



SADC REITERATES HIS MAJESTY THE KING'S STANCE ON LESOTH

is Majesty's call for Basotho to decide on how to regain their political stability has been reiterated by the Southern African Development Community during the Extra-Ordinary Summit of Heads of State and Government held at Mandvulo Grandhall at Lozitha yesterday.

While at the Kingdom of Lesotho's 50th Independence Celebrations held at the Setsoto Stadium in Maseru last year, His Majesty said a lasting solution to address the political differences in Lesotho is one that has to come from the people.

Exclusive

During the event, His Majesty was speaking on behalf of invited heads of state and government, and he reportedly urged Basothos to find an exclusive place that could bring all stakeholders together to seek common ground on the existing impasse. At that time, the SADC Troika, which is an organ for defence and security in the region, was tasked with bringing about a lasting solution to the power struggles among this country's politicians.

The King, speaking to multitudes during the event, said the country needs to find home grown solutions to address all outstanding issues that may hinder the positive development and progress of the country, for the benefit of all Basotho.

She revealed that the Summit mandated Ramaphosa, supported by the Oversight Committee, to conduct a multi-stakeholder national dialogue before the elections set for June 3, with the aim of building consensus and trust among all stakeholders and charting the way forward for the implementation SADC

"Summit endorsed the convening of a Double Troika Summit soon after the new government is formed after the elections on June 3 to engage the new Government of Lesotho

decisions and the recommendations of the SADC Commission of Inquiry through a roadmap with clear timelines," said Tax, further adding that the engagement should emphasise the need to address the fundamental challenges, commitment to implement SADC decisions and the consequences of not implementing the decisions and observing timelines. The Summit further commended Ramaphosa for his continued support in assisting the Kingdom of Lesotho to achieve a lasting peace and political stability and the oversight committee for its diligence and professionalism.

Confidence

Lesotho's troubles reportedly surfaced again on March 1, when Parliament gave Prime Minister Pakalitha Mosisili a vote of no confidence, which was not the first one.

Mosisili replaced Thomas Thabane in 2015 who also got a vote of no confidence. During that debacle, according to news24, Thabane reportedly refused to step down in favour of Monyane Moleleki, a nominee preferred by his Alliance of Democrats party and the latest iteration of Lesotho's shifting coalition alliances that includes its members.

When King Letsie III was notified of the vote of no confidence, Parliament was dissolved on March 7.

As stated during the summit yesterday, new elections are planned for June 3, which will be the third ones in five years.

outh African Development Community (SADC) Chairperson, His Majesty King Mswati III, has called for all countries to create the environment necessary for enhanced economic growth in the region.

This he said was because all citizens looked up to their leaders to do that in order for there to be wealth creation, employment opportunities and an improvement in the general standard of living. The King was speaking during the opening of the Extra-Ordinary Summit of SADC Heads of State and Government held at Mandvulo Grandhall at Lozitha yesterday. In attendance were heads of state, ministers, SADC Secretariat as well as members of the media.

His Majesty said the SADC Industrialisation Strategy and Roadmap 2015-2063's action plan was critical in bringing to reality the desire to realise expectation of all citizens of member states. Recalling the way forward which was given to

ministers during the SADC 36th Ordinary Summit of Heads of State and Government in August, he said the task force was mandated to finalise the work on industrialisation action plan, "We are pleased to note that ministers have worked diligently and have come up with the work contained in the document before us today."

He stated that the task of heads of state and government was to ensure that the action plan would lead the region along the laid-out path. Calling for fast execution, he called for all to ensure that implementation of the strategy took centre stage.

"I have been advised that in finalising this programme, consideration has been given to ensuring there is proper sequencing of activities lined up for the

short, medium term and long term," His Majesty stated, further asserting that the approach recognised that there were activities that would start early in the programme but whose impact will be felt much later as the implementation of the strategy gains momentum.

Calling for private sector to buy into the implementation and financing of the strategy, the chairperson said there was joint effort and synergies required between the activities outlined in the strategy and action plan as well as activities in support of trade facilitation.

"There is also need for us to recognise the interdependence between activities that drive industrialisation, competitiveness and regional integration pillars of strategy."

SADC University on course

is Majesty King Mswati III has assured that the implementation of the University Transformation he announced during the SADC 36th Ordinary Summit of Heads of State and Government in August is on course.

Showing that the plan to establish the university was well thought out and would be implemented for long term benefits to the whole region, the SADC chairperson stated the concept note stipulating the governance, legal requirements and programmes would be submitted to the 37th Ordinary Summit of Heads of State in August.

Over the years, women and youth have lagged behind due to the traditional setup of most Southern African countries and with this in mind, His Majesty revealed the university will give hope to the community by strengthening the skills base while empowering the previously marginalised section of the population.

He said the university would also serve as a forum where regional youth would come together and improve each other through the sharing of ideas for the betterment of their countries.

"As SADC, we work together but there is lack of other forums in which regional youth can come together to get to know each other. When you work together, it then becomes easy to work together," he said. At the end of the summit, while delivering a summation of the deliberations which took place during the summit, Executive Secretary Stergomena Lawrence Tax said the heads of state and

governments noted the progress made on the preparations for the establishment of the university. She said the summit had directed the relevant structures to finalise its implementation and report back in August.

After the initial revelation that there would be a SADC University of Transformation, His Majesty King Mswati III, during the postsummit briefing which took place last August, the King had revealed that government was not alone on the idea, but had partnered with experts in the area who would provide more details on admission and the nature of courses to be undertaken. This was after he revealed that the university would have links with Limkokwing University of Transformation (LUCT) He said the reasoning behind having the university in Swaziland was borne after noting how most SADC leaders stated they had pursued their education in Swaziland, while others sent their children to local schools. He said this was an indication that the standard of education in the country was good.

