if a man disappeared for more than a day families look for them fervently due to their value in the family hierarchy.

"There will never be a serial killer with male victims.

Not unless they all get killed within a space of 24 hours as the outcry would stop any killer within a day of the realisation that there was somebody targeting men," she said.

She further revealed that families do not sleep when any of their men folk go missing.

'When a daughter goes missing, ukhiya njani wena," she said questioning the audacity of families to lock their doors and sleep peacefully while ignorant of their daughter's whereabouts.

Legislation needed to curb passion killing

n the other hand, Swaziland Action Group Against Abuse (SWAGAA) Communications and Advocacy Officer, Slindelo Nkosi, said lack of legislation enabled abuse to carry on unabated.

"These passion killings (murder between couples involved in a romantic relationship) will definitely continue because the current law supports these violent behaviours," she said.

Blaming the snag in enacting the Sexual Offences and Domestic Violence Bill of

2015 into law will further promote these gruesome

"Children have witnessed their mothers being brutally murdered, their fathers being sold to murderers to be killed.

What kind of society is being brewed," she asked.

Nkosi said it was improbable to possibly rely and hope that people would realise the extent of damage they were causing through their acts.

"These perpetrators need to be put in line through strict laws which will protect all Swazi citizens," she said.

ple who court them does not hold water as despite a woman getting into a relationship, she never stops being her parent's daughter.

"We have labelled it beautifully and have called it kwenza and kushada while sugar coating the fact that these girls have been left to their own devices," she said.

Abuse

Looking at the relationships where abuse has been reported in the media she noted how most of the relationships were not long term and abuse was a constant factor in the equation.

She alleged that in instances where men died in the hands of women, it was usually after years of abuse by their man who would fall prey to their partner who has had more than enough.

Adopted

She said she was cognisant of the need for the legislature to be adopted which would curb such but at the moment, the country had to correct social ills which make abuse and the termination of life possible. "Prevention is better than conviction as this is getting out of control," she said.

Riverstone heist suspect Senzo still in prison

Reports that Riverstone heist suspect, Senzo Motsa, had been freed sent officers from Interpol Swaziland on a wild goose chase to South Africa.

According to our information, Motsa is still in a South African prison and has not been freed. A local publication reported that Motsa had been freed from the Krugersdorp Prison after he successfully filed an appeal challenging his extradition to Swaziland, information which was said to be issued by the High Court of South Africa, Gauteng Local Division

Johannesburg by Judge Meyer on Tuesday.

However, the Sunday Observer understands that Motsa has not been freed and it is suspected the documents which were said to be court orders were forged.

Allegations As a result, officers from Interpol Swaziland and the Director of Public Prosecutions (DPP) office went on a wild goose chase to the neighbouring country where they found that the allegations were untrue.

Chief Police Information and Communications Officer Superintendent Khulani Mamba confirmed that upon investigations has not been charged for any it was discovered the allegations were completely false and Motsa was still in prison.

"Investigations were conducted and the whole thing was found to be false. According to our knowledge the suspect is still behind bars," he said.

Suspected

Well placed sources also revealed that the team found out the documents were fake, suspected to have been produced by one of the suspects who had the intention of misleading the public. The implicated suspect is known to this publication but will not be named as he

offence.

The 'court order' cited in the article also states the court restrained, interdicted and prohibited the South African minister of justice and Correctional Services together with the director of public prosecutions (Gauteng Local Division Johannesburg) from surrendering Motsa to the Kingdom of Swaziland. Meanwhile, Mamba said yesterday that the processes of Motsa's extradition to the country were still ongoing.


Motsa was apprehended in South Africa after more than two years on the run. He was wanted in the

country as a suspect in the Riverstone Mall E1.1 million heist. During the Riverstone Mall heist that took place on July 2, 2012, it was reported that the suspects made away with E1 120 000 which was taken from security detail Sibusiso Malindzisa, who was shot above the knee.

Immediately after the heist, police released information to the effect that Mkhwanazi, Stewart, Aaron and Nathi Motsa were the main suspects to the crime. Senzo's name was added to the suspects list later in the month.

The captured Motsa is also one of the suspects in the E6.2m robbery at the Pigg's Peak Police Station in 2008, which was money destined to pay the elderly grants.



ICJ discusses Judicial Accountability

he International Commission of Jurists this past week held a session where they discussed issues centred on judicial accountability, corruption, and involvement in human rights violations.

This was in a side session during the ongoing United Nations Human Rights Council 32nd ordinary session held in Geneva, Switzerland.

Human Rights Lawyer, Thulani Maseko was invited to take part in this session which took place from June 13 to 15, 2016. His advocacy for human rights in the country is seemingly attracting international attention as this invite comes hardly a monta after another where he was invited to the Oslo Freedom Forum last month.

Also, Maseko is described by the ICJ as a lawyer from Swaziland who was subjected to prolonged arbitrary detention and imprisonment by judges in Swaziland, for speaking publicly about judicial misconduct in the country.

Moreover, according to information sourced from the ICJ website, the event was meant to address the need for judicial accountability and different options for effective mechanisms and procedures of accountability.

Recommendations for ordinary situations will be complemented with reflections on circumstances of transitions where the judiciary have been deeply implicated in the violations of the previous regime, as well as particular challenges in developing countries.

The ICJ will also launch its new Practitioners' Guide on Judicial Accountability and the International Bar Association (IBA) will present the recent report of its Judicial Integrity Initiative on Judicial systems and Corruption.

The panel discussion, Maseko was part of, featured the United Nations Special Rapporteur on the independence of judges and lawyers, Mónica Pinto, the Director, Legal & Policy Research Unit, International Bar Association, Jane Ellis and the Centre for the Independence of Judges & Lawyers, International Commission of Jurists, Matt Pollard.

About the ICJ Practitioners' Guide No. 13 on Judicial Accountability

he ICJ's Practitioners' Guide No. 13 on Judicial Accountability aims to help practitioners ensure accountability for serious judicial misconduct, such as corruption or complicity in human rights violations, while preserving the independence of the judicia-

ry.
It focuses on international standards of accountability mechanisms and procedures, illustrated by practical examples. It addresses not only the accountability of individual judges and the accountability of the judiciary as an institution, but also State responsibility under international law, particularly in relation to harm caused to victims of violations by judges.

The Guide was greatly informed by discussions among eminent judges and lawyers from around the world, convened by the ICJ Centre for the Independence of Judges & Lawyers, in Tunisia in October 2015 and in Geneva in December 2015.

US AMBASSADOR: WE ARE TRYING TO HELP SD RETAIN AGOA

he United States of America Ambassador to Swaziland, Lisa Peterson has said they were trying to steer the country towards the right direction as far as the African Growth Opportunity Act (AGOA) is concerned.

Speaking to the Sunday Observer, she said they were trying by all means to help the kingdom address the remaining two and a half benchmarks so the country maybe considered again for AGOA.

"For now, we are closely monitoring government's efforts to meet the remaining two and a half benchmarks," she said.

This comes at a time when the AGOA review cycle for African countries was said to take place from this month until September and the country is hopeful to retain the Act within this period.

Worth noting, shortly after being introduced as the new ambassador, Peterson pledged that she would help Swaziland meet the AGOA benchmarks.

Peterson said they cannot write the bills for the government, but the least they can do is to give guidance on what would help retain AGOA.

She said they were only considering two and a half pieces for now which have been addressed.

Those are the amendments to the Industrial Relations Act to

allow for the registration of federations and to conform to International Labour Organisation (ILO) Convention No. 87 on the civil and criminal liability of trade union leaders.

Code

There is also the establishment of a Code of Good Practice for Industrial and Protest Action (the Code), as published in Legal Notice No. 202 of 2015 December 1, 2015.

In this case, the publication and dissemination of the Code has been said to be an important first step, although its implementation by the police is still under scrutiny hence the 'half.'

This concerns the clear training of the police and the proper use of the Code to legally regulate protest actions and correctly investigate any allegations or incidents of abuse.'

Finally, the last two benchmarks are the amendments to the Public Order Act and

Concern

The concern was that the Public Order Act was supposed to be brought in-line with the ILO standards, while the Suppression

narrow the scope of the definition of 'terrorist act,' bringing it in-line with international prac-

Amendments to these acts have already been done and they are now in parliament where they will be discussed and passed into

The loss of the AGOA eligibility status resulted to the loss of thousands of jobs, mainly in the textile industry as they could no longer have market access to the US with qualifying Sub-Saharan African countries.

Moreover, a delegation from the country last week appeared before the International Labour Organisation (ILO) with the hopes of retaining AGOA.

This saw the country being removed from the Special Paragraph, however, the Minister of Labour and Social Security was reported by our sister publication, the Swazi Observer daily to have said this did not guarantee AGOA retention.

The minister said though being removed from the Special Paragraph is a great victory for the country it is only a step towards regaining the AGOA

The country lost its eligibility to AGOA on January 1, 2015 after the US President Barack Obama withdrew the country's eligibility because of its failure to fully meet the set benchmarks.

Ayanda injured during police action — UNISWA

niversity of Swaziland (UNISWA) management has put to rest speculation which has been peddled in some quarters about the possibility of Ayanda Mkhabela having been injured by her fellow students.

Management yesterday revealed that all they knew was, Mkhabela was injured during police action.

This latest version, emanating mostly from UNISWA student debate circles, disputes that Mkhabela could have been 'run over' by the monstrous vehicle as they are under the impression that she could have possibly had her lower limbs severed by the vehicle.

"Looking at the wheels of the casspir, if it had run her over, she would have not survived the accident," the tone of the debate has been which is in line with initial police responses to how she was injured.

Responding to an emailed questionnaire, UNISWA management, through Registrar Dr Salebona Simelane responded that they were not privy to how Mkhabela was

injured, "What we do know is that she was injured during police action. Therefore, the police are the rightful authority to comment on this issue."

He however confirmed that the protest action was not sanctioned as students had been informed by university Senate that the class boycott was illegal and that they should stop and return to class the

The legality of the protest has been debated heatedly by those who remain divorced from student representative council (SRC) led protest actions.

Questioned

Dissenting students have questioned their peers' culpability in Mkhabela's injuries as they claim they should not suddenly be blameless while apportioning the same to police officers.

They claimed that the SRC led students assaulted others necessitating the institution to call in police to monitor the situation, after the protest led into the night.

Explaining the procedure for when the SRC wants to hold meetings, Simelane said the SRC applies for permission to hold student body meetings, "In most cases permission is granted. Normally, if the student body takes a resolution to embark on a class boycott, the SRC is required by the constitution to inform UNISWA authorities why and when they intend to embark on such action."

Boycott

He explained that the class boycott which took place on that fateful day was illegal in the sense that although the SRC had asked for permission to hold a meeting on Thursday, February 18, 2016, it never sought permission from the University management to embark on the class boycott.

Dr Simelane however revealed that he believed there is no selfrespecting institution that would grant permission to students to protest because that would compromise its reputation.

He revealed that students did not heed the directive of Senate and they decided to prolong the boycott into the night making their protest action illegal.

"It is unfortunate that someone got injured at the end of the day

but that protest was illegal," the debate has raged.

The debaters of the incident have also alleged that police presence was necessitated by the fact that some members of management were allegedly blocked from leaving the institution by protesting students and were saved by leaving in different vehicles to that which they usually utilise. This was however disputed by Dr Simelane.

In response to questions pertaining to what happened on February 22, Royal Swaziland Police National Commissioner Isaac Magagula said allegations to how Mkhabela was injured should not be taken at face value. He was speaking to the Observer on Saturday when he said "...if it was true that the casspir drove forcefully into the crowd then he had a problem because even speeding was not allowed."

He however assured that they were still investigating the matters seeing as such investigations take time and it did not mean they were meant to die a natural death as they were still searching for the truth.

SURVIVORS OF MHLABUBOVU ACCIDENT BITTER

wo boys from Mhlabubovu in Bhunya have lived to tell the tale of how they survived an accident which claimed the lives of two of their friends.

In an accident that happened two weeks ago, an unlicensed 22 year old Sakhile* from the area is said to have stolen his mother's vehicle, a Nissan NP200 van before he proceeded to Malkerns where they had drinks with his friends.

According to sources, Sakhile stole the car and asked for someone to drive them around in their drinking spree to Malkerns with a couple of friends.

It is said upon reaching Malkerns, he met up with his peers who he told not to bother with transport to take them home as he had transport and sources allege they were around 13 in the vehicle. Whilst they were enjoying drinks, Sakhile is said to have allegedly caught his girlfriend with someone else and a mini scuffle ensued between

the two

before he

drove off

home with her.

As they headed for home with the 'sober driver' behind the wheel, they stopped around the traffic circle in Mhlabubovu.

Seeing that they were nearer to home, the friends open the door at the back of the car where they enjoyed their drinks for a few minutes before the car unexpectedly drove off in the direction of Malkerns, again.

Surprise

However, this time around it was being driven by an intoxicated Sakhile who was in the company of his girlfriend in the front leaving

behind the respon-

sible driver. The source alleged this caught the friends by surprise as they were of the impression they were headed

Police Chief Information and Communications Officer, Superintendent Khulani Mamba. for home, but the speed at which the vehicle took off is what alarmed them and further caused panic.

One of the survivors only identified as 'Kaka,' said he was sitting in the back of the van as they enjoyed the drinks before they unexpected sped-off and was helped by his friends who caught his hand as he almost fell.

"As I was seated on the door, the car sped off out of the blue with the door open and I almost fell," said Kaka.

He said it wasn't long before they heard a loud bang like the sound of tyre burst and they realised the driver had lost control.

Thereafter, he said he woke up and found him on the edge of the tarmac with blood on his forehead, right arm and shoulder, as well as the

Another survivor shared the same sentiments, although he said he could not clearly recall everything except for when they were enjoying drinks by the waiting room at Mhlabubovu before the car sped off in the direction of Malkerns.

"We had only drove for a few kilometres when we saw what seemed like Sakhile was fighting for the wheel with his girlfriend and that was the last they recall

before they woke up and found ourselves sprawled on the ground," he said.

In addition, according to the source, "Sakhile was speeding and the car started losing control around an area called Philasiphile and the girlfriend seated next to him swerved the steering wheel and as they battled for it the car lost control and landed in a ditch."

The source said some passengers were thrown out of the car as it swerved off the road whilst others were unlucky as it landed in the ditch with them inside including the driver. **Realisation**

Upon the realisation of what had befallen him, it is alleged the driver managed to get out of the car unscathed and was found by police in the morning around 8.

The accident saw four of the victims admitted in a critical state, which were three guys and the girl who was seated at the front.