During the revelation of the university idea, His Majesty announced that the Swaziland government would sponsor 300 of the first students to be admitted into the institution and these students would be made up of 20 from each SADC member state.








This picture shows the sitting arrangement inside the Mandvulo Grand Hall.

SHAREMAX INVESTORS

en out of the 150 investors who contributed over E27 million towards property shares in a South African scheme died bitter and broken by the prospect of having lost their life's savings.

"We don't know when people will get their money as we have not had clear responses from the Nova Property Group which took over Sharemax operations," the Chairperson of the investors, Benjamin Nsibandze said this past week.

"Three years after our last meeting with shareholders of several properties in South Africa, I cannot tell you as to when we will get our money," he said.

Recalling how the money was 'lost' to Swazis, Nsibandze recalled how Isambulo Investments, an insurance broker which was run by a recently deceased member of the King's advisory body Liqoqo, approached most employees of companies which were in the process of retrenchin or closing.

Packages

There were some individuals who were convinced by others who saw the benefits that came with investing money as initially, investors got their returns within a month of their buying shares into different buildings that were overseen by Sharemax.

However, within months of their buying shares, their hopes of getting rich were quashed when the South Africa Reserve Bank halted Sharemax operations pending investigation into irregularities in their operations. Since 2010, people who invested their retirement and severance packages have been waiting to hear as to what happened to their money, to no avail.

"It is unfortunate that several people have died, I can recall about 10 of them. These people died paupers whereas their investments lie in South Africa without them knowing when returns on investments will be had," Nsibandze said.

He said it was unfortunate that when they bought the shares, there was no provision for nomination of next of



kin or listing them as beneficiaries in the event of death.

"The last time we heard from Nova Property Group was in 2015," Nsibandze said.

NPG, according to Moneyweb, was a rescue vehicle set up after the collapse of Sharemax to try to save the R5 billion for about 33 000 investors, of which about 150 were Swazis, ploughed into the scheme.

Nsibandze alleged they had a meeting with the directors of the company which now owns the properties they bought into years ago.

Savings

"In the meeting, we could not get clarity on when we would get our money with the interest promised and what incensed us is that there were times the directors would converse with each other in Afrikaans, a language we do not understand," he said.

According to Nsibandze, what irked them about the use of the language was that they had been previously made to sign contracts drafted in the language which they blame on their current predicament.

"When I questioned them about the real purpose of the meeting as our mandate was to get clarification on when

we would get our money, the situation got tense and we were kicked out of the meeting," Nsibandze alleged.

He further alleged that while other members of the delegation, which included three soldiers who were members of Hlalawati Savings and Co-Operative Society which invested over E4 million of members' contributions as well as other pensioners, left the boardroom, he stayed behind to stand his ground and was sprayed with a substance in his eyes which allegedly rendered him blind.

Efforts to get collaborative information from NPG directors proved futile as when Corrie van Rooyen referred all questions to Chief Executive Officer Dominuque Haese.

Haese is a former secretary at Sharemax who now owns a large amount of shares

According to some of the local investors who availed their investment portfolios, Haese was the secretary who signed their share certificates.

Calls to Nova Property Group during the course of the week revealed Haese was out of the country and an email was sent which was however not responded to by the end of the day.

Meeting pending-FSRA&NOVA

here is a meeting scheduled where Swazis will get responses on their niggling worries concerning their money which 'disappeared' when Sharemax crashed.

Financial Services Regulatory Authority Chief Executive Officer Sandile Dlamini said, "There is a pending meeting with the curator company that took over Sharemax." He said there were people who they sent to get familiar with the state of the investments made by

When asked about the maturity of their investments, he stated that according to his knowledge, they had not as yet elapsed so as to warrant the panic by some of them.

"How many years were the investments for?" he asked and when he was told that some stated that they invested for 10 years, he said the time had not yet lapsed. He however stated that he did not know the number of years the investments were for and referred further questions to the committee.

Confirming knowledge of pending meetings between Swaziland and Nova Property Group, the Chairman, Corrie van Rooyen, said they had not been ignoring the local

investors. Called in Friday to ascertain the status of the money which was transferred into South African accounts by local investors, van Rooyen stated that they were in touch with the local bank.

However, after stating this, he stated that he was not mandated to respond to media responses and availed Chief Executive Officer Dominique Haese' email where an emailed questionnaire was sent on Friday evening.



Investors still not willing to tell their stories

he disappointment of having invested millions into a scheme that later turned doubtful has reds of Swazis unwilling to have their personal stories linked to it.

The list of investors has several prominent Swazis who invested amounts ranging from E100 000 all the way to E1 502 000.

Of the 15 called, none of them wanted to have their names linked to the Sharemax scandal.

"What hurts is that when the scheme fell through, we were told we had been part of a pyramid scheme whereas we did due diligence and really took our time to look at Isambulo Investment which we were told was legitimately registered. Do you know what having my name publicly linked with a pyramid scheme will do to my businesses as well as how people will view me?" a high ranking traditional leader said.

Investments

A businessperson of European descent said deciding to invest in the scheme was after exhaustive investigations. "Sharemax was 10 years old at the time of my paying my investment," she said. She stated that she further inquired from the Registrar of Insurance and Retirement Funds (RIRF) (now Financial Services Regulatory Authority) and was assured that Isambulo Investment was properly registered.

"I was disappointed when I was told this seeing as I invested hundreds of thousands into Sharemax," she said.



hilst the National Commissioner of Police, Isaac Magagula would be expected to lead by example as a law enforcer, he seems to be doing other-

He has defied an order of the court that ruled that police officer, Phindile Sibuko Sihlongonyane, be reinstated with full pay despite her still going through a court case after she was arrested for stealing dagga weighing 10.5kg at the Mbabane Police Station.