'No one came to us'

he family of one of the survivors in the accident that claimed the lives of two young boys has alleged no one has come to them to explain what happened to their child.

This was particularly directed to the family of the driver of the vehicle which they expected to atleast come to them and share their sympathy for the accident that almost cost the life of their child. The mother of one of the

survivors said, "solo kwenteke lengoti kute lofikile kitsi nekutosichazela nje kutsi kwentekeni, sesiva ngemntfwana nje."

Moreover, sources allege that the driver's family contributed towards the burial of the two young boys who were buried this past weekend.

It is said on of the boys was buried at his home at LaMgabhi on the Saturday, while the other was buried on the Sunday at Mafutseni.

"Three of the guys were admitted at Mankayane, as well as the girl. The driver sustained minor injuries. Two of the guys who were admitted passed away and were buried this past weekend," revealed the source.

The surviving victims are now 'Kaka' who has since been discharged and the alleged girlfriend who is alleged to have been transferred to the Mbabane Government Hospital as she dislocated her hip.

Meanwhile, our sister publication, the Swazi Observer daily reported this past week that angry residents of Mhlabubovu are alleged to be

threatening to set alight Sakhile for the accident.

As a result, it is said the young man now fears for his life after getting death threats from the residents of the area and is now in hiding. The angry residents were reported to be blaming the unlicensed driver for being reckless resulting in the fatal

accident.

They said they want to set him alight. Actually, they want him dead and he has vacated the area in fear for his life. The people of Mankayane are baying for the young man's blood," said the source.

*Sakhile not real name

Driver out on bail, goes into hiding

he driver of the vehicle involved in the accident that claimed the lives of two boys is out on bail.

This was said by the Police Chief Information and Communications Officer, Superintendent Khulani Mamba who confirmed the

accident.

He said he faces charges of culpable homicide but was admitted bail and is yet to appear in court.

The driver was arrested the day after the accident as he ran away after realising what had happened. He was however admitted to bail

and will be appearing in court soon," he said.

Moreover, sources revealed that the driver was currently in hiding as he feared for his life following threats from residents.

It is alleged the residents want the driver to 'pay' for what he has done.







The heavy effects of El Nino resulted in most p parts of Southern Africa receiving minimal rains, including Swaziland where many people was unable to plough like in most previous years.


The agriculture sector was one of the sectors that heavily affected by the drought crisis which saw maize production in the country decrease. Although also affected, some areas did however manage to produce substantial amounts of crops this year.

Some families under the Mhlambanyatsi Constituency including Mpuluzi and Lundzi have produced a great harvest which has exceeded expectations considering the minimal rains that were received.

Visit

The Sunday Observer paid a visit to some of these homestead, which were also recently toured by the

constituency's Member of Parliament Phiwayinkhosi Mabuza who is also the Minister of Housing and Urban Development, as well as Minister of Agriculture Moses

Solomon Zwane is one of the farmers who have managed to harvest a great amount of maize this year after ploughing late last year after the first few rains. Zwane's maize crib is filled to the brim. "It is true that the drought affected us very heavily but I was lucky because I have some knowledge on farming and maize production so I was able to survey the soil on the fields after the first rains and was able to tell that it was moist enough to plough.

By so doing whether or not rains

fall immediately after does not count because if the ground is moist enough germination takes place. We were blessed thereafter that rains continued to fall," he

Knowledge

Zwane, who won the national maize competition in 2014, said one of the main challenges for people in the country was that there was a lack of knowledge and ploughing was mainly trial and error. He said the government should have engaged the people on how they could make do with the little rains that were received.

"People have been ploughing for years and they get to understand what works and what doesn't.

However they have no idea what

to do in worst case scenarios and it is supposed to be the duty of the government to educate the people," he said. Zwane also revealed that the maize he had managed to produce was more than enough for his family and he would be selling to some of the people who would come asking.

Another family that was visited was the Nhlengetfwa family, where they have also produced a crib full of maize.

Head of the family, Mathanda Nhlengetfwa said he ploughed some of his fields in November last year and as again in December where rains started to improve. He said however that he did not use any special techniques but simply trusted in God to answer their pravers

"I love farming and I do it with a passion. I dedicated a lot of time to taking care of the crops and only prayed to God for more rains amidst the very gloomy situation. God answered our prayers and the harvests have shocked us all," he

In January this year, His Majesty King Mswati pronounced an end to the drought saying the drought situation changed as soon as the water party (bemanti) was commissioned to fetch water in the Indian Ocean in Mozambique. This was in December last year.

Water

Ingwenyama was quoted by sister publication the Swazi Observer, saying when the water party was commissioned (kuphuma kwesigubhu), the heavens responded and we saw rain coming down and things changed.

He said from there onwards there was a difference as rain began to fall and the valleys became green.

"We do not need drip irrigation because God has always shown that He has powers to bring us rain. We use drip irrigation just for the sake of it, otherwise God is the one who provides us with irrigation water," the King said.

This directive was also used by some of the farmers who were encouraged by the King's declaration. Worth noting however is that not all areas in the country managed to receive sufficient rains for ploughing.

Widow victimised for 'showing off' harvest

widow of Mpuluzi is allegedly being victimised by members of the community for what they call 'showing off of her great maize harvest.

The woman, who asked to remain anonymous in fear of further victimisation, said after the cabinet ministers visited her homestead to see the harvest rumours started spreading that the area would not be receiving government hand outs. She said some people went to the extent of confronting her, asking why she had placed her maize crib near the gate where it was visible enough for everyone to see. The elderly woman, who ploughed a total of eight fields with the assistance of her children, said she now lived in fear as many people were now showing her the cold shoulder "People in the community are not very happy and I fear for the worst. The maize crib is also no longer safe because people come up to me to ask why I am such a show off while they were starving. I am afraid of what will happen if they really do not receive anything from government," she said.


When reached for comment, the Minister of Agriculture Moses Vilakati rubbished these rumours. The minister who has been to the widow's homestead during the




Mhlambanyatsi Member of Parliament Phiwayinkhosi Mabuza is also pleased with the achievements of the people under his constituency.

tour said his visit had nothing to do with who would receive aid from government or not, instead he was simply assessing what areas had managed to produce enough crops regardless of the drought. Vilakati said it was part of his ministry's mandate to know which areas were able to do well, just as it was important to know which areas had been affected more. "There is no truth in such rumours. Distribution of food is done based on assessments by experts and my visit to the areas had nothing to do with that. The main objective of the visit was to show that it is possible to plough in certain areas, regardless of the drought that hit the country," he

said. Vilakati said the harvests of the areas proved that the Highveld was capable of producing enough to sustain the Lowveld in the future, while it was encouraged that in the Lowveld they must plant sorghum. He said by so doing the Lowveld would be able to supply the Highveld and vice versa. The minister said after his visit he would be able to give guidance in the ministry to ensure that resources are distributed accordingly. Mhlambanyatsi Member of Parliament Phiwayinkhosi Mabuza is also pleased with the achievements of the people under his constituency, regardless of the drought.

CHILDREN ON ARVS

hey take tablets with names they cannot pronounce for a disease they do not understand.

These are HIV positive children who have been placed on anti-retroviral treatment after acquiring HIV from their mothers.

"Kantsi mine ngitawu yekela nini kunatsa emaphilisi yeGogo?" Thabiso (nine) reportedly asks on a daily basis.

He lives with his grandmother Miriam on the outskirts of Mbabane in the rural areas.

Miriam is a community health motivator and has assumed the position of Thabiso's primary care giver. "He is my daughter's son" she

"He is my daughter's son," she reveals.

Having lost his father to death,

Having lost his father to death, Thabiso then lost his mother to abandonment as she reportedly went on to get married and live in Nhlangano.

"After his father died from AIDS related diseases, my daughter was later courted by a truck driver who tekaed her but died last year," Mirriam reveals adding Thabiso's mother is now of ill-health.

"I have been taking care of him since his mother left and I ensure he takes his medication on a daily basis," she says.

Adults

Giving permission for her grandson to be interviewed, she calls for him as he walks with a group of his friends on their way home from school.

Carrying a flavoured piece of ice which he sucks and then tries to hide from his grandmother's eyes, Thabiso sheepishly reveals that he enjoys school with enough patience of a child who would rather be playing than talking to adults.

The healthy looking young boy with a twinkle in his eyes says he wishes to be a doctor on completing his education so he can heal other people.

When asked about the tablets he takes regularly, he looks down and says he doesn't know what they are for except that they will make him grow taller and live longer.

"I am tired of taking them but I know I have to take them, three in the morning and two in the evening," he says.

After the interview he runs off with relief as he calls for his friends to wait for him. His grandmother sighs as she says she is at a loss.

Drinks

"I take him to Baylor Clinic and there was a time when I asked one of the nurses on how to respond to his questions concerning the medication and her callous response was I should just tell him out right. This worried me because I feel as though his understanding has not yet been established enough," she says.

She reveals how during a later visit, a different nurse made things easier.

"She talked to him and told him ARVs made him healthy and killed all the diseases and germs in his body, something he understood as he now reminds me to give him the tablets because he wants to be healthy," she says.

She reveals it is difficult raising him alone as he needed special attention.

"I am blessed because he is not a sickly child, it is just that these tablets makes him so head strong," she says.

As a caregiver, she is aware of other children within the community who are in the same boat as her grandson.

She accompanies us to a Mkhonta homestead where another nine-year-old-lives with his aunts and grandmother.

Muzi looks five. His aunt Sonto reveals he is partially deaf after an ear infection affected his hearing

last year.
"I take him to the Salvation Army and he does not yet know why he takes the medication," the mother of infant twins says.

With her hands
full as she tends after her
two children, she reveals that she
does not really have time to tend to
her sister's child. "If he does not take
his medication, I can't force him do
so," she says while shrugging.

She reveals that he is a stubborn child who refuses to at times take the medication which guarantees his CD4 cell count in healthy propor-

tions


She reveals that Muzi's mother works in one of the forestry companies and hardly comes home to check on the young boy.

"His father is also alive but does not really care so it is up to me to ensure that he eats and takes his medication," she says. When asked about his medication, Muzi mouths his responses as he concentrates on lip movements to 'hear' what is being said. He reveals that he takes the medication but would like to stop because he does not like it. "Mine kantsi ngitawphila nini," he asks. As though to prove that she has her hands full, Sonto's younger sister leaves one of the houses within the homestead with a crying baby, "Take the child to his father," she shouts.

She then goes into the same flat and attends the other twin.

Returning she reveals how her first born has nearly completed high school and the twins are from her second pregnancy.

"I thought I was done and could only ever have one child and these two are more than a handful," she says. She reveals how Muzi's mother does not assist with anything and instead leaves her to bear with everything. "She claimed to send money? To who? When," she asks in quick succession while widening her eyes in disbelief that her sister could have been economical

n the other hand, there are children who are slightly aware of the reasons behind having to take the daily dose of ARVs despite having no understanding of HIV.

"My mother told me I was born with HIV and I take the medication everyday," Sakhile (14) (not his real name) says.

He reveals he was taught to eat correctly at all times. "My mother ensures I eat better than my family members while my elder brothers and sisters also ensure that I eat well

and get the best medical care from Good Shepherd Hospital," he says.

He reveals that they have no fields at his home and the drought would not have yielded anything for them. "The only thing which grows here is these melons (*emajoti*) which I don't eat," he says.

He is not shy to play with other children and describes HIV as a condition that only affects his blood.

"I am no different from other children and I play with others," he says.

On the other hand, his peer, Thembi, a victim of abuse states, that she is ignorant of reasons behind having to take tablets daily.

ing to take tablets daily.

Her grandmother, Nqobile, reveals how Thembi is a victim of rape having been violated by her step-father for several years.

"She is an introverted child and her mind is now slower after the rapes," she says adding she was at a loss concerning telling her about the ARVs.

"I tell her every time she asks about them but she does not seem to understand as she keeps asking me to explain why she takes the horrible tablets," she said.

Tell them when they are ready - ministry

The ministry of health has revealed there was no set time to inform children on ART about what they are being treated for.

"The rule of the thumb is they

"The rule of the thumb is they should be inducted gradually with the help of health workers so as to ensure by the time they reach their teens they are aware of what is happening," Director of Health Services, Dr Vusi Magagula, says. He says it is admit-

tedly a tricky situation but one that needs to be done by parents or guardians.

"Don't bombard them with too much information but inform them about the benefits of their medication while adding more information at each discussion," he says.

He reveals that the Prevention

He reveals that the Prevention Mother-to-Child Transmission of HIV programme adopted by the ministry has made a huge difference as it removed the death sentence of children born to HIV positive parents.

"We have OVER 12 000 children on ARVs in the country, which is less than 10 percent of the adult population of over 155 000 adults on ARVs and look forward to a generation of children who will be born free of the virus," he says.

Having served as Miss Swaziland in 2002-2003, Shabangu revealed that she still mentored the youth whenever she found time while charity went hand-in-hand with all her business endeavours.

Shabangu revealed that it was an honour for her to have the opportunity of making children smile while working on the project. She explained that the donation was their contribution to nation building.

Future
On the other hand, Msweli revealed that the current Principal at the school, Patricia Magagula, was his former teacher and he felt the school was the best place to start, simply because charity begins at home, or in this case, alma mater.

Msweli said the shoes were a winter gift for the children who were mostly from disadvantaged backgrounds or orphaned as mornings were too cold.

Encouraging his peers within the business sector, he said, "If any one of us has a little bit extra, please try and share with the children of the country as they are the future."

He explained that the E10 000 was to help the school supplement the feeding scheme as it was important to have an uninterrupted supply of food which encourages children to attend classes.

"God willing we will try to give more in the future," he said.





otorists have commended the new look parts of the nearly completed MR3 road between Matsapha and Manzini.

Despite the nearly fixated outcry by motorists over the last couple of months concerning traffic delays, some of the refurbishment benefits have been noted and commended by those who frequent the route.

The road is being refurbished by Kukhanya Construction.

"The smooth road is now a marvel to drive on," Sizakele Tsabedze said.

She explained it was now easier to drive out of Manzini on the slow lane stretch from Nazarene to KaKhoza.

"Previously motorists all hogged the smoother fast lane due to the rutted nature of the slow lane which was damaged by trucks," she said of the lane which motorists used to describe as worse than a gravel road.

She noted that the uneven surface at the Nazarene traffic lights intersection was removed. She revealed how she used to swerve whenever she went past as vehicles which rode over the 'hump' would nearly lose control.