But, none of such has happened and she has not been paid any cent this month.

Arrest

This is despite civil servants, including police officers, having received their salaries this past week, but she was not paid, not even the half pay she had been previously been put on by the national commissioner.

Sihlongonyane was arrested togeth-

er with her fellow colleague in Alice Matsebula on November 28, 2016 after they were found to have stolen the dagga that had been kept as an exhibit under the watch of then Acting Station Commander, Amos Dlamini.

The duo was later granted E15 000 bail each by the High Court and after that, Magagula wrote a letter to both accused on February 9, 2017 where he informed them they had been interdicted from duty on half pay with immediate effect pending finalisation of the case.

However, the NatCom's decision was on February 28, 2017 reviewed and set aside by Judge Cyril Maphanga who ordered that Sihlongonyane's full salary be reinstated immediately, something which has not happened up to date.

Penalties

"The decision of the national commissioner of police to interdict the Applicant (Sihlongonyane) from duty on half pay is hereby reviewed and set aside. The Applicant's interdict stands. Applicant is interdicted from duty on full pay. The Applicant's salary be and is hereby reinstated forthwith," reads the order in possession of this newspaper.

Further, in the same letter, the national commissioner informed Sihlongonyane that the powers, privileges and benefits she is entitled to as a member of the police service shall be in abeyance during the suspension but she shall continue to be subject to the same responsibilities, discipline and penalties as if she had not been suspended.

He also stated that the decision to suspend her came after she had been taken through a disciplinary process within the police service where her legal representative made submissions on her behalf which were considered when the board made the recommendation to the police chief whip.

The duo is charged with theft, contravening the Pharmacy Act in that they dealt with dagga by way of sale or a similar transaction without a per-

On the other hand, Matsebula further faces an extra charge of being found in possession of the dagga while driving an Audi A4 motor vehicle registered OSD 328 BH.

Following their denial for relese on bail by the Mbabane Magistrate Sifiso Vilakati, they made an urgent application at the High Court. In their affidavits, Sihlongonyane claimed she was sickly and suffered from asthma, sinus and anaemia. She claimed to be a breadwinner with her child, sister and sickly mother depending on her, amongst the reasons why she wanted bail.

Matsebula, on the other hand, submitted that 14 people were dependant on her and therefore she had to return to work so she could fend for them. Indeed, former Principal Judge Stanley Maphalala, granted them bail.

My wife denied me conjugal rights for 3 years

C She has been denying me conjugal rights for the past three years." This is an allegation that has been made by Lenard Nxumalo whose vehicle was burnt to ashes by his wife who alleges he was cheating on her.

He was responding to an article published by our sister publication, the Swazi Observer daily, that was to the effect that his car had been set ablaze by Ncamsile Dludlu with the assistance of her brother and son on Saturday evening.

During an interview on Thursday at the Sunday offices, Nxumalo explained that the bone of contention was their relationship having gone sour to the extent that his wife denied him conjugal rights as means of 'fixing' him.

This is further alleged to have seen the couple's children turning against Nxumalo after their mother told them he was cheating on her.

Nxumalo, who had just been released from hospital a day earlier, expressed

his frustration at the act of burning his recently acquired vehicle which he said he was failing to come to terms with. At the peak of his dispute with Dludlu, he said he told his children of the troubles they were going through with their mother but they heard none of such.

"She told our children that I had become abusive towards her and as a result, they started having an attitude towards me and never appreciated or were not excited when I brought my vehicle at home after buying it with the assistance of my employer in December," he said.

In fact, his family members thought the car had been bought for him by a lover and was never welcomed by any of the family members since he bought

Further defending his stance, Nxumalo said things got to a point where he

decided to have a lover, something which was no secret in the family as he introduced her to his wife and chil-

dren in light of their dispute.

His wife allegedly doused her husband's car with petrol and set it ablaze at their home around Madlangemphisi. On this day he had brought his last born, born out of their relationship with the lover, to his mother in a different compound although in the same

He said it was later in the evening around 8pm when all hell broke loose and Dludlu allegedly called her brother who will not be named for ethical reasons and they assaulted him and burnt his vehicle as he lay helplessly on the ground.

He alleges it was his son who doused the car with petrol, his wife set it alight and when he tried to stop them, his brother in-law assaulted him and he was helpless. Members of the Royal Swaziland Police (RSP) were then called by the community and they took the alleged offenders for questioning wherein they face a charge of malicious injury

In the meantime, Nxumalo said he had not decided whether or not to lav charges against the trio.

Nxumalo further revealed that he did not know what to tell his employer concerning the vehicle they had just bought him.

He told this newspaper that the car was bought in December after an offer by his employer wherein an agrrement was reached that this bonus be used to deposit it with the balance being settled in instalments.

'I was sick when that happened'

he wife to Nxumalo, Ncamsile Dludlu, has disputed that she ever deprived her husband of conjugal rights, except when she was sickly for at-least six months.

She said she suffered from heavy bleeding and when she sought for her husband's assistance in terms of finding a way to help her, he allegedly told her, she was suffering from such because she had slept with other men.

Reasons

"I have never denied him such rights, not unless he is referring to the period when I was sickly for six months and could not do so for obvious reasons," she explained.

Burning the car was only solution – disgruntled wife

lthough she regrets her move, Ncamsile Dludlu is adamant that burning the car seemed like the only solution to their marital problems with her husband.

Dludlu said she believed all that was happening between her husband and herself was because of the car and getting rid of it was the only way she would have her husband back.