Kombi driver, Wandile Dlamini, said he was excited about the widened off and on ramps at Mhlaleni.

"There is more space for kombis to park while allowing trucks a neat turn into the on-ramp," Dlamini said.

He, however, said it was disheartening to note that his colleagues failed to utilise the whole stretch of the parking station and instead chose to block the entrance. "I wish there was a way we could use the whole length properly because the blockage at the entrance of the on-ramp makes us seem like hooligans," he said. He further commended the drainage systems which were being constructed saying they would clear the area of flooding during the rainy season. "Our passengers usually have a tough time walking in this area due to the pools of water which would accumulate here in the absence of proper

drainage," he said.

Speculating that there could be a road reserve being constructed from Mhlaleni to Logoba, he said it was about time as they had been calling for widening of the lane and a station allowance to allow them to park orderly under the overhead bridge.

"You may recall how several of our colleagues were arrested under that bridge which was wrongly placed as there was no allowance for a station underneath it," he said.

He revealed that they were excited to note that they would not be able to park while offloading their passengers properly instead of breaking the law by stopping in an area not designated for

Mbabane water woes: Women wake up at 4am to do washing

esperate times call for desperate measures. This best describes the water crisis faced by residents living in the capital.

The catastrophe began towards the end of last year when the country went through severe drought conditions which resulted in Mbabane, amongst other places, not having sufficient water to supply residents.

This saw the Swaziland Water Services Corporation (SWSC) taking into water rationing and in the process residents could not have water whenever they needed

On Thursday this past week, a group of women was found at Corporation around 4am busy with doing their washing by the roadside.

The situation is so dire the women have to brave the cold in the early hours of the morning in efforts to get the water before the rationing schedule takes place again, which means they will not have water for the next two days. When one woman was asked why they were doing their washing so early in the day she said that was the only time she had time because she was normally away during the day fending for her children and when she comes back in the evening the water would not be accessible then.

As a result, she has resorted to making good use of the little time she had in early morning to access the water and use it for all her domestic uses.

"Due to the ongoing water rationing, this is the only time we manage to do our domestic needs such as washing since during the day the water is hardly available. I also have to be away fending for my children hence I use this time

before the rationing commences at eight in the morning," said the woman who preferred to comment on condition of anonymity.

Another woman said as much as she understood the water crisis faced by the capital city and country as a whole, but this was an inconvenience to them as it now determined their daily schedule.

This is because they can no longer do their washing at a time convenient to them, instead that was now determined by the availability of water.

"Normally, I would do my washing on weekends but I cannot do that anymore because it happens water is not available the whole weekend, only to return during the week," she said.

Drought Meanwhile, the drought conditions caused panic in the country with Mbabane's only source of water, the Hawane Dam, running low on water levels, resulting in the government taking into digging boreholes to counteract the situation.

A total of 15 boreholes were planned to be dug around the capital, however, it has since emerged the government was now contemplating on constructing only eight of these.

It was said these would only be constructed if the Hawane Dam completely dried up.

The reason cited by the National Disaster Management Agency was that only eight of the 15 areas drilled produced adequate water yields to warrant pump installation.

The agency said the adequately yielding boreholes would be commissioned immediately as the current water source of Mbabane proved to be unable to sustain the

Lack of adequate signage irks motorists

ne of a motorist's biggest nightmares is finding a road inaccessible without prior

This has been one of the vices that motorists have accused Kukhanya Construction of failing to do, to put up proper signage.

However, Kukhanya management requested that questions about the signage should be directed at ZMCK Consulting Engineers' Sandile Makhubu who said he was not in a position to respond to media questions. He instead referred questions to the ministry of public works and transport. Over a week ago, the Manzini-Matsapha off-ramp to Mhlaleni was closed off to traffic without adequate signs telling them of the closure. "I arrived at Mhlaleni to only find a

flag waving marshal telling me to go past," Senzo Simelane said. He revealed that there were no signs prior to reaching the closed road telling him the road was closed and he would have to off-ramp at Ndlunganye and drive back to Mhlaleni on the Manzini bound lane.

This past Monday, the resurfacing of the Mhlaleni on-ramp to the Manzini-Matsapha lane caused disturbances as motorists were not alerted early of the road blocking works. Traffic from New Village came upon the road works without prior warning while those coming from settlements such as Ndzevane and Mbikwakhe experienced extreme delays which had not been anticipated as there were no signs. A drive to Matsapha from Mbabane on Wednesday revealed that

motorists have a tough time as the signage is indeed inadequate.

While the road was surfaced from just before the fly-over bridge to Magevini, motorists were not informed of an alternative route to Manzini and only those who were from Matsapha Industrial Area utilising the traffic circle 'came upon the detour sign placed right at the turn-off towards the University of Swaziland Kwaluseni Campus road which rejoins the MR3 at Ndlunganye.

Those using the fly-over bridge were not notified about the detour and only met up with bumper to bumper traffic which could have been avoided had the alternative route been accorded to them. Even though there were two lanes opened to drivers, the road works still caused traffic backlog.

Herefords High principal wanted out

t never rains but pours for Herefords High Principal, Colisile Maphanga who is wanted out of the school by parents.

The principal has been the subject of discussion lately in the community after she was involved in an assault drama with a teacher with another case being opened against her for assaulting a pupil. Angry parents are said to have stormed Herefords High two weeks ago calling for Maphanga to vacate the school labelling her a 'thief.' The bone of contention is alleged to be the trail of

cases where she is accused of ill-treating both pupils and teachers at the school. According to sources, the parents arrived at the school and dropped letters simply understood as votes of no confidence in the principal. This was after she was alleged to have been found guilty by the court on charges centred on abuse of authority, assaulting a teacher and further interfering with a witness, as well as not showing remorse during the court case.

Although the sentence is yet to be delivered on Tuesday but the parents have had enough of her and now want her out of the school immediately. In one of the two letters in possession of

this newspaper, the parents question how the school can be led by someone who has been found guilty of maladministration by the courts. "Uwaphatsa njani emabhuku ahulumende ube udliwe licala?" they wondered. They are also demanding answers on how she was responsible for the school's finances after being found guilty and decisions made by an accused were questionable.

The parents further question what the principal was giving to authorities from the ministry of education that made them not to take action against her or whether they want her to run it to the ground. "Siticambe yini tingoma ngawe

njengoba wawusenta last year? Lodeputy wamcoshela kona loku?" they queried. It is also understood from the letter that the parents want the principal locked behind bars for her offences as she is accused of having bought cameras amounting to E200 000 without their knowledge. Moreover, in the second letter the parents accuse Maphanga of having brought the school to the ground to an extent it was poorly performing from what it used to do. "Ubulele our good results," they alleged.

Maphanga is further accused of defrauding the parents and stealing the school's computers as well as causing animosity between teachers and pupils.


Adding, the principal is accused of being a bully who assaults teachers because she has a backing from the

Teaching Service Commission (TSC). The poor performance of the school in sports has also been blamed on the principal as they believe these had good

intentions for their pupils.

She is accused of having changed the school's uniform to her 'lousy bedroom colours,' and calling police to deal with dagga growing pupils when she grew it as well. The parents said, "You change our proud blue to your lousy bedroom colours, ubophise bantfwabetfu kani nawe ulima insangu." In accordance to sources, the principal has been found guilty on charges which emanate from alleged bad blood between her and Nolwazi Dlamini, who is a teacher at the school. This past week, it was stated that Maphanga had been reported to the police for giving one of the scholars' nine strokes on the buttocks.

eople with albinism are calling for a legislation that will deal with those using the word 'albino' in reference to them.

This was said on Friday by the people with albinism during their show titled On the Run #Price Tag.

This came about as a result of a discussion held by the participants.

Nomcebo Khumalo, who rendered a poem that was in support of this initiative, said people with albinism were also human beings and deserved to be treated as such.

During the play which starred Thembinkosi Mthethwa, Nqaba Tsela (Thabo) the actors disputed myths and beliefs that people with albinism have special powers.

The play revealed how a lot of people, especially in some countries such as Tanzania and Zimbabwe, believed body parts of human beings with albinism can bring one luck if used with muti.

People with Albinism Activist and Public Relations Officer Stuki Motsa said it was shocking that reports in

the media spoke of young girls being raped under the impression that if an infected man slept with a child with albinism he would be cured of HIV/AIDS.

She said this could not be far from

the truth as everybody knows that AIDS cannot be cured as of yet.

Motsa made mention of how some viewed people with albinism as legal tender.

"Do you know how much I am

worth? Apparently over two million Emalangeni and with that in mind people tend to forget that I am a human being just like each and everyone around me. And I deserve to enjoy life with no fear," she emphasised.

Motsa went on to show the media her bracelet which has a panic button as it was designed to protect her. This button is pressed when she feels in danger and the police near her would trace the person's whereabouts.

"This should not be a way a person lives. We are hunted like animals; people forget that we are sons, daughters, mothers and so forth," she said.

CALL ON FUNDS

he people with albinism have asked for funds to help them continue spreading the word on albinism awareness.

They said if condoms, ARVs and other preventative measures against diseases are given out for free, glasses, hats and sun screen ointments should be availed freely as people with albinism suffered from skin illnesses due to their condition which sees them living without melanin.

Some part of the theatre play dwelt on how the government always has everything for the nation such as food supplies and wheelchairs, forgetting people with albinism whereas they are also in need of things such as eye glasses and hats or even sunscreen, which other people take as a luxury.

They also called for harsh punishment for people who would be found selling their body parts. The talk of justice was the centre of discussion as some felt like the media reported on their killings while the nation was not doing much on helping protect them. They do not want to depend on the government but wanted this issue taken seriously as the HIV epidemic.

This was the first show of this nature and the organisers promised they would be touring the country seeing as they wanted to educate the whole nation on

this matter and further urged people to be on the lookout for their next stop.

EDUCATE SCHOOLS

uring the interactive part of the show, one attendant asked that schools and the community be incorporated into the movement of creating awareness about people with albinism.

"Most children discriminate their peers with albinism. My grandson is bullied daily and right now he does not want to go to school because he feels threatened about what these other children will do to him," said a lady who wanted to remain anonymous. She stated how she feared for her grandson and found it hard to send him to the shops because their family recently got attacked, leaving her grandson fatherless. In her plea she, asked Motsa to take this play to rural areas because most people with this condition were found there and were the most vulnerable.

BEHEADED GIRL'S MOTHER RELIVES HER DEATH

Amongst the play the organisers showed a documentary where they interviewed the family of Banele who was beheaded in 2010. Her mother recalled how devastating it was for her to run after her daughter only to find her mutilated. She said hurt she was about the situation she just wanted her daughter to be buried with her head.

Speaking on the documentary, Chief Police Information and Communications Officer, Khulani Mamba, called upon anyone who knew of such cases where people were hunted to come forward and report. He made mention that as police officers their works was to ensure the safety of the public and their property. "Police work with the public thus we need them to help stop the ritual killings. The public should stand up and fight with the police against these horrible killings," he said.



TN Swaziland has managed to touch lives around the country through the 21 Days of Y'ello Care Campaign that is currently ongoing.

MTN Swaziland is working with other companies to give back to the community under the 21 Days of Y'ello Care Campaign. The 21 days of Y'ello Care Campaign is implemented across 22 countries within MTN operations. All the projects undertaken by Swazi MTN have a bias towards the introduction and strengthening of innovation and ICT in education.

One of the main projects that were undertaken by the company under this initiative include the robotics, coding and programming project which was aimed at mobilising young people, making them innovators and creators of ICT products. A target of 900 primary and high school students in rural schools are already receiving basic training for 16 days during the 21 Days of Y'ello Care, and 16 teachers have been trained to facilitate follow-up.

MTN Swaziland has managed to reach six schools around the country excluding special schools. The MTN teams spent two days in each school for meaningful orientation on coding, robotics and programming which was also made possible through a partnership with the

United States of America (USA)
Embassy. The organisation also
rolled out training for teachers who
work with pupils battling with different learning impediments, a project
which was undertaken in partnership
with Micro Edit System, based in
Cape Town. At least two special
schools benefitted from this project
which focuses on overcoming learning impediments.

This is a literacy development programme that makes it easier than ever for teachers to provide differentiated curriculum resources and create a classroom of independent, enthusiastic learners.

The programme will enable pupils with special needs to develop vocabulary and spelling with word prediculary

tion. It will also allow pupils who have difficulty with speech to electronically capture thoughts and rehearse sentences with voice notes. Voice notes are said to be a powerful way for children to capture their thoughts and ideas.

Through a partnership with Microsoft South Africa, MTN Swaziland saw the introduction of a youth oriented platform called Youth Works, which largely targets tertiary training students. MTN Corporate Affairs Manager Mandla Luphondvo said over 1530 young people had registered to undertake different online training programs through Youth Works. The online courses contribute towards enhancing the employability of young people by equipping them with must have onthe-job skills.

During the course of the initiative, the Minister of Education and Training Phineas Magagula was also seen hard at work during a visit to Ekwetsembeni School where they were building a guard house. The school Principal Thembi Khoza-Dlamini revealed that the security guard would brave the cold every night as he went about with his duties which they were concerned was not good for his health.


Emnotfweni pupils' first encounter with a computer

In the wake of the Patriotic Alliance (PA) disrupting a 2016 municipal elections meeting by the DA in Pretoria earlier this week, Kenny Kunene took to Twitter to call Helen Zille a racist and to leave

him out of politics. Popular on a Kunene used to be the secretary general of the PA, which he joined months after being one of the three founder members of the Economic Freedom Fighters, along with Julius Malema and Floyd Shivambu. However, in 2014, after the national and provincial elections of May 7 in which the PA failed to win a National Assembly or provincial seat, he announced he had had enough of politics and would be focusing on his business interests in future. His friend and business partner Gayton McKenzie, however, vowed to push on as the president of the PA. The party describes itself

as a party "placing the interests of the coloured community at the top of the agenda". While disrupting the DA's gathering on Wednesday, insults were hurled at Zille amid her reminding the audience that McKenzie had been to prison.

Zille was told to "voetsek bitch!" by some of the invading PA mem-

Kunene evidently took exception to Zille referring to him on Wednesday as "the other [PA

leader] Kenny Kunene, who ran a nightclub that had bare women with sushi on their bodies".

There was a great deal more back and forth, from both Kunene and Zille as well as their respective supporters on Twitter.

Kunene stuck to his argument that he was no longer a politician, that Zille was referring to "his past" and politicians should leave him alone. "They like to irritate me," he added.