"I came to this conclusion after I had taken time to think about everything we were going through. It is then that I concluded that I needed to get rid of that car least I lose my husband," said Dludlu.

She explained that she came to this conclusion whilst on a bus headed for her marital home around Madlangemphisi after her husband had allegedly told her to wait for him and his lover at the Mbabane Bus Rank where they would pick her up at 9pm for a lift home, an offer she declined. She also said it was the things that had been said to her that made her take this decision.

Dludlu alleges the lover once asked her husband with her present if there was need to pay someone who had a lot of children and if having grey hair automatically qualified people for the elderly grants, both statements indirectly targeted at her.

On another note, the wife revealed that her husband once asked her to share his bed with the lover in his one roomed flat at Msunduza. This was after the woman had come for a sleepover only to find that he was with his lover. Conjugal rights should not be used as a way of putting a point across - Women and Law

On another note, Women and Law's Colani Hlatshwayo has condemned the use of conjugal rights by married women to put a point across.

In a relationship, no one should be forced into making a decision and there should be mutual agreements with whatever decisions that needs to be taken.

She said married couples should find a way of dealing with such as problems don't mean the end of such union and, "we also encourage open communication amongst couples and in the event that is impossible they must involve a third party to help resolve the dispute," she said.





POLICE WERE NOT LOOTING - KHULANI


hief Police Information and Communications Officer Khulani Mamba, has come to the defence of officers who were pictured with alcohol on Friday during the truck accident that happened at Malagwane along the MR3 high-

Contrary to numerous claims by members of the public that the officers were helping themselves to the destroyed alcohol carried by the truck, he has pointed out that they were not looting, instead they collected the alcohol to be kept as evidence and be given back to the truck company.

He said this yesterday in a telephonic conversation where he emphasised that the police had in no way looted the 'free booze,' instead they were only doing their job as law enforcers.

"Having collected the alcohol, it was then taken to the Mbabane Police Station where it is currently being kept as evidence," he explained.

Having said that, he then invit-

ed our news crew to see for them-

selves the alcohol where it is being kept as means of substantiating his assertion that the alcohol had not been looted by the police officers.

Indeed, the invitation was welcomed as this reporter paid the police station a visit where he was taken to the exhibits room where the alcohol was being kept. It is, however, worth noting that the quantity of the alcohol was disappointing as it did not reflect the expected collected quantity considering the load of the truck, which was sizeable.

After the truck accident, along the notorious Malagwane hill on Friday, members of the public circulated pictures of it on social media platforms such as Facebook and WhatsApp, amongst which was one of a female officer captured carrying two carry packs of Castle Lite.

Accident

The police officers were also at the accident scene standing on guard next to a sizeable quantity of the alcohol which was said to have been collected from the looters, although some still made away with huge quantities in the presence of the police.

Although not to imply that they were also involved in the looting, but a certain group of paramedics was seen bungling some into an ambulance, that is, carry packs of Castle Lite, but it was not established whether they surrendered these to the police or had kept them.

Further, Mamba condemned the members of the public who looted during the accident as he said such was a bad habit that needed to be addressed.

He reminded looters that engaging in such remained an illegal activity and all those who engaged in it could be arrested for such.


Once more, during the accident, police were seen detaining a group of looters who had collected huge quantities of alcohol from the scene. They were detained for a short period in a police van before they were subsequently released and warned against looting.

Police efforts to stop more looters were also in vain as some alighted from cars and public transport vehicles to help themselves on the free alcohol.

As means of carrying the alcohol, they used the very same covers found on the truck, as well as crates, whilst some came with buckets and cooler boxers.

As per reports, the truck driver lost control of the huge vehicle as he was descending the hill towards the Manzini direction and it hit the concrete barriers and a Mercedes Benz before it overturned.

The overturned truck closed both lanes going out of the capital and this led to an at-least six-hour long traffic jam, which saw motorists opting for the Gobholo-Buka route or driving via Mhlambanyatsi.

espite being given a 30-day ultimatum to switch their allegiance or face the music, the Velezizweni Chiefdom still maintains that they were allocated part of Farm 482, therefore, their traditional boundary is marked by Umthunjwa River.

This chiefdom has been instructed to change their allegiance to the Macudvulwini Chiefdom by the traditional authorities. However, the acting chief of the area, Mduduzi Dlamini, insists that the previous chiefs of the area, from Prince Ndwandwe I to the late chief Ndwandwe II, were shown by the elders and forefathers the boundary to be the river not the perimeter of the farm.

He told this newspaper that it has never happened in the history of the country to have chiefdoms having a perimeter of a farm as a boundary rather a river, a mountain, rock or stream. He finds it worrying to learn that poles (tikhonkwane) marking the end of a farm have now turned out to be a boundary as stated by those in favour of the Macudvulwini Chiefdom.

He highlighted that this was not the only farm bought to give way to development projects or plantations as in other areas the same happened but that did not change the boundaries of the chiefdoms.

"We had always lived in peace, sharing the land with the other chiefdom until in 2002 when a Dlamini man from Macudvulwini decided to stand for elections in

He said while the matter was discussed at the Swazi National Court, the Macudvulwini people brought an old man who testified against them as he stated they were not aware of the original boundary (umncele wemdzabu).

Velezizweni Headman Obed Mabuza, whose homestead is also

the following year. He wanted to located in the farm, says he is not Velezizweni Chiefdom where they threatened by the directive as he is aware no one owns the land except the King.

He says since he is a subject to the King, there is nothing to be worried about. According to Mabuza, King Sobhuza II sent a Hlophe head man who told them they were to share the farm with the Macudvulwini Chiefdom.