DA presses Hawks boss on Nkandla architect

OHANNESBURG - DA leader Mmusi Maimane has written to Hawks boss Mthandazo Ntlemeza to find out why the elite unit is not investigating Nkandla architect Minenhle Makhanya.

This follows a Special Investigating Unit (SIU) probe that found Makhanya, President Jacob Zuma's personal architect, had designed and authorised the construction of features unrelated to the security items listed by the SAPS and SANDF for Nkandla, and certified the overpayment of contractors and consultants.

This had the effect of enriching the contractors and consultants,

along with the Zuma family, the SIU report on Nkandla said.

The SIU has instituted a R155million civil claim against Makhanya.

Investigation

However, Police Minister Nathi Nhleko has said in a written reply to a parliamentary question from the DA that there is no investigation against him.

The National Prosecuting Authority has declined to prosecute three former directors-general of the Department of Public Works for their role in the appointment of consultants and contractors for the project, which ultimately cost the state R246m.

Hope Zinde's death gives birth to pledge to fight drugs

RETORIA - As the family, friends and colleagues of TV personality Hope Zinde battle to come to terms with her death, those who knew her have called for a war to be waged on drugs.

"I beg of you, let this death not be an accident but a lesson for all of us to learn and hold each other's hands to deal with this monster.

The drug problem in South Africa is extremely serious," friend and radio personality Chriselda

Dudumashe told mourners during a memorial service.

"As we go by our business, I urge you to reflect on how we have failed Warona and his mother. I want to use this tragedy to reflect on the bigger picture.

The biggest monster is the availability of the drugs and the inability of our laws on drug trafficking. That is where we need to

Dudumashe was among a number of speakers during the memorial service of Zinde, held in Pretoria on Friday, who called

for something to be done about the use and availability of drugs in communities.

She spoke of how society had failed Zinde and her 23-year-old son Warona Mark Zinde, who has been arrested in connection with the murder.

"When we accept what is, we begin the process to heal. For as long as we call a spade a digging

tool, we are not there yet.

The family is aggrieved by something that you and I as society have embraced. We have failed Hope and Warona. We did this," she said.

Dudumashe added that apart from being silent

on the issue of drugs in communities, people have made it difficult for those faced by challenges to seek assistance due to their judgemental nature.

She said Zinde could not turn to people to ask for help with the problem she faced because people tended to turn into "Judge Judy, Judge Masipa, Judge Moseneke".


EGYPT'S MORSI SENTENCED TO LIFE IN PRISON

AIRO - An Egyptian court yesterday sentenced former Islamist president Mohamed Morsi to life in prison in an espionage trial in which six of his co-defendants were handed death penalties.

The court acquitted Morsi of charges of having supplied Qatar with classified documents but sentenced him to life for leading an unlawful organisation, his lawyer Abdel Moneim Abdel Maksoud told AFP.

The ousted president was also convicted of having "stolen secret documents concerning state security" and handed another 15-year jail term, the lawyer added.

Qatar was a main backer of Morsi and his Muslim Brotherhood movement while he was in power between 2012 and



Mohamed Morsi was elected president of the Arab world's most populous country in June 2012.

July 2013, when the military overthrew and detained him.

Morsi has been sentenced to death in a separate trial for his alleged role in prison breaks and attacks on police stations during the 2011 uprising that overthrew veteran strongman Hosni Mubarak.

He has also received a life sentence and a 20-year jail term in two other trials.

Yesterday the court confirmed death sentences against six defendants, including three journalists tried in absentia who allegedly helped relay secret documents to Qatar.

The journalists have been identified as Ibrahim Mohamed Hilal and Jordanian citizen Alaa Omar Mohamed Sablan, both of Qatarbased Al-Jazeera channel.

The third has been named as Asmaa Mohamed al-Khatib, a female reporter with pro-Muslim Brotherhood news outlet Rassd.

The death sentences had been sent to the mufti - Egypt's official interpreter of Islamic law - as Egyptian law requires his opinion on death sentences although his opinion is not binding.

The verdicts can be appealed. *AFP*

Nigerian lawmaker denies US sex claims

ABUJA - A Nigerian lawmaker is accusing the US Embassy of defamation following its complaint that he and another colleague tried to hire sex workers while on a State Department exchange programme in Ohio.

Mark Gbillah said on Friday the allegation was a baseless attempt to tarnish the reputation of Nigeria's House of Representatives.

Turaki Hassan, spokesperson for House Speaker Yakubu Dogara, confirmed that the US Embassy this month submitted complaints about the behaviour of Gbillah and two colleagues, Samuel Ikon and Mohammed Garba Gololo. AP

WINDHOEK – Namibia President Hage Geingob has reportedly said the country's parliamentarians should not be required to reveal how much they are paid.

Kenyan MPs charged with hate speech, incitement

AIROBI - Eight Kenyan politicians were charged on Friday with hate speech and incitement to violence following public comments and calls to supporters made in recent days.

Three legislators from the ruling Jubilee party and four MPs and a senator from the opposition CORD alliance denied the charges in Nairobi's Milimani Law Courts.

Police guarded the area around the court, where supporters had gathered.

The detained Jubilee MPs, Moses Kuria, Kimani Ngunjiri and Ferdinand Waititu, are loyalists of President Uhuru Kenyatta and members of his Kikuyu tribe.

The CORD politicians are MPs Timothy Bosire, Aisha Jumwa, Junet Mohammed, Florence Mutua and Senator Johnson Muthama.

All eight have been in custody since Tuesday, with Chief Magistrate Daniel Ogembo warning that their power and influence meant they might interfere with investigations.

Threatening

Kuria and Waititu are accused of making public statements threatening the life of opposition leader Raila Odinga, a member of the Luo ethnic group, while Ngunjiri is said to have called for Luos in the central town of Nakuru to return to western Kenya, their traditional homeland.

On the CORD side, Mohammed, Mutua and Muthama are accused of inciting the storming of police head-quarters, while Bosire and Jumwa are alleged to have predicted chaos and violence as a result of Kenyatta's failure to unite the country in the wake of widespread and deadly political violence following the 2007 elections.

EgyptAir black boxes badly damaged

AIRO - The voice and data recorders from the EgyptAir plane that crashed into the Mediterranean nearly a month ago are "extensively damaged" and will need repairs before they can be analysed, an airline official said on Friday, dampening hopes for quick answers as to what caused the disaster.

The official didn't elaborate on how long the repairs would take, but said if this cannot be done in Egypt, the so-called "black boxes" would be sent abroad. The official spoke on condition of anonymity because he wasn't authorised to speak to the media.

With the flight's wreckage 3 000m under water, the cockpit voice and flight data recorders are vital for piecing together the last moments of the flight, which plunged into the sea between the Greek island of Crete and the Egyptian port city of Alexandria on May 19, killing all 66 on board.

Earlier in the day, Egypt's investigation commission said the flight data recorder had been pulled out of the sea, a day after the cockpit voice recorder was also recovered. Both were brought to Cairo for analysis.

The memory units inside the recorders can provide key data, including the last conversations inside the cockpit, information about auto-pilot mode or even smoke alarms. They might also give answers to why the pilot made no distress call before the crash. *AP*

Ex-wife in Cyprus denies EgyptAir hijacker's claims

ICOSIA - The Cypriot ex-wife of an Egyptian who hijacked a plane to Cyprus and is fighting extradition, on Friday denied his claims of being a political activist and portrayed him as a common criminal.

Marina Paraschou was called to testify in a Nicosia

court by the state as it seeks to have Seif al-Din Mohamed Mostafa, 58, extradited to Egypt, which has requested he face trial under a bilateral agreement.

State counsel is trying to discredit claims by the defence that as a known political activist Mostafa

would not receive a fair trial in Cairo for the hijacking in March.

Paraschou said Mostafa had never belonged to any opposition group in Egypt or been convicted for his political beliefs, despite spells behind bars in different Arab states.

Nigeria banks to set Naira rate tomorrow

AGOS - Nigeria's commercial banks will set the first exchange rate of the Naira versus the Dollar when the currency is allowed to float freely tomorrow after the central bank abandoned its dollar peg, a senior banking source said on Friday.

On Wednesday, the central

bank said it would float the

national currency tomorrow, but it has given few details on how the new rules will be implemented. In their first detailed guidance, central bank officials told bank chief executives at a meeting on Friday that lenders would set the first naira rate to the dollar based on demand without intervention from the central bank, one senior banking official told Reuters. A central bank source said Governor Godwin Emefiele was at the meeting and confirmed that commercial banks will determine the market rate tomorrow. The central bank officials also told the bankers it did not commit itself to clearing up a backlog. **Reuters**

65 000 rights complaints filed

TUNIS - A panel tasked with uncovering the truth about human rights violations under Tunisia's autocratic rulers before its 2011 revolution said on Friday it has received 65 000 complaints.

The Truth and Dignity Commission has tracked abuses committed between July 1955 - just a year before Tunisia gained its independence from France - and December 2013 when the fact-finding body was set up. The period effectively covers the rules of prime ministers Habib Bourguiba, that of his successor Zine El Abidine Ben Ali ousted in the 2011 uprising. AFP

Teacher sentenced to 90 years imprisonment

MURANG'A - A primary school teacher in Murang'a County, Kenya, has been sentenced to 90 years in prison for sexually assaulting nine male pupils. John Gichia Mugi allegedly committed the crimes between January and May 2014, only two terms after joining the school.

He was serving as the boys' boarding master.

MAGAGULA DESERVES **OUR SYMPATHY**

have had a couple of weeks break from writing, and quite frankly that has done me a lot of good. As those who regularly read this column will know, writing regularly is no stroll in the park, and sometimes a break helps to

I am glad, however, to be back, and able to share my thoughts with readers of this column.

Although there is so much to say because so many things have happened (like the soap opera at Parliament), my focus was drawn to the latest in a series of scandals concerning the Royal Swaziland Police (RSP)

I, like many people would simply like to hold the head of the police responsible for the wrongs committed, allegedly even, by his officers because of the notion that the buck stops with him.

As the National Commissioner of Police, Isaac Magagula gets criticised for everything that goes wrong within the police service, and in recent years, there has been so much that has dragged the name of the police through the mud. No specialist in communications can disguise this, the police officers have simply attracted the negative and suddenly the honour of the men in blue is disappearing like the speed of Usain Bolt doing the 100m dash.

Over the past few weeks, for instance, the police have been making all the wrong choices following the death of the magician, Mduduzi Gama, who is believed to have been dumped by the roadside at Mvakwelitje by two unidentified police officers. This incident adds to a list of others, like the alleged police negligence in the handling of a student protest at the University of Swaziland where they are alleged to have run over Ayanda Mkhabela. The least said there, the

Involvement

As you read this, the police are supposed to have already concluded their probe into what happened that lead to the Uniswa student being critically injured and apparently run over by the police caspir.

Then there is that Zavale incident in which the police again are accused of not just negligence, but being responsible for his death. The details there again are shocking. The police involvement, and an inquest was instituted to provide us with answers to our many ques-

In this instance, the police chief must answer for the officers who were on the ground, and who might have neglected to apply themselves carefully while executing their duties. There is also another instance of police corruption in which the police chief had

to answer on the alleged fraud committed by the officers in the traffic department, who had failed to account for the traffic fines. Basically, for the rot in the police, the NatComm is to blame.

Based on this, it is easy to draw a picture of the kind of police officers we now have; who are no longer honourable and impressionable officers, happy to serve and protect.

As I have always insisted, there is a very good argument to be made in why quite a number of officers are failing to lead by example. For the National Commissioner's critics, and certainly for many others out there like me who are not privy to the goings on inside the police service, it is a question of leadership or lack of. It is a question of the NatComm failing and not really that there are many dynamics that impact on this situation.

I personally always look at it from the recruitment of the police officers as playing a significant impact in the overall conduct and attitude within the service. While there are many very good officers, there quite simply are more rotten apples. This I argue because there are people who are not passionate enough to serve and therefore are only there because it pays the bills. The end result is that those who are in it for the job are most like to take bribes; steal; become rogue; hide dockets; break the rules at every available corner.

Conversely, this impacts on the leadership of the police, and the NatComm takes the flak, rightly or wrongly, but that is the nature of his job. It has always been accepted that leadership is about accepting

responsibility for everything that happens within your jurisdiction. As the old saying goes, a fish rots from the head. Equally, when the fish is not rotten, all is well and the leader gets the credit.

Politicians, for instance, are paid to make decisions, so too are leaders in business-that's why they are paid big bucks, someone used to say to me. And so because of that, when anything goes amiss we expect them to take the blame too, and fix it. There are no questions asked.

Change

I am not, by any stretch the imagination trying to suggest that this should not be. However, I was thinking about this situation with the NatComm in mind and have realised that the advent of leadership is also evolving, and so the dynamics change with the timesand generations. Back in the day everything was left to the head of that organisation to make a decision-and I mean everything; including deciding what kind of tea to provide for the organisation, or the purchasing of toilet paper.

In many organisations nothing would happen until the boss said so. Employees were not allowed to think—that was left to the leader of the organisation.

But times have changed, and are changing. To leave things to the leader of an organisation or company, let alone the police service, to decide is no longer the way corporate governance works. People need to take responsibility, no matter where in the chain they stand.

This means, for instance, the junior officers within the police service should be held as accountable as the NatComm. The notion that the buck stops with the man or woman at the helm no longer applies and should not actually. It is a thinking of the past and not one of the future, that we will still hold leaders to account without also taking those who are at the bottom accountable. Integrity should not be the exclusive preserve of the leadership, but for us all.

This brings me to the reason for choosing this topic; how is it that Magagula's deputies never get blamed for the ills at the police service? How is it, for instance, that the controversy surrounding the mysterious death of the magician, the station commander, or indeed the regional commander, not to mention the deputies nicely swinging in their chairs at the police headquarters are not criticised? Aren't they as much to blame too, for this? Why is it left to Isaac Magagula to defend the police; to find the answers; to take the blame, even if there are people directly responsible?

Spotlight

It is of course a different argument how the officers who are alleged to have dumped Mduduzi Gama remained unknown, and how they are likely to escape any of the spotlight that the man at the helm is in right now. Again, let me reiterate, I am not suggesting the NatComm should not be held accountable, but I am beginning to feel that we need a paradigm shift in holding people to account. Only blaming those at the helm is neglecting that everyone has a responsibility to the organisation.


Only challenging those at the helm neglects the thinking that everyone should be as much a leader as the man at the top, so that we share in the victories and the bad times.


That is why other officers do not give a damn what was happening in the police service, because they absolve themselves of anything regarding how they themselves are the problem or the solution.