An elderly man (umsumpe) of Velezizweni says when the farm was bought by King Sobhuza II for the Macudvulwini people who were relocated to give way to the plantations in the 1940s, there were already people who occupied it. He also stated that these were farm dwellers who looked after sheep in the farm and belonged to the paid allegiance so did their descen-

Acting Ludzidzini Governor Timothy Velabo Mtetwa was at the Macudvulwini Chiefdom a fortnight ago to give the directive to the 38 families affected by this boundary dispute. However, it is believed that the meeting was attended by only 10 families.

Chiefdom

The instruction was that these families, which are located on Farm 482, should switch allegiance from Velezizweni to Macudvulwini as he said the area they occupy belongs to Macudvulwini.

The alternative was that they should have vacated to a chiefdom of their choice within a month. These residents are expected to pay allegiance to the Macudvulwini Umphakatsi and change their national documents to bear the Macudvulwini Chiefdom particulars.

This news came as a shock, despite that the matter has been discussed and arbitrated at different levels for almost 15 years as it started in 2002. At each forum, the adjudicators issued the same judgement that has always been appealed by the Velezizweni Chiefdom and the affected families.

The acting chief has promised that the Velezizweni Umphakatsi will support and do all it can to ensure the welfare od its subjects. He said they respect the authorities of the land and were not defy-


Her assertion was to the effect that striking students were ungrateful and if she had a whip she would beat all the students and tell them to go back to class.

Limkokwing University of Creative Technology (LUCT) **Public Relations** Student Mciniseli Kunene has taken exception to Gciniwe Fakudze's assertion that students who had engaged on boycott of classes were ungrateful. A snapshot of Gciniwe and Mciniseli's conversation.

When called for comment, Fakudze said she did not believe this warranted a story and could only clarify her statement with the student who had a problem with it.

"I believe the student is the rightful person to talk to if you need anything and not me," she added.

Further, in an interview with the Sunday Observer, Kunene revealed that a proposed follow-up meeting between the two had not yet taken place because he was not sure as to who should contact who,' but he said he had decided that he would make the effort to contact the CEO so she gets to set the record straight regarding her statement.

Asked why he had elected to respond to such, Kunene said it was because although the statement had been directed to the University of Swaziland students but it touched on him as well because, "what touches UNISWA touches everyone.'

He said Fakudze was confusing them for beggars, yet it was government's responsibility that they are provided with scholarships and that comes with the provision of student allowances which are most of the time top of the list of student grievances.

"People should not make it as if the government is doing us a favour with scholarships," he added as he pointed out that students were the government's responsibility just like the elderly were in as far as the elderly grant is concerned more-so because the kingdom was a developing country where their parents were lowly paid and can barely afford their tertiary education hence government has to assist them.

Kunene stated that as students they were the future hence government should prioritise their education and do away with the mentality portrayed by the CEO.

He went on to state that Fakudze was a role model to the youth, himself included, and was aware of the fact that she became a CEO at a tender age hence they looked up to her. But he noted it was wrong of her to attack students in front of pupils who will soon be headed for the university and go through the same frustrations of boycotting classes.

Before he was enrolled at Limkokwing, he also had a problem with the unrelenting boycotts as he did not understand why they were happening until he was admitted and had to go for months without the allowances, let alone the nonconducive environment they were learning under.

'If you corner a black mamba, it will bite you," meaning as students they are compelled or cornered into boycotting classes by the conditions they are subjected to by the government and sometimes the institution's management.

On another note, Kunene said the CEO's statement simply means she supports police brutality against stu-

He makes reference to the case of Ayanda Mkhabela, who was run over by a police casspir during a boycott of classes last year, as well as another incident where students from the

ing their directive but request that their side be also heard and if possible be allowed to appeal.

He said the last time they were summoned to Ludzidzini they humbly informed the governor that they were not content with the verdict.

Belonged

Dlamini said they then requested that they be given a copy of the letter confirming that the land belonged to the Macudvulwini people which was said to be from the then principal secretary in the ministry of agriculture, which up to today, they have not been shown.

The acting chief said they needed the letter as they would present it to the King in order to take the matter further, indicating that they plan to appeal

the decision to have them change their chiefdom. In Swazi Law and Custom, this is called kwembula ingubo.

He also stated that they were not contacted by the governor and his delegation when they called the residents to the meeting last week.

Message

"We have not been consulted but only learned from the media that the governor was here. He should have addressed the Velezizweni Umphakatsi not the subjects.

It should have been the chiefdom that then related the message to the subjects," said the acting chief.

The acting chief says he will do everything in his powers to assist the affected families if they finally vacate the land they currently occupy.

or years, school going children have allegedly been indoctrinated in something called Swazi Traditional Religion which has, however, been disowned by traditionalists.

According to Prince Masitsela, a senior member of the royal family, the only religion that Swazis have practised since King Somhlolo has been Christianity.

He said he was not aware of what Swazi Traditional Religion could be as Swazis, by virtue of being Christians, recognised God as their creator and saviour. "Site inkholelo yetfu," he said.

According to history, King Somhlolo, who was also known as Sobhuza, I was king of Swaziland, from 1815 to 1836. He dreamt of the arrival of white skinned people with straight hair who he said bore two objects, a book (scroll) and money. He advised the nation to embrace the book as it came with life. This dream was later translated to mean the nation should embrace Christianity.

"Mvelinchanti is God," Prince Masitsela clarified, adding the use of the local word to identify God did not mean there was any other deity that the country recognised.

He clarified that *Mvelinchanti*, the one who was before everything else, is the supreme deity of the Swazi people whereas *Mlentengamunye*, who historically manifested himself to young children was in fact the Holy Spirit, which was identified in that form.