I am actually beginning to be sympathetic to Magagula because not only do I know that he means well, but also because I see him being passionate enough to take the bullet for many of the wrongs in the interest of the institution.

Of course I should also point out that perhaps the problem lies in him not challenging his deputies to share the criticism or for him to deal with those below him. Maybe then we would get to the bottom of the problem plaguing the police.

But for now, let us all challenge ourselves to take responsibility for our own actions, otherwise our vision of attaining first world status will not be possible.

...the man who changed nappies and took his children to work with him

rilton 'Jazi H' Mamba's daughters say they literally have no idea where to start when talking about Umnumzane because their father is too complex for words. His impact in their lives is inexplicable; he is not only a father to his two biological daughters, but also the masses that, like them, see him as inspirational.

After much deliberation, Sabatini and Luyandza Mamba come to a balance and agree that the best thing their father did was choose their mother. Chuckles and giggles follow before they explain they needed their mother to even-out their dad's rather emphasised chocolate complexion. The second best thing he did was always being there for them, from when he became a father at the tender age of 21. His sense of responsibility is, perhaps, only rivalled by his sense of humour and love for people. Luyandza instantly claims she believes he was born with a bag full of these virtues. "My father just loves happiness, and will go out of his way to please. My grandmother, Gogo Mkhonta, tells us when he was young he always brought his friends to the house to eat, often at the expense of his siblings who would be hungry as the boys would eat everything. Not surprising, Umnumzane has a huge appetite himself. He claims

every muscle in his 'well-chiselled' body must be well fed,' she says, laugh-

We would watch him write stories and interact with some of his colleagues. He would introduce us to all of them, one by one. He just doted on us. My grandmother, on my mother's side, keeps talking about how he would change my nappies every time she visits. It's unbelievable!" Sabatini says.

Luyandza adds: "Umnumzane has always taught us to speak our minds for as long as it is respectful." We wanted to know why they keep calling him Umnumzane though, a title associated with respect, if he is such a friendly father. The girls explain that one day several years ago their father returned home to declare he be called Umnumzane henceforth, a moniker inspired by a visit to Mlilwane Game Reserve, where he met the children of the legendary Ted Reilly, who with every line when talking about their father, referred to him as Umnumzane. So since then Umnumzane is what they call him on his request and to their pleasure, they explain

They also mention that their father invents the funniest of names which he unfortunately uses on them; Stjway'tjway (from Stjununu), Stjwaibos, Stjumbuzo (for their mother) SilverFox, Foxina, Duzenamanz'abilayo, Sozabile, Nomazambane (for the girls), and many more. Mamba, who it has since been

we did not sound better than them. Umnumzane's life has been a marvel. For as long as we have known him, he has always given things to people, especially clothes. He buys these expensive things, wears them for a while, only to give them away.

Sometimes he gives away his whole wardrobe. His giving has been more meaningful after he became born again," Sabatini says. Adds Luyandza; "Because our father loves other people's children so much, we have tens of brothers, some of whom he sends to school; most of these play for his soccer team.'

If anything, their father taught them to be dreamers who accomplish their works through God. Sabatini just completed her Creative Multimedia Honours Degree at Limkokwing University, while Luyandza is a freshman at the University of Swaziland, where she is doing Economics. "I always look forward to the short breaks so I can spend quality time at home and at work with Umnumzane. People say they used to enjoy his radio shows; well I am blessed to still be listening to his many stories from morning to sunset. My father is so eloquent in both siSwati and English - he calls himself a white man trapped in a black skin.

He loves surprising those people who look at his beautiful dark skin and think he is a foreigner; he has turned that into a fine hobby eishUmnumzane! He says when he was younger other children made him cry when they teased him about his dark complexion and claims today his looks have opened doors," Luyandza says.





He does it so effortlessly, and with everything going on around him, it is astonishing how he manages to hold things together. I said at his 70th birthday party, that if I would be half the man he has been, I'd die a very happy man. Despite all that goes on in his political life, he always has time for his family which is a trait in him I admire greatly and is one I have tried to emulate in my life as a father."

When asked which day he would like to go back to, Muzi says it would have to be the day his parents bought him a BMX bike. BMX bikes were thee rage back in those days and he previously had a rickety-old maroon Delux bike which had seen better days. So the new bike was really what he wanted, espe-

As A Child...

Sadly for us, Muzi was not a rebellious child growing up. "There is nothing much I can recall I did growing up that would be termed 'rebellious.' I never snuck out to go clubbing. I don't remember a lot of clubs in Mbabane that I could sneak out to. I didn't grow up drinking or smoking, so there was no real need to go out to those establishments." He was a normal child who grew up in the suburbs of Mbabane and went to school and came back and played with his friends in his neighbourhood. Plus his parents were strict disciplinarians, so if you did anything close to being rebellious, you knew what awaited you at home. Even as a young adult in college in the USA, he didn't do anything out of the ordinary for a young

Being the prime minister's son Having a father in the public eye is not the easiest thing. For most people they may never know the feeling of having your father in the public eye and more especially as the PM. Granted, it has not been all doom and gloom. 





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I had missed the news that our government was contemplating introducing an alcohol levy, until I saw and read a news piece this past Friday where retailers are quoted to have been expressing their grave concerns on the proposed move.

As a non-drinker myself, my initial feeling when I read the article was that of indifference, but a debate that ensued with my colleagues at work – surprisingly most of whom are non-drinkers too, made me reflect critically and unbiasedly on what the repercussions of the said levy would have to various stakeholders involved in the entire value chain of the 'alcohol business', as it were, in this country.

I might not be privy to figures and all, but it is in the public domain that government is already making tens of millions in taxes from the 'alcohol industry', and the industry players involved are paying VAT, and other legal taxes. The levy, therefore, will, without doubt, increase government revenue collected from this sector although at the expense of some serious moral, and even legal, issues that I want to raise herein.

Perhaps, as a serious benchmarking consideration, your readers will appreciate that our regional neighbours South Africa, Lesotho, and Mozambique do not have such a levy in place. Lesotho, actually toyed with the idea of introducing a similar levy in 2011, but sanity quickly prevailed as they measured what the whole value chain involved stood to lose at the expense of what the government stood to benefit. And that envisaged

benefit was going to be in the shortterm anyway.

Swaziland's alcohol, particularly beer, prices are relatively pegged almost on par with South African prices, in spite of the latter enjoying a huge market due to population dynamics and variances between the two countries.

If South Africa, whose economy, by the way, is largely the mainstay of the entire SACU countries, opted not to introduce levies on her alcohol, it then defies logic and triggers industry failure for our government to even consider piling more levies to an already taxed industry.

Actually, this is what will happen to the economy of this country if such a

levy is adopted and implemented: Companies that produce and import alcoholic beverages would instantly effect the levy and pass it to the final consumer. In simple terms, the levy will result in the price hike of beer and other alcoholic beverages in Swaziland.

Economy

Naturally, any price hike in a challenged economy like ours translates to a decrease in consumption, due to the lack of a corresponding increase in disposable incomes. Now, one can imagine what this means to the entire cycle. Less consumption means there has to be less production, and less production would imply cost-cutting measures for production companies –

e.g. retrenchments, leading to a high unemployment rate.

All this would subsequently reduce the amount due to government as taxes from those companies at the end of the day.

Also, introducing an alcohol levy will instantly result in the emergence of a parallel market (black market), where alcoholic beverages would be smuggled into the country from South Africa and Mozambique since ours would be more expensive than that from those countries. Smuggling of alcohol, I suppose, would be very dangerous considering that most of the smuggled alcohol would not have been health-tested or certified. This would likely impact our already over

stretched health sector. The smuggling of any kind of goods actually sets bad precedence for a country, and eventually results in superficial economic meltdowns.

In fact, the levy might see smugging syndicates mushrooming, resulting in even further revenue loss by government, as these would bypass all tax collection systems. We have already seen the effects of smuggling cigarettes in the country which tends to create a criminal cartel among previously law abiding citizens.

However, some of my colleagues argued that if alcohol consumption in the country decreases as a result of this proposed levy then there shall be less social ills like crime, drink-driving, and so on. Well, perhaps we should look at it from a holistic and pecuniary point of view. What happens to the thousands who will lose jobs? Not just with the producers and importers but at retailer establishments as well (pubs, bars, clubs, etc.). What of vendors who make a living by selling various items adjacent to or at the said places?

The picture is bigger than what we can imagine with our laymen eyes. I'll end by encouraging government to be wary of insensitive policies that may repel investors from Swaziland, and focus on creating a friendly environment for those already trading, and those who are yet to invest in the country. Otherwise we risk being seen as a high tax state, and hence not attractive to foreign direct investments.

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wenty-five-year-old Isabel grew up in the countryside near Maputo in Mozambique. She's a pretty woman, went to school for six years and comes from a good family. But her chances of marrying and getting children are slim – because Isabel has epilepsy, a brain disorder characterised by repeated seizures (convulsions); seizures are episodes of disturbed brain activity that cause changes in attention or behaviour.

Isabel developed epilepsy because she happened to eat eggs from a m in human excrement from a family member, friends or neighbours. The tapeworm eggs had developed into cysts (sacs containing the tapeworm larva) in her brain. Isabel's community has no flushing toilets, and not everyone uses the latrines that have been dug. Instead, Isabel and other residents retire behind a bush when they need to go to the toilet while working in the fields or on their way to or from the market or school. This means that the tapeworm's eggs are found on plants or in the soil, where they can be eaten by pigs or even by people.

POORLY PREPARED PORK CAN CAUSE EPILEPSY

When the tapeworm's eggs develop in the body of a human or a pig, the human or pig develops a disease called cysticercosis.

Humans and pigs with cysticercosis have cysts in their bodies. While this disease results in few significant symptoms in pigs, the cysts will often end in humans' brains, which a large amount of blood flows through. Cysts in the brain cause neurocysticercosis. From the parasite's point of view, humans with cysts in their brains or bodies are a dead-end development - the parasite cannot reproduce itself. But if tapeworm eggs or larva reach a human's intestines, because the human has eaten undercooked pork infected by tapeworm cysts, the tapeworm can reproduce itself.

Connection

Scientists at the University of
Copenhagen's Department of
Veterinary Disease Biology have
been involved in researching cysticercosis and have been supervisors
for several PhD students from
Africa. One of the scientists, Maria
Vang Johansen, a veterinary surgeon
and a professor at the department's
Section of Parasitology, Health and
Development, says the connection
between cysticercosis and epilepsy is

extremely well documented.

Researchers who scan the brain of an epilepsy patient very often find both parasite-specific antigens circulating in the patient's blood – which documents the existence of living parasites – and spherical bodies up to 1 cm in size in the brain.

A recent meta-analysis of epilepsy attributable to neurocysticercosis indicated that more than 30 percent of epilepsy cases in sub-Saharan Africa may be due to the parasitic disease. Arve Lee Willingham from the University of Copenhagen, Denmark writes about this growing concern.

Disease

"Cysticercosis is emerging as a serious public health and Agricultural problem in Eastern and Southern Africa. Caused by the pork tapeworm, Taeniasolium, this zoonotic disease forms larval cysts in humans and pigs that can lead to epilepsy and death in humans. This has resulted to pork unsafe to eat and reduces the value of pigs. It occurs where sanitation is poor, meat inspection is inadequate and pigs range freely, and so is strongly associated with poverty.

People become infected with the adult tapeworm form of the parasite (taeniosis) by eating infested raw or

undercooked pork. Large numbers of the eggs of the tapeworm are shed in the infected person's stool and can be ingested by free-roaming pigs if people defecate outdoors. Pigs develop the immature larval form of the parasite (cysticersosis) with hundreds to thousands of small cysts, commonly called 'pork measles', heart and brain, rendering the pork unfit for consumption. Pigs thus affected usually show no signs of disease.

People can also become infected with the cystic larval form of the parasite Taeniasolium eggs either from direct contact with a human tapeworm carrier or from contaminated food and water – thus one does not need to raise pigs or consume pork to become infected with cysticercosis! In humans, the cysts often develop in the brain causing a condition called neurocysticercosis, which can cause severe headaches, epileptic seizures and sometimes death.

Neurocysticercosis is considered to be the most common preventable cause of epilepsy in the developing world, rendering people incapacitated and unproductive, and sometimes leading to fatal accidents as a result of seizures. Although, theoretically, easy to control and declared eradicable, cysticercosis remains neglected in Eastern and Southern Africa, due to lack of information and awareness about the problem's extent, lack of suitable diagnostic and management capacity, and a lack of control strategies."

Connection

Now that researchers have shown the connection between the parasite and epilepsy, can the epileptic patients be treated? Johansen says the answer is yes, but the treatment must be very intensive: hospitalisation with anthelmintic medicine (which is active against parasitic worms), and treatment against both epilepsy and inflammation, plus possible standard treatment with fluids should the patient go into medical shock.

"We believe that treatment with anthelmintic medicine increases the risk of an epileptic seizure, because the dead cysts will release the antigen that triggers a reaction from the patient's immune system, and it's this reaction, which is inflammatory, that causes the epileptic seizure," she says.

This should make us understand, therefore, that if we relieve ourselves behind a bush, rather than use the latrines, we, our families or neighbours risk eating the excrement and any tapeworm eggs either on crops or in pork. We should be careful enough to take all appropriate preventive measures for this known risk. As the adage goes, prevention is better than cure.



Aunt Sophie lived up to her ancestral lineage genealogy 'Mzisa Phala, Mabina Komo ehlaba, sibina isikumna inyama siyayidla. Uvovo konyoni inyoni yomsila omude. Umfazi mabele made owa wela iligwa negwa. Wangena esigodlweni wabeletha amadoda ethombo elide, amadoda angasabi umsebenzi usaba izandla. Umawela umbonda babuye baraga. Abathwali izandla emhlani, bathwala izandla abandwana baza kulamba. Bathunjwe izizwe bahle umthetho wakhabo, bafane nomzi wamagondwana wona owaphelako banganamthetho. Umthetho ngowakhako, Phahla.' Evident in her hosting the late President Nelson Mandela in Chicago after his release from prison, as Aunt Sophie was the matriarch and sister of the African National Congress in Chicago, USA.

Common Heritage

My tribute begins on how her family integrated into the Makhubu family in Luyengo under the custodianship of my late uncle Chief Mbutfo Benson, who was adamant on how there cannot be Makhubu exiles in Swaziland. Indicative of the common heritage between South African and Swaziland families, embedded in history, ancestral relations and genealogy. This further affirmed by migrant labourers, hence LaMsiza, as she is fondling known and her family were offered Swazi citizenship. She underwent a legitimisation process through 'kutekwa' at Luyengo, where she was expected to cry 'kumekeza' at the cattle kraal.

Of course this unconventional woman found this whole ceremony hilarious, she was laughing when grannies were telling her to cry. LaMsiza was complex yet simple and exceptionally generous, hence she won the hearts of many at the Luyengo. Grannies used to call her name as if she was born there and her unconventional ways became normal, today Luyengo has lost a wife and mother. Even after divorcing the late uncle Don, she continued to be an active member of the Makhubu family, attending gatherings, funerals, sending money, being the resident nurse for the sick in Swaziland and Johannesburg.

The upside is she married into the perfect family for her academic pursuits, the family did not frown when government awarded her a USAID scholarship. She lectured with my mother Dr. Maggie Makhubu the first principle of the Institute of Health Sciences, now UNISWA Faculty of Health Science. Dr Msiza's sisterhood and professional relationship with my mother resulted in us living close to each other, where we witnessed this unconventional woman being actively involved in ANC activities. I recall Uncle Thabo Khabele, driving to collect her either at a police station or somewhere after being released from custody. Evidently the 'kutekwa' ceremony resulted in her Swazi citizenship, which was strategic for her ANC activities, whilst she was contributing to human development as a health sciences lecturer in Swaziland.

Service to Humanity

LaMsiza's unconventional militancy and outspokenness was liberating, refreshing, and at times scary. She left no stone unturned and never suffered fools guilt, evident in her passion, commitment and contribution towards the ANC. When visiting her in Chicago as a student in Montreal, she was still militant, had found an ANC family. Her house was busy, comrade Sophie was the operative name, at the same time she was working in a hospital within Chicago. This unconventional woman made Ntombi and I wonder why we came home that Christmas, she made us do community work.

In partnership with the Methodist church, we had to clean a house in Chicago's housing projects. This house was so dirty yet the women living in it were beautiful covered in bling, it's yellow carpet was looking grey, we resisted she insisted, aunt Sophie always won.

Cleaning this house was a significant lesson on the violence of modernity manifesting in what was unbelievable urban poverty we witnessed. This violence had raptured the souls of these beautiful women such that they lacked dignity, evident in this living space cluttered with dirt. It is not surprising that Malumekazi LaMsiza worked in municipalities, as she continued to relive her Chicago projects passion. This is evident in how working at Ekurhuleni Municipality was not enough, hence she was an ANC councillor at the City of

Johannesburg. Upon retirement she was still visiting ANC comrades with the late comrade Busi Dlamini, whom we laid to rest earlier this

Once I tagged along, they were listening and helping comrades, and I admired the patience and passion as I was exhausted after these visits. Her passing-on leaves an indelible mark, as LaMsiza left behind liberating, refreshing and yet challenging memories of how unconventional thoughts and actions must become passion. Loving the ANC was all that she did, hating racism and racial intolerance she fought not only during the struggle. But daily as a trip to the mall or hospital or any public space with LaMzisa could shift from a joy to a nightmare, when her militancy is triggered she will see, name and shame racism.

LaMsiza worked tirelessly for the people of Luyengo, Swaziland, the Chicago housing projects and the ANC comrades. She was com mitted to being of service to humanity, and this is what God asks of us. I paraphrase as in accordance to the Egyptian Ma'at, upon death our hearts will be weighed against a light feather to determine our ability to enter the Kingdom of Osiris. Malumekazi emptied her heart with deeds, actions and passion, as a mother, sister, granny, aunt, nurse, lecturer, community builder, comrade, politician, business person now it is time to enter the Kingdom of God.

Conclusion

The above tribute I read at the ANC

Memorial Service on Thursday June 9th 2016. However I read with interest her obituary during her funeral service on how Dr Sophie Bethiwe Msiza was deported from Swaziland in 1983. I am still searching the National Archives for this deportation order as Swaziland has been vilified on numerous occasions justifiable and at times unjustifiably. Malumekazi LaMsiza held Swazi citizenship and for many years travelled with a Swaziland International Passport, later held a Swaziland National Identification Card and for her contribution in health sciences was a recipient of Swaziland's Public Service Pension Fund.

In my research on this deportation order, I take into consideration that many South African families were ill-treated whilst living in Swaziland, particularly after the demise of King Sobhuza II. However I am also aware that the competitiveness for political appointments and tender awards has resulted in vilifying Swaziland, as this increases the ANC political position or tender awarding scoring points. Hence we all have the responsibility to research and verify these allegations, as Swaziland is engulfed in negative struggle contribution. And yet Swaziland welcomed many families and I lived with some at UNISWA and St Christopher's in Luyengo and Kwaluseni, Mbabane, Manzini, many South Africans continue to consider this country home, which nurtured racial equality and edu-

According to Dr. Msiza's obituary by the age of 12 she was already generating her own income by selling wares to mineworkers at the local beer hall to pay her school fees. In Swaziland she work at King Sobhuza II Clinic, Manzini Blood bank, and later was lecturer at the Institute of Health Science. She held a nursing diploma, a Diploma in Phlebotomy, BSC Nursing and Health Sciences, Masters in Health Science, Masters in Health Professions and Doctorate (PHD) in Health Science. Dr Sophie is survived by her daughter Ntombi, her sons Peter and Sibusiso, grandchildren: Johnson, Sicelo, Mlungisi, Abongile, Ndundwana, Serbian, Xavier, Ntando. Olivia, Cloe, Bongiwe, Litha and her great-grandchild Kwezi. She is also survived by her siblings: Sakhe, Susan and Beauty, and her two brothers Vusi and Bernard.

Mainstream schooling and students with special needs

s a big fan of inclusive education, it is wonderful to see as many pupils in mainstream education as can be happy there. Young people will have to function in the wide world soon, and it is our job to try and prepare them for that as best we can, from teaching them their first friendly smile to taking them to their College interview. They have to learn to mix with everyone else, and school should be a relatively safe environment in which to gather most of the skills, understanding and knowledge required to become a socially adept adult.

Children learn far more lessons in school than anywhere else, and largely, they learn about diversity. They realise on their first day at preschool that everyone is different. My children, one in university and another in high school, are very lucky to attend schools which are specifically inclusive to people with special needs.

They have learnt to communicate, to play and work with children who can't hear like they can. In return the children with special needs have learnt how to work best with 'typical" people. It works, and it benefits the individuals and makes for a healthier society as a whole.

This is by design, as a family we look out for opportunities to embrace diversity, especially disability, because we have additional needs ourselves. Most people do, they just don't readily admit it, to themselves and to others.

Our own family experiences of people on the Autistic Spectrum have shown us that mainstream education has proven to be not only possible, but beneficial, with our beneficiaries attaining excellent results both academically and

Before having any idea I would ever be linked, socially and professionally, with anyone on the Autistic Spectrum I was continually intrigued by the working of the minds and the various communication methods available to us. I have experienced youngsters both on the spectrum and deaf in inclusive mainstream settings.

For me at least, Inclusive Education has been proven to work. There is no greater work reward than an 18 year old passing an exam when you've been writing or signing or generally just being there for them all year.

I appreciate there are children and young people who will never be able to cope in mainstream education. All the funding in the world isn't going to make it a safe or happy environment for them.

These children are very special and need extra care in order to thrive. Inclusion is about treating everyone differently. It's about helping everyone to get as far up the staircase they are climbing as possible, even if they may never

For over a century the majority of disabled children have been educated in special schools, excluded from their non-disabled peers. It is only in the last of couple years that this has started to change as more disabled children are being increasingly given the opportunity to mainstream education as this form of discrimination is slowly being exposed, questioned and challenged.

It is possible to identify disabled adults who have attended mainstream schools, as opposed to special schools, by factors as simple as their posture mainly because mainstream schools provide disabled children with the same expectations to succeed as their peers, the social skills needed to compete in a non-disabled world which special schools fail to do, and prepares disabled children for the real world.

My preference for mainstream education for disabled children does not mean I disagree with special education, because everyone should definitely get the education specifically suited and tailored to their needs. However, non-disabled and disabled children have the right to be educated together. The criticisms against mainstream education by parents and others stems from the fact that many children are integrated into their schools rather than being included.

Integration is when the child is required to simply fit in with the school and no consideration of their needs being taken into account. This is not proper inclusion, where the school reasonably adapts its policies, practices and teaching methods to accommodate the specific needs of the child. There is always going to be some middle ground where the child must learn how to adapt to the school in the same way they will need to adapt to other situations throughout their life to succeed.

The segregation of disabled children from mainstream education causes immense damage to the fabric of society that can only be mended when all disabled children are fully included into mainstream education as standard policy, not just as a right but as the norm. At the same time, the education system must be responsive to the individual needs of children, disabled or not. Proper inclusion into mainstream schools must be the only 'choice' desired by everyone, for the benefit of everyone.

By no means am I encouraging parents to sacrifice their children with special needs for an ideal of inclusivity. If mainstream appears not to be working for your child, move them to the nearest special school - preferably, one that encourages as much interaction with mainstream schools as possible. I have every confidence that your special needs child can teach other non-visibly-disabled children lessons on diversity.

I have written before on the achievement gap between mainstream and specialised schooling as well as on the unfairness of standardised testing, examining and scoring for differently abled students. I am encouraged by the interest that teachers and officials alike are engaging in this regard. Please see my email address above.

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et us today sit down and look at the significance of trees to us humanity. Genesis 1: 9 talks of God creating seed bearing plants and trees that bear fruit with a seed in it according to their various kinds. Trees play a very important role in our lives as human beings. Trees produce oxygen that supports human life. It seems like there is a strong and dip relationship between trees and human beings. Trees are very close to humans so much so that even the last journey taken by a person, a tree is always in use.

A casket or coffin is made out of trees. Itolo bekuba netigodvo letisetjentiswako nakwakhiwa indlu yekugcina yemuntfu. There are many types of trees that are found in this country. Just as human beings, some people have no seed to reproduce. Some trees do not bear fruits. There are trees that live like humans.

The reed for example grows in wet land, it cannot survive without water. A reed grows in stages, and has a tussle on its top symbolising maturity. Human beings also grow in stages and cannot survive without water. There is a very strong connection between reeds and humans. Emaguma siwakha ngemhlanga, indlu yakagogo siyakha ngemhlanga, umuntfu lofile ulandvwa ngemhlangamlambo. It is noteworthy that humans and trees have many things in common.


Humans and trees, both, grow, feed, respire, excrete, move, reproduce, react and adapt to their environments. Humans also share a lot with trees. People have hair, trees have leaves, people have skin, tihlahla tinemagcolo, humans have veins, and trees have roots.

The connection between trees and humans is inseparable. A human being has feet, a head; just as trees also have a head and feet. Indvuku umfana uyibamba enhloko yayo ashaye inkhomo ngetinyawo tayo. Trees stand upright just like human beings and comparatively not all trees fall down when they die. Some just dry up and die. Swazi people use plants for many different reasons. Some are used for medicine, cultural activities and for religious purposes.

The Swazi traditional religion makes good use of plants. During incwala, umhlanga and buganu, plants are used. Traditional healers make good use of plants when they treat diseases. The survival of a tree solely depends on its roots. It uses its roots to absorb water for growth and sustainability. It is for this reason that elderly people believed that umntfwana kufanele abhunyiselwe ngetihlati takubo aseseluswane khona atewukhula acinile avikeleke etifeni. Kubhunyiselwa kumakhela timphandze tekusima.

Let us remember that *emaSwati* used to believe that trees were very important within a

homestead. Kute likhaya lebelakhiwa kungahlanyelwa tihlahla tsite. Some trees are found in a certain place before a homestead is build there. Those trees are note destroyed. Some are kept for certain purposes. Usually when a homestead is build there would be a tree found in that place. That tree becomes very important because it serve as a reminder of the history of the family.

History

For years it becomes the pillar that reflects the history of that family. Little do some of us know today that culturally that tree is not supposed to dry up? Kuba sihlahla selikhaya. Nalabalele babona ngaso kutsi impilo isekhona ekhaya. Titsa tilwela kuhlamahlama sona ngenkhosatana. Tisuke tifuna kutjengisa kwedzelela inhloko yelikhaya. Umnumzane uyasivikela leso sihlahla ngebafana bakhe (tindvuku letivimba butsa). He would also plant trees strategically within a homestead. Not all trees that are found within a homestead are consumable.

The process of starting a home involves lots of work and collaboration between the man's father and mkhulu. Mkhulu has to inform the ancestors that one of their offspring is now leaving the main household. It is for this reason emaSwati atsi umfana ute likhaya. Nakakha wakhela uyise ngobe neyise ute likhaya nakasekhona uyise wakhe.

Nakacaba umfana umuti weyise uniketwa lihlahla lelitsatfwa esibayeni setikhomo. The great ancestor would then take care of his father's homestead. Swazis believe that the ancestors are very powerful and can protect or cause bad things to occur when they are not listened to. Ekhaya leliSwati you would find many types of trees and all of them are planted for different purposes. Phayi washimane is planted for the purposes of preventing bad mouthing. Angeke umkhulume kabi umuntfu lona phayi washimane. Uyesatjwa ngobe phayi washimane umletsela sitfunti. Phindze ungumabopha lobopha bonkhe bubi. The head of the family would also plant ingoba makhosi. This tree stops lightning and it prevents evil spirits from coming closer to that home. Mkhulu always planted these trees side by side near the entrance. Losilina is another tree that was treasured by elderly Swazi people. Most homesteads even today like planting this tree. Losilina ucosha imimoya lemibi kantsi futsi sihlahla setinhlahla. Sihlahla lesibamba bonkhe bantfu ekhaya kusukela emntfwaneni. Sihlahla lesikhulunyiswako ekhaya. Ikakhulu umnumzane welikhaya. Siyabikelwa ngako konkhe lokwentekako ekhaya.

Another tree is *gebeleweni* which is always planted near the gate side by side. This is a tree that stops bad presages and it can show if there is something erroneous.

Stick

A tree has significant meaning to humans. As December approaches all young men of the kingdom shall carry the sacred *lusekwane* plant *baye enhla nelive*. Each and every one of them shall be seen carrying his own lusekwane, his own cross. Biblically Jesus Christ was crucified on a tree. The very same tree that was created by God, ended up being used to crucify Jesus. Jesus carried his own cross to Mount Calvary, just as young men in the kingdom in December they shall carry their own cross. Moses was carrying a stick from a tree when he was called to lead the children of Israel, just as Isaac was carrying wood from a tree when he went up the mountain with Abraham.