"King Somhlolo gave us a mandate, a roadmap on religion," he said, adding how the mandate was to choose God over the love of money, "Sadly, there are some people who now compromise the lives of others and move away from truthful undertakings all in the name of money. Umuntfu abone i-briefcase legcwele imali bese uyesuka eqinisweni."

He clarified that there was a difference between the love of money, which tends to corrupt, and making money in order

"I am not saying people should shun money making initiatives. Instead, they should engage in honest business because after all, money ensures that a person has a way to live," he said, before reiterating that the history of the country was strongly embedded in the Christian faith.

On the other hand, the senior prince explained that ancestors (emadloti) were not worshipped.

"We remember them as family members who have died before us and we live with the hope that we will see them when they get resurrected at the coming of Jesus Christ our Saviour."

His views were supported by Acting Ludzidzini Indvuna Timothy Velabo (TV) Mtetwa.

"There is no Swazi Religion," Mtetwa emphasised.

He categorically explained that the festivals and ceremonies that the nation took part in were cultural, (with the exception of Incwala) and were the identity of the

Country.

He explained that Incwala was the nation thanking God of its first fruits and pray-

ing for good harvests.
When asked to clarify why the part of

Swazi Traditional Religion as taught in the past

ccording to a Grade Three and Grade Five books that this publication was able to get, Swazi Traditional Religion speaks of one God, Mvelinchanti and his messenger, Mlentengamunye.

The books state that ancestors are not worshipped but are honoured with the belief they act as intermediaries between the living and God.

The books further stated that the religion practised locally was passed on through story telling and ceremonies that the nation attends.

Stating how the religion has pros and cons, the books delved into them. Some of the pros for Swazi Traditional Religion include that the beliefs help to unite people as they get to know what their role is in the community and where they belong.

Swazi Traditional Religion has been opted out of the new syllabus, Minister of Education and Training Dr Phineas Magagula said he did not like to delve into the matter as it then gets blown out of proportion by the media.

"We talked Religious Education from 2pm until 7pm the other day in Parliament and I would not like to talk about it today," he said on Thursday.

"Asifuni kudvunga bantfwana ngetinkholelo letingasito tetfu (we don't want to mislead children with religions which we don't subscribe to as a nation)," he said.

He called for parents to be proactive in teaching their children religion as there were different preferences on religious observance. Other advantages include indigenous knowledge as passed on during traditional ceremonies while traditional healers helped people deal with things and situations overwhelming them.

Over and above their helping abilities, traditional healers were said to be the bridge between mortals and the spirit world and they were hence traditional leaders of note.

Secrecy

On the other hand, disadvantages of Swazi Traditional Religion were the fact that most rituals were shrouded in secrecy, which then gave birth to assump-

Over and above that, the fact that there was no documentation about how the said religion should be practised, had resulted in it dying with the old folk who practised it over the years.

A parent, who was expressing relief for the new Christian only syllabus, said her son would come back confused.

"We are traditional at home and have never worshiped ancestors. So last year, my son would come back and ask me about some of the things he learnt and he was confused.

For the sake of having him pass the subject, I failed to dispute how the Buganu Festival was a form of worship as I have always known it to be a festival celebrating the fruit where dancing and merriment is the order of the day from the arena to the late night dancing with Their Majesties," she said, adding how she was shocked that traditional healers were perceived to be religious leaders in the books.

DIGITAL MIGRATION FOR THIS YEAR'S CENSUS

his year's census will be the first to employ computer based mobile equipment in the form of electronic tablets.


This is expected to improve efficiency and reduce human error.

The 2017 Population and Housing Census is unique because computer-based mobile equipment for data collection will be utilised, thereby developing national capacity for the collection and analysis of census data through the use of digital technologies.

About 3 000 electronic tablets have been loaned from the Department of Statistics in South Africa to facilitate this digital migration while UN agencies donated 35 tablets and GIS equipment and accessories worth E600 000 to the ministry of economic planning and development.

This was revealed by United Nations Population Fund Communications Officer Phumzile Dlamini, who further mentioned that a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) is being finalised with finer details on the conditions and terms of this arrange-

She explained that the tablets and

the rest of the digital equipment would be used for data collection, to improve the efficiency of the data collection process, as well as enable quicker transmission of field data to the Central Statistical Office for processing and

Dlamini added that more recently, apart from United Nations Population

Fund (UNFPA), other UN agencies have contributed towards supporting additional mobile equipment, technical assistance, and materials for census publicity and communication.

Agencies

These agencies are United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), World Health Organisation (WHO), and World Food Programme (WFP).

When asked if there would be no challenges in using the gadgets caused by lack of knowledge on the part of the enumerators, Dlamini assured that there shall be training of both the supervisors and the enumerators.

"Training on the use of these tablets is an ongoing process. Since October 2016, the Central Statistical Office has trained over 100 staff, both permanent and temporary, which is currently using the gadgets to collect basic household information as part of preparatory works for the census. Training on the use of mobile technology for supervisors and about 2 400 enumerators will also be conducted in March through April 2017," she revealed.

Census

She also highlighted that some officials were sent to Senegal where they were trained and had first hand experience of the digital census. Dlamini also stated that Swaziland was the second, after Lesotho, to migrate to a digital census, in the East and Southern Africa region, and the fifth in the African continent.

"In Senegal, for example, the digi-

tal migration greatly improved the release time of census results. As part of strengthening national capacity for undertaking digital-based censuses and survey, in April 2016, UNFPA supported a Swaziland team to travel to Senegal for an information and experience exchange," she said.

Remarks

UNFPA Representative, Sharareh Amirkhalili, making her remarks during the handover of the 35 tablets, said UN agencies stand ready to provide the necessary technical support to ensure a successful population and housing census which left no one behind.