Through that tree, Isaac was saved. A lamb was seen just when Abraham was about to sacrifice Isaac thus the Dlamini people in Swaziland up till today do not eat lamb because it saved the life of the begotten son. It was seen tied to a tree. The *umntfwana* in Swaziland will never lead the nation in the absence of a stick from a tree in his hand.

The Swazi traditional religion cannot be a religion in the absence of using trees. Traditional healers use trees to treat ailments. Cultural activities in Swaziland also make good use of trees. *Incwala, umhlanga,* and *buganu* all make use of trees. Trees during winter dry up. Spring, they begin to bear new leaves. New life begins and it is for that reason that Swazi people through their culture send a girl child to fetch the reeds.

Lusekwane on the other hand symbolises the birth of a new era. It is after the incwala ceremony whereby Swazi people are free to use new food. A true Swazi would not touch any new food may it be maize, sorghum, beans, pumpkins, peanuts. He waits for the sacred incwala to pass so that after he can start eating this food.

Challenging a child that disagrees with you



arenting can be tiresome to the majority of us, even to the motivated like myself and the many that are out there. This is because even the angelic child we were forever proud of will at some point be in disagreement with our parenting approach and expectations. Nonetheless, that should not in any way put us in dismay and makes us feel little and inadequate as parents ecause disagreements are there to be us light and assurance that there

must be something we doing okay.

This article is mainly to encourage us as parents to welcome disagreements on a positive note as we continue to endeavour to be the best in loving our children and fostering a positive relationship with them.

Remember that children engage in disagreements with parents because they too are adamant that whatever is that they believe in stands and is the utmost importance and of value so parents in that regard also need parent smarter in hearing out the control of the control of

Then the question at play is that how do we go about challenging those in disagreement and what really is the benefit? It is of great benefit to listen to another point of view and anybody who is interested in becoming smarter and learning more absolutely loves to hear an argument opposing their own, especially if the person challenging you is pretty certain about their point of view or their convictions.

disagreements with parents because they too are adamant that whatever it is that they believe in stands and is of the utmost importance and of value, so parents in that regard also need to parent smarter in hearing out the concern; lest they (parents) miss the chance too in learning. The more the other person knows about the topic you are debating, the better your chances of gaining insight and sharpening your own point of view for the future. If you were in a war-zone, such an exercise could have been likened to that of saving and gathering ammunition to attack with next time the enemy attacks.



There are dumb and smart ways to challenge. If you come across too strong and too arrogant which usually is the norm to the majority of parents, the other person may do one of two things. He or she may come back equally hard-headed in which case

neither party will give or take an inch This is the most foolish way to go into an argument. The second thing that may happen is that your opponent (child) will perceive that your ego is prohibiting you from arguing in an adult and constructive way in which case he/she may just walk away from the challenge on the basis that it is just not worth pursuing. In both these cases, you will have won absolutely nothing apart from avoiding a blow to your ego and losing a relationship with your child. A great negotiator once said that you should always leave a 10% gap in your argument so that you can fill that with some of the sound evidence given by the person

In conclusion. Sihlahla simcokwa kakhulu ekhaya. Sisikhonkwane ekhaya. It is very important for us to remember that there are trees that are planted for certain purposes ekhaya. How many Swazis today would agree with me that sihlahla lesikhala lubisi asihlanyelwa ekhaya unless it's for certain sacred reasons? Akukavami ekhaya lapho kunesihlahla lesikhala lubisi khona kutsi bantfu bakhona bevane. Nemali futsi ayihlali kulelo khaya. Is there any elderly person who can agree with me that itolo sihlahla seliphopho besingahlanyelwa ebaleni ekhaya.

There is power in trees such that some trees are not supposed to be found within a homestead like umsilinga and umdlebe. Some trees are planted to serve as warnings to young people so that they do not come near that place.

For example sihlahla semsinsi shows that akuhanjwa lapho ngobe sihlanyelwa emathuneni. Umsinsi ungasala uwondvwa endzaweni ube sikhonkhwane sekuveta kutsi leyo ndzawo lawutfolakale khona maliba emuti tsite. How many among us today still believe that akusiko konkhe kugula lokutfolakala kumuntfu lokubita kutsi umuntfu aye esibhedlela ayewulashwa khona. Do we still believe that there is sickness that needs timbita from trees? Some sicknesses needs a hospital? Whilst others need prayer? There are some sicknesses esintfwini that require only the leaves of the tree and thus the person would be healed.

Dissociated


Some require emagcolo esihlahla and others require that they be treated using the roots of a tree. Our grandparents used to live up to 120 years all because they did not dissociated themselves from trees.

How many Swazis today still believe in the use of timbita? It there any nurse, doctor or scientist who can study scientifically the relationship between imbita yemhlabelo and the western medicine that is used uma umuntfu ephukile? The Royal Technology Park needs to open its doors soon. Tinyanga, tingedla bonyankwabi, bogobela kanye netangoma are ready to work hand in hand with scientists to find cures, for diseases affecting the world.

Can somebody answer me here, what happened to lihlungwane among the Mkhonta people? Do the Vilakati people still have liphephetse? Do the Mnisi people still have lijobe? Do the Kunene people kaLofokati, kaMbabane still have lubaba? Do the Bhembe people understand why in their praise name there is a line that says wena lowabhodla ebusweni benkhosi yangete yasho lutfo? What was the science between Bhembe, royalty and sindvwane? Sihlahla semsilinga bekakususelaphi emaSwati kutsi asingeniswa ekhaya? Likhaya lapho khona bantfu bakhona sebafe bonkhe baphela emaSwati bekentelani kutsi abeke lihlahla endleleni leya kulelo khaya kute kutsiwe sekwavalwa ngelihlahla? Leni lihlahla?

you are negotiating or arguing with. It also infers that you are willing to entertain another opinion and, if it's well substantiated, you may accord it a larger percentage, or if it is absolutely solid, you may even consider relinquishing the other 90%. If you refuse to leave the 10% gap you have already made up your mind not to shift your opinion at all, not to learn and to be convinced, in which case getting into the argument is senseless in the first place.

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deally, people should be seen to be capable of attaining all that the creator has purposed to fulfill the very purpose for creation.

Human beings should be assisted to discover their full potential, and when they exhibit some shortcomings then the nurturing process can be employed as part of empowerment.

Whoever came out with the idea that people from the Western world are superior compared to those from the developing world baffles one's mind when we consider some oppressive tendencies that soon emerge, violating people's rights with impunity.

Perhaps it's prudent to say it loud and clear that people are fully developed beings and as such possess abilities to become the best that we can possibly be and this should not be doubted.

Hence every human being should know beyond any shadow of doubt that they are born equal, endowed with rights and privileges (see, Article 5 UDHR).

PROTECTION AND EQUALITY BEFORE THE LAW

EQUALITY OF ALL HUMANITY

Human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights

The overriding principle for all humanity is that we must be afforded equal justice and treated fairly before the law.

Whenever there are points of disagreement and conflict which cannot be ruled out in human relations, the law is provided to help people settle such conflicts.

Those who administer justice should ensure that they apply their minds accordingly when they are resolving issues arising from conflicts.

In essence, all people are entitled to equal protection against any form of discrimination which happens to be the major course for all obtaining human conflicts.

Those who often incite discrimination against others should realize that all humanity is endowed with dignity. In other words, we should strive towards established human relations that are administered by law and principles of equality.

There is no greater joy than seeing people protected against any form of abuse and treated fairly.

That is what human rights are trying to advocate.

(See, Article 6 UDHR).

EFFECTIVE REMEDY THROUGH COMPETENT TRIBUNALS

One issue that should be promoted and upheld is offering effective remedy to people through competent tribunal by a constitutional clause regarding protection of people's fundamental rights. Ideally, this implies that national law should be in-line with the provisions provided for in the International law regarding people's rights.

Ideally, the international treaties present us with best practises, which then calls for domestication of the same so that local laws are fine-tuned to be in-line with acceptable standards. We are to ensure that over and above the Courts, other mechanisms that citizens can access to have their issues attended to are availed to the people.

The Human Rights Commission should not make it almost impossible for citizens to access its services. Hence the call for robust civic education coupled with advocacy mechanism in almost all regions for citizens to access promptly the services provided. Incitement on people to advance discriminatory tendencies

against others must be discarded. Strengthening of Courts and tribunals in any given country becomes crucial in advancing such a programme. (See, Article 8 UDHR).

FAIR HEARING

In a world where we are bound to commit some crimes or anything that causes tensions between us as people, we then need to be heard whenever there are cases we have to answer. Ordinarily no people should take the law into their own hands and deal with people suspected to have committed any wrong doing. We have to respect competent courts which have rules of engagement to bring to trial whoever is suspected to have committed any wrong.

This means that any person has a right to fair hearing by an independent entity and impartial tribunal. The assumption is that the rules of engagement will be made known and that people have legal representation whenever such cases are brought before the tribunal.

In a democratic state those who cannot afford the legal representation are often provided with competent lawyers to represent them whose legal fees are paid by the State. This is based on the fact that every citizen belongs to a civilized community and as such should be seen to have been supported and protected. Even if that person has committed something wrong, when their issues are brought to court or tribunal they must be represented.

It is actually amazing how tribunals and courts, the world over are full of technical jargon needing some form of experience and interpretation. The rights of each individual then ought to be respected regardless of the crime committed. This is where we often miss the point, how can a criminal be afforded legal representation for that matter we always wonder?

Human rights by their very nature encourages impartiality and even belong to prisoners that we may consider the worst, are still entitled to be afforded their rights and privileges. The right to fair hearing is a must for all those who are believed to have committed crimes.

Yes, if they have no monies to hire lawyers to represent them, then the onus is upon the State to provide such services. They are citizens deserving to be treated with dignity and afforded their rights. All human beings deserve to be afforded fairness and equality before the law and citizens have rights to fair hearing by an independent and impartial tribunal including the courts of law.


The phenomenon of Blessers, prostitution, trafficking

Next he was buying her gifts like the latest smartphones and a tablet so she could do her assignments with ease. But now things had really blossomed between them and during the first semester vacation they both flew to Doha, Qatar where Sibongile went on a shopping spree of a lifetime. In return she does sexual favours for Sipho who says his wife is boring in that department.

Her mother La-Zwane* is furious about the way Sibongile is living her life and has threatened to disown her if she does not get rid of Sipho. She even went to the extent of calling Sipho and threatening to expose him through the media. Unfortunately, this has caused the relationship



between Sibongile and Sipho to go sour and Sipho is no longer paying much attention to her. He has now struck up a relationship with Thandi*, Sibongile's classmate. He has already beaten up Sibongile several times because of her mother's threats. The problem is Sibongile needs Sipho's money to finance the lavish lifestyle which he introduced to her so she will not even report the abuse and she still sleeps with him for the same reason. Sipho is a "blessee" and Sibongile is a "blessee".

In recent weeks everyone has been talking about the so-called blessers.

This term supposedly originated when several young women posted pictures of themselves shopping overseas, driving expensive cars or wearing expensive clothing. These women would then tag themselves as being

"blessed" on social media. This phenomenon has since gone viral, with many young women looking for older men to sponsor their expensive lifestyles. This of course comes at a price and that is sex.

These men, most of whom are married, may be blessing more than one woman too.

Concept

It is clear that the age-old sugardaddy concept has been re-packaged and sold as a brand new concept, called "Blesser" which is spreading on social media like wildfire. It can also be referred to as a modern form of prostitution since there is a "willing buyer" and a "willing seller" involved. The "blessee" is like a commodity. This is a dangerous phenomenon that could be a catalyst for human trafficking. For example, in the case of Sibongile and Sipho violence is now the order of the day and Sibongile is suffering. But because she is now a "slave" to Sipho's money she is not willing to report it. Sibongile is more than likely to end up dead. Thandi may also face the same problems in future. Whilst this blesser phenomenon may appear to be attractive to many young women it is actually a no-win situation and it completely downgrades women to the low status of being mere commodities.

Law enforcement agencies both in South Africa and Swaziland already regard this as thinly veiled prostitution and extremely dangerous for participants.

The Royal Swaziland Police have come out clearly to state that this new trend could easily escalate cases of human trafficking and have strongly condemned it. In fact even pastors have condemned this trend labeling it as blasphemous. Blessings are normally associated with Godly favour, but the term is now being misused.

Human traffickers can easily feel even more free to go about their dirty work if the term is being widely spread through social media. The rate at which this trend is spreading is more than likely to lead to an expansion of the prostitution market and at the same time increase human trafficking.

In the past, sugar daddies were already targeting high school girls and poor students but now social media now fuels the fires and enable the practice to flourish on a wider scale.

In this regard we cannot overemphasize the importance of parental care in the case of children, in particular girls. Parents MUST know who their children are talking to, especially on social media. The "privacy" label within the home must come to an end. For adult females who think they need "blessers" we encourage them NOT to take this dangerous route lest they face the dangers of rape, human trafficking and even murder.

DEATH TO TRAITORS' SAYS UK MP MURDER SUSPECT

ONDON - British lawmaker Jo Cox's alleged killer ranted against "traitors" during a brief court appearance yesterday, as EU referendum campaigning was suspended for a third day in tribute to her.

"Death to traitors, freedom for Britain," 52-year-old Thomas Mair said when asked to give his name at Westminster Magistrate's Court in London after being charged with murder, the Press Association reported.

Both sides in the deeply divisive campaign ahead of a referendum on EU membership on next Thursday have cancelled events amid calls for a less acrimonious political debate.

A member of the opposition Labour Party and former aid worker, Cox was an advocate for refugee rights and immigration and wanted Britain to remain in the European

Union.

She was shot and stabbed in the street in a daylight attack on Thursday in her constituency in northern England as she was heading for a meeting with local residents.

Although the motive is undetermined, some politicians and commentators have pointed to the heated referendum debate, where sensitive issues like national identity and immigration have featured prominently.

Prime Minister David Cameron and Labour leader Jeremy Corbyn on Friday brought bouquets to a floral tribute near the scene of the attack in Birstall in Yorkshire.

Cameron spoke out for "tolerance" and against "hatred" in British politics, saying the country was "rightly shocked" at the killing of the 41-year-old mother of two.

The murder, the first of a British member of parliament since 1990, has sent shockwaves around the world.

US President Barack Obama on Friday phoned Cox's husband Brendan to offer condolences.