"UNFPA warmly welcomes this shift towards the use of computer equipment for data collection because this will improve efficiency in many fronts; firstly, this will minimise human error often encountered during data collection, secondly this will greatly reduce the waiting time before the release of preliminary findings and finally contribute to overall improved data quality," she said. Every 10 years, since 1966, the Government of Swaziland, conducts a Population and Housing Census, the largest national data undertaking which provides demographic and socio-economic data on every person who is resident in Swaziland at the time of the census. The last national Population and Housing Census was conducted in 2007, and the country is now in the preparatory phases for the 2017 census to be conducted between the months of April and May.

Judge orders liquidation of Vikela Insurance Brokers

udge Nkululeko Hlophe has hit the last nail to Vikela Insurance Brokers' coffin following his judgment that the company be liquidat-

This has brought about the uncertainty on whether the at-least 1 100 members will get their monies back or not following the judgment issued on March 9.

The judgment comes two years after the Financial Services Regulatory Authority (FSRA) ran to the High Court for an order to liquidate the insurance provider because they did not comply with the provisions of the FSRA Act of 2010.

They also wanted the company's bank accounts to be frozen until the liquidation and both wishes by the regulatory body were duly granted by the judge.

"I hereby make the following order; placing Vikela Insurance Brokers under compulsory liquidation as envisaged by Sections 65 (i) (a) and 73 (2) (a) of the FSRA Act of 2010 as read with Section 287 (i) and 289 (i) (b) of the Companies Act of 2009 be and is hereby granted," ordered the judge.

Apart from these wishes being granted, the Respondent (Vikela) further has to foot the bill of the proceedings.

The application to liquidate the company by FSRA was after it was found to be illegally operating an insurance business when they did not have the licence to do so.

The illegality was based on both the Insurance Act of 2005 and Financial

Services Regulatory Act No.2 of 2010, which are the legislations that govern or regulate this kind of business operated by the Respondent and had to be complied with, therefore.

The Respondent was alleged to be operating illegally since 2010 after its Insurance Broker Licence was revoked by the applicant (FSRA) for failure to comply with the dictates of the Insurance Act notwithstanding their being peremp-

License

Briefly, the company operated an insurance business without a licence and without being properly registered. Prior to that, the company had been issued with an Insurance Broker Licence on certain conditions and was valid for one year, but after this period elapsed, the respondent failed to meet

The conditions were to the effect that they would fill in and submit forms ceding the Fidelity Guarantee to the registrar of the Applicant, submit audited financial statements within a certain period and lastly, that when the company indicated an intention to provide or market a different product, it was to provide a local underwriter for the said business, which it failed to do.

Insurance

This resulted in the revoking of the licence and instead of closing down the business, Vikela continued to operate under the pretext they were now offering legal assistance only.

With regards to this, FSRA argued in court that it discovered in late 2014 that the Respondent had continued providing an insurance business, albeit illegally as it was neither registered nor licensed to carry out such.

Whilst on the other hand, Vikela claimed to have been conducting a Legal Consultancy business, but inves-

Consumers have to be protected - 'Bhanyaza'

he decision to liquidate Vikela Insurance Brokers has been welcomed by the Swaziland Consumer Association Chairman Bongani 'Bhanyaza' Mdluli.

He said he believed consumers had to be protected from such establishments and by means of the judgment it means courts were doing all they could to protect them.

"Even though I am still to read the whole judgment and see the reasons advanced by the judge, but from the face of it, we really welcome it as the Consumer Association," stated Mdluli.

He said this was more-so because there were lots of people who were taking policies with the hope of get-

ting profits without considering the validity of the particular establishment. The chairman further appreciated the pro-activeness by the FSRA to protect the consumers, which he encouraged to continue with its good work for the interest of consumers in the country

Policies

In addition, he advised members of the public who want to join policies to seek for advice from FSRA first. He said he believed the regulatory body had a department that sought to assist consumers and should make use of it to so that the public does not fall prey to fraudulent schemes.

tigations by FSRA proved the former

In the latter business, it was claimed that members of the public paid certain amounts of money on a monthly basis for possible future legal services, staggered in such a way that a certain amount of cover would be availed for a certain specified service.

However, on March 27 2014, acting on reports the FSRA, conducted an investigation to ascertain the kind of business ran by the Respondent and it was discovered that the Certificate of Incorporation stated the Respondent's name as, 'Vikela Insurance Brokers Proprietary Limited.'

The Memorandum of Association stated its main objectives as being, "to carry on business as insurance brokers and agents and underwriting

agents in all classes of insurance and as insurance advisers." Its trading name was, 'Vikela Legal Insurance.

Further, the licence was for estate agents, business broker and employee agents and was valid until December, 31, 2014, whilst there were also membership cards which bore the words, 'Vikela Legal Insurance' on the front and 'Vikela Insurance Brokers' on the

There were as also a tariff of fees payable to the attorneys the Respondent would instruct in a particular matter as and when the need arose. These were either for civil or criminal matters and were referred to as, "cover."

In addition, there were membership forms which detailed the various products on offer and the payable, "premiums."

ATUSWA, FASHION INTERNATIONAL IN A TUG OF WAR

he Amalgamated Trade Union of Swaziland (ATUSWA) and textile firm, Fashion International are embroiled in a battle over worker related issues.

The bone of contention is subscription fees, amongst the many issues, which the Matsapha based company allegedly does not want to solicit from its workers on behalf of the union as part of the agreement between the union and the workers that the latter will contribute monthly subscriptions to the former in return for representation with regards to industrial matters.

However, the company is disputing such allegations which they claim have come as a surprise to them considering the fact that there is a pending court case which emanates from the very same dispute.