"The president noted that the world is a better place because of her selfless service to others, and there can be no justification for this heinous crime," the White House said in a statement. *AFP*

Trump's 'Mexican' label against judge brings up slur history

ALBUQUERQUE - Presumptive GOP nominee Donald Trump referred to a USborn federal judge as a "Mexican" and saw a backlash, even from other Republicans. A black Democratic lawmaker called Republican New Mexico Gov. Susana Martinez a "Mexican" during a heated exchange with another lawmaker and was forced to apologise. John Calipari, then New Jersey Nets coach, faced criticism for lashing out at a Latino reporter by calling him a "Mexican idiot." True, the term "Mexican" describes a nationality for a people of a country south of the US. It also has been used as a slur against US-born Latinos as a way to dehumanise them and dismiss them as foreigners, according to scholars and those who've been targeted by the loaded word. AP

Cops detain elderly village leader

BEIJING – Authorities have detained a village chief in southern China ahead of a planned protest over land disputes, nearly five years after an uprising against corruption in the same village drew international attention. In yesterday's statement, Lufeng city police urged residents of Wukan village in Guangdong province to stay calm about the detention of 72-year-old Lin Zuluan. Prosecutors said they had opened a case on Friday against the village leader for suspicion of taking bribes. dpa

Rape, abuse stalk migrant children

LILLE - Migrant children stuck in slums on France's northern coast face a "permanent danger" of sexual abuse or exploitation, the UN Children's Fund has warned, urging the creation of protected areas for minors. "They fear going out at night, after dark, for fear of rape," UNICEF said in a hard-hitting report on unaccompanied children titled 'Neither Safe nor Sound'. The children's "living conditions..., the violence experienced on the road, the risks of border crossings, the monetary relationships in shanty towns, and forms of the resulting enslavement, constitute a permanent danger" at all seven sites covered in a recent study, UNICEF said. AFP

Peru ex-president taken to hospital

LIMA – Former Peruvian president Alberto Fujimori, serving a 25-year prison term for corruption and crimes against humanity, was transferred to a hospital Friday after experiencing high blood pressure and pain in his tongue. The 77-year-old has been in and out of the hospital in recent months for a series of health problems. Fujimori had "high blood pressure and severe pain in his tongue, so the prison doctor recommended that he be transferred to the hospital," prison service chief Julio Magan said. AFP

Four dead in Poland freak storms

WARSAW, POLAND – Violent storms killed four people and injured several others across Poland Friday, also leaving serious property damage in their wake, local media reported. A 61-year-old man died, crushed by a tree while driving his car in the central town of Zgierz. His two passengers were hospitalised in serious condition. Two other men also died, crushed by walls blown over by violent winds in the towns of Niechlonin in the north-west, and Zaluski in central Poland. *AFP*

Man killed while live streaming

HICAGO – A Chicago man was shot and killed while video streaming on social network site Facebook Live.

Wednesday's shooting, taking place just a few days after the Orlando, Florida massacre at a gay nightclub, was a stark depiction of the gun violence that has plagued the United States and fuelled a rise in murders in one of its premiere cities.

In the Facebook Live video, Antonio Perkins, 28, inadvertently captured his own murder. He can be seen broadcasting selfie-style on his smartphone, when suddenly about a dozen gunshots ring out in quick succession. The video failed to capture who is shooting, and its image is dark because the incident took place at 8:43 pm.

Perkins immediately drops the phone, after which there is only audio as panicked voices can be heard trying to keep the man alive.

"Oh my God!" a woman screams.
"Call the police! Hurry up!" a man says.
"Tony, you're good Tony," says another woman, talking to the victim.

Perkins died from gunshot wounds to the neck and head, according to police, who say they have made no arrests in the ongoing investigation.

Officials say Perkins was a documented gang member, but people who knew the man told Chicago TV station WGN that he was no longer in a gang and he was likely not the intended target of the shooting.

Zika spreading quickly in Puerto Rico

ASHINGTON –
The number of
Zika infections
appears to be increasing
quickly in Puerto Rico, US
health officials said Friday,
sparking fears that thousands
of pregnant women, and
their unborn children, could
be at risk.

So far in the United States, Puerto Rico, a US commonwealth in the Caribbean, is the hardest-hit area, with nearly 1 400 cases reported. In the continental US, a total of 756 cases have been reported. Among pregnant women, 234 women in the continental US have shown lab evidence of Zika infection, with or without symptoms, and 189 others have been counted in the US territories including Puerto Rico. Tom Frieden, the head of

the US Centres for Disease Control and Prevention, said the rise in infections in Puerto Rico could mean "in the coming months, it is possible that thousands of pregnant women" could be infected.

"This could lead to dozens or hundreds of infants being born with microcephaly in the coming year," he told a teleconference with reporters.

More than 60 countries and territories have been affected by the ongoing outbreak. Most of them are in Latin America, the Caribbean and the South Pacific.

The mosquito-borne Zika virus can cause the birth defect microcephaly, leading babies to be born with unusually small heads and deformed brains.

Frieden's projections were based on blood screenings done at donation centres in Puerto Rico.

Of the 12 777 tests done from April 3 to June 11, 68 came back positive, or 0.5 percent. But for the week ending June 11, 1.1 percent of the samples tested positive for the virus.

"Although the blood donors do not represent the general population, the increasing prevalence of blood donations that test positive for the virus likely reflects an overall increase in infection in the population at large," Frieden said. *AFP*

Olympic Brazil detects ISIS posts in Portuguese

RASLIA - Authorities in this year's Olympic host Brazil detected users exchanging messages in Portuguese linked to the Islamic State extremist group (ISIS) in an online web forum, intelligence services said on Friday.

The warning raised security concerns about the potential existence of sympathisers of the armed group in Brazil, which was previously thought to be relatively free of Islamic extremism.

Pre-Olympic jitters had already risen after a French jihadist warned on Twitter after deadly attacks in France last November that Brazil was the "next target".

The Brazilian Intelligence Agency said in a statement on Friday that it "confirms the existence of a group and its way of operating" online with jihadist messages.

It said the group was found on Telegram, an online messaging application.

"Content relating to extremist ideologies is translated to Portuguese and reproduced in that instant messaging application," the agency said. The group was first detected by the SITE Intelligence Group, a

non-government group that monitors extremist communications online.

SITE issued an alert saying that people linked to the Islamic State were thought to be spreading messages from the group in Portuguese. Brazilian authorities are on high alert ahead of the Olympic Games in Rio de Janeiro from August 5 to 21. They say more than 80 000 security personnel will police the Games.

That is twice the number deployed at the last Olympics in London in 2012.


"Of course it's unfair," Putin said during a meeting with jour-

Coates says IOC unlikely to overturn IAAF ban

ELBOURNE - IOC Vice-President John Coates says he doesn't think the International Olympic Committee will overturn an IAAF ban on Russia's track and field federation.

On Friday, the IAAF decided to uphold a competition ban on Russia, ruling the country had not met readmission criteria imposed when it was suspended last year over widespread statesponsored doping.

Coates, who is also President of the Australian Olympic Committee, said yesterday "we will consider it (overturning the ban) but I'd be very, very surprised ... it's an international federation's right to suspend a national federation and I don't



think we would overturn that at

Coates will attend a meeting in Switzerland on Tuesday, a summit called by the IOC to address "the difficult decision between collective responsibility and individual justice" over the Russia situation.

Rio 'broke' ahead of Olympic Games

IO DE JANEIRO - Rio state authorities declared a "state of public calamity" Friday over a major budget crisis in order to release emergency funds to finance the Olympic Games due to begin in August.

The decree authorises the state to "adopt all necessary emergency measures to ration essential public services in order for the Rio 2016 Olympic

Games and Paralympic Games to take place."

"Any institutional instability would hurt the country's image," said the decree, signed by acting Governor Francisco Dornelles.

The August 5-21 Olympics and September 7-18 Paralympics in Rio de Janeiro will be the first to be held in South America.

The events pose "serious difficulties in delivering essential public services and could even cause a collapse in public safety, health, education, transportation and environmental management," the decree said.

Rio de Janeiro state is in financial straits due to the fall in global oil prices, while Brazil overall is floundering through a deep recession.

Police, teachers and other government workers in Rio state have seen pay checks delayed because of the cash crunch. Retirees have protested because

of unpaid pensions.

Brazil's economy shrank 3.8 percent last year, its worst recession in 25 years. The International Monetary Fund and the market are predicting a similar contraction this year.

Amnesty International expressed concern at the cuts to social services, which could affect the training of security agents to work in the crime-ridden slums known as favelas.

Amnesty's Brazil Director, Atila Roque, said in a state-

ELLINGTON - New Zealand outscored Wales to remain unbeaten in the second of the three-match Test series when they won 36-22 in Wellington yesterday.

The win not only means that the All Blacks are 2-0 up in the three-match Test series after winning the opening Test in Auckland last week, but this victory also extends the All Blacks winning streak against Wales to 27 matches, the last time New Zealand lost to Wales was in 1953, and wraps up the series.

The home side outscored the visitors by five tries to three with Israel Dagg, Ben Smith, Beauden Barrett, Waisake Naholo and Ardie Savea getting over for the All Blacks, while it was Alun Wyn Jones, Liam Williams and Jonathan Davies who dotted down for Warren Gatland's men.

New Zealand flyhalf Aaron Cruden added one conversion and one penalty before being stretchered off, before replacement Barrett slotted three con-

US attempt to overturn Jones red card

OUSTON - The United States on Friday lodged a protest against the red card issued to Jermaine Jones that looks set to rule the key midfielder out of their Copa America Centenario semifinal.

US soccer announced the protest against Jones's red, and a yellow card against striker Bobby Wood, which also leaves him suspended for the semifinal, in a posting on Twitter.

Jones was given his marching

orders early in the second half of Thursday's 2-1 quarterfinal victory over Ecuador following a confrontation with Manchester United's Antonio Valencia.

The 34-year-old was issued with a straight red card after raising

his hands towards Valencia's face during the skirmish although replays suggested he barely made any contact with the Ecuadoran wide player. US coach Jurgen Klinsmann later described Colombian referee Wilmar Roldan's decision as a "disgrace."

"Unfortunately we lost Jermaine for that incident which is an absolute joke," Klinsmann said in a press conference.

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UEFA CHARGES CROATIA SOCCER BODY

ARIS — UEFA formally opened a disciplinary case against the Croatian soccer federation yesterday for racism and fan disorder at a European Championship match.

Play was stopped for several minutes late in Croatia's 2-2 draw with the Czech Republic in Saint-Etienne on Friday when firecrackers and lit flares were thrown on the field from one end of the stadium where its fans were sit-

Croatia fans then fought among themselves as players appealed for calm. UEFA's anti-discrimination monitors said Saturday they also reported hearing fans sing far-right songs and dis-

playing offensive banners at the stadi-

UEFA said the charges against Croatia related to racist behavior, crowd disturbances, throwing of objects on the field, and setting off fireworks.

The Croatian federation faces at least a five-figure fine when UEFA's discipli-

nary panel judges the case tomorrow.

It is the second round of charges involving Croatia fans in France. UEFA charged the federation over flares being lit and a fan running on the field to celebrate a goal with Croatia players in a 10 win over Turkey last Sunday. That case will be judged on July 21.

Croatia has a track record of disruptive fans at the European Championship.

Loew prefers old 16-team Euro to bigger version

ARIS - The old 16team Euro finals was better than the new expanded 24-team format because there were more big clashes from day one of the competition, Germany coach Joachim Loew said yesterday.

European soccer's governing body Uefa introduced eight more teams for Euro 2016, which led to the introduction of an extra last-16 round. As a result, some of the third-placed teams now join the top two from each group in the knockout rounds.

Previously, only the top two from the four groups advanced straight into the quarterfinals.

"The 16 teams was ideal. It made for great matches from day one." Loew, in charge for Germany for his third Euro, told reporters.

Introduction

"This is a different situation and a return to the old system is obviously not possible anymore. So we have to accept that."

The introduction of more teams has meant some smaller, less powerful footballing nations such as

Iceland and Albania have also qualified, arming themselves with populous

After 21 matches, only one team, Spain, have managed to score three goals in one game.

"There are teams playing ultra defensively. But they do that well. The smaller nations like Albania or Wales are defensively very well schooled. They see their chance in that, so that is why we had only up to two goals per game until yesterday's Spain win (3-0) over Turkey." Reuters

ARIS - Italy coach Antonio Conte admitted his surprise on Friday as the beaten 2012 finalists continued their dream start to Euro 2016 by marching into the last 16 of the competition.

An 88th minute strike from Brazil-born striker Eder, one of Italy's most disappointing players in an otherwise forgettable opening period, handed Conte's men a 1-0 win over Sweden after star striker Zlatan Ibrahimovic failed to spark for the Scandinavians.

In doing so, Italy ended a 16year wait to win their second game at a major finals — the last time they managed to do so was at Euro 2000 when they reached the final only to fall to David Trezeguet's golden goal winner for France.

Italy, looking to rebuild after two consecutive group stage exits at the World Cup, now have two straight wins after their impressive 2-0 victory over highly-fancied Belgium in

Alexander Zverev caused a major shock as he beat eight-time winner and top seed Roger Federer in the Halle grasscourt semi-finals yesterday. Error-strewn Federer's vulnerability on his favourite

surface could perhaps be explained by a back injury that made the 34-year-old miss last month's French Open, but this was not the build-up to Wimbledon that the Swiss ace wanted.

The 19-year-old Zverev triumphed 7-6 (7/4), 5-7, 6-3 to reach only his second ATP Tour final after being beaten by Dominic Thiem on clay in Nice last month.

The German could yet meet world number seven Thiem, 22, in the final again this time as the Austrian faces another home player in Florian

Mayer in yesterday's second semi-final.

The veteran Federer, a 17time Grand Slam winner, won the last three Halle Open tournaments but he met his match in the spirited world number 38.

Just over a week before the start of Wimbledon, it was the second semi-final defeat in a row on grass for the world number three after Thiem beat him in Stuttgart last week. Federer hasn't won a Grand Slam since Wimbledon in 2012 and given the form of world number one Novak Djokovic, Federer's current level would unlikely see that run come to an end.

The 1.98m (6'6") Zverev is already guaranteed to improve his career-high ranking in Monday's new list to inside the top 30.

He took the first set on a tie-break having lost just four points on serve and firing 14 winners. Federer earnt the first break of the match at 5-5 in the second with a sublime drop shot before finishing off the set with two service winners. But a backhand error from Federer gave Zverev the crucial break in the sixth game of the deciding set.

Federer was unable to battle back from there and he fails to reach the final in Halle for the first time in his last 11 attempts.

Zverev finished with 39 winners and eight aces while saving six of seven break points. It was Federer's first defeat to a teenager in almost 10 years, since current world number two Andy Murray beat him at the Cincinnati Masters in 2006.