Through their Productions Director, Vic Royce, the company asserted it was untrue that the company denied its employees the right to subscrip-

They added that, "There is currently an application before court. Upon the courts direction, a verification exercise was conducted by CMAC, the employer noted that although employees overwhelmingly voted in favour of union participation, CMAC did not properly conduct the exercise by verifying the percentage of paid up members amongst employ-

This was also raised by the presiding Judge in open court with regards to the manner in which the ballot had been conducted, claimed Royce.

The assertion by the company was in response to a statement by ATUSWA where they made their frustration known regarding their stance with the company in light of the numerous efforts to engage the company on the matter proving futile.

In the statement, the union appeals to the buyers of the textile firm namely; Edcon, Traclo International and David Jones to remind their supplier of its obligation as per their code of conduct and that workers rights cannot be sacrificed for the purpose of maximising profits as workers are



also human beings after-all.

Through the Deputy Secretary General, Zweli Sihlongonyane, they also point out that their mandate remains to be representing the interest of their members and exchanging statements with the management is not part of that but have been pushed to the point where they have to raise their voices.

Process

This is because they allege it has been seven months now since Fashion International refused to have a frank and honest interaction with them.

During this period, the company allegedly refused to accept stop order forms which have led in the union losing much needed revenue, although they pointed out that they have in the process gained significant support from the workers such that they now have close 1 700 verified members in a company that boats just above 1 800 workers.

If the company does that, the union committed that in the event less than half of their members do not submit back the stop order forms, they will then terminate their recognition even though they want full bargaining rights.

Giving a brief background on the matter, the union alleged that despite numerous efforts to meet with the management of the company, their wish was finally granted on September, 13, 2016 where the management was

led by the managing director (MD). In this meeting, the union submitted a list of 1 390 members and original stop order forms in favour of the union which the employer refused to take.

Instead, Fashion International allegedly insisted that the union conducts a verification exercise on the new members which was declined on the basis that the exercise would be unnecessary since the union was recognised by the company and that verification is normally done prerecognition.

Therefore, it would not have been honest for the company to insist that the union engage in such an exercise which would have seemed like they were negotiating for recognition which was not the case.

When this was communicated to the employer, the latter is alleged to have then changed tune and claimed that it would be unfair to verify their stop order forms when another union had also applied for recognition and further to that the employer stopped making deductions from previous members of the union.

Seeing that the two parties were not reaching a common ground, the union claims to have then instructed a deputy sheriff to serve the company with the forms for the purposes of making the deductions on November, 4, 2016, however the deputy sheriff was turned back because he had not brought an appointment letter.

Refused

However, he subsequently returned four days later and this time around was refused entry and that was followed by the instruction of an attorney who made an application at the Industrial Court to compel the employer to receive the stop order forms.

During the court case, the two parties' legal representatives are alleged

...DISPUTES FORCING WORKERS TO WORK WHEN SICK

n the same response to the subscription allegations, Fashion International also made it a point that they clear the air with regards to allegations made by the union that workers were forced to come to work even when they were

"These allegations are false. As indicated, employees are allowed time of to deal with illness but also any form of personal emergency, such as a child's sickness. All that is required is that the employee notify the employer either by sending a message through a relative or a fellow employee or by telephone that they are unable to come to work," explained Royce.

She added that, often however, employees would decide that rather than sending a message, they will personally attend at the workplace to inform the employer with their child before going to the medical

centre. This is however not a company requirement. In addition, the company also set the record straight that no employees were forced to work overtime and employees were obliged to work reasonable overtime in terms of their conditions of employments as it is the case in almost all the manufacturing indus-

Overtime

Nonetheless, employees were requested on each occasion to work overtime and were allowed to decline. No employee has ever been disciplined for declining to work overtime. Also, Fashion International cleared the air regarding alleged unfair dismissals, for which they claimed to have a detailed disciplinary code and grievance in place which is applied by trained management supported by the company's Industrial Relations consultant.

to have applied for a consent order directing the Conciliation, Mediation and Arbitration Commission Swaziland (CMAC) to conduct a secret ballot which worked towards the union's advantage but was still not respected by the company.

However, it is worth noting that all these allegations were disputed by the company which claimed that these came as a shock to them and were particularly disappointing not only because of the fact that they were patently false but because they came at a time when the union and the company were engaged in discussions on negotiating the unions recog-

The company further claimed that the allegations of racism were unfounded and no attempt was even made to substantiate them and they were clearly made, merely for effect.

They also pointed out that despite allowing the ballot to go unchallenged, they proposed that they enter into negotiations with the union on drafting a substantive recognition agreement and it is in light of these developments that the allegations made by the union come as a complete surprise to them.

Girl raped by dad counselled

Matter "She is still trying to deal with the matter being out in the open," her mother said.

On the other hand, Jeremiah

Magongo*, the man who was accused by his daughter of raping her as form punishment was on Thursday questioned at the Mbabane Police Station and released conditionally.

Release

According to well-placed sources, the man's release was pending further investigation by the office of the Director of Public Prosecutions (DPP).

"He was called by the police and he made his way to Mbabane where he stated his side of the story," a source

When called for an explanation on what was happening with the case, Chief Police Information and Communication Officer Superintendent Khulani Mamba confirmed that investigations were yet to be completed.

Allegation

According to a source at the office of the DPP, they will further investigate the allegation with the intent of gathering collaborative information in order to have an arrest warrant.





ZILLE SUGGESTS HER COMMENTS TAKEN OUT OF CONTEXT

APE TOWN – Western Cape Premier Helen Zille, who's at the centre of controversy over a tweet claiming there were positives to colonialism, suggests her comments were taken out of context.

Zille will be the subject of an investigation by the Democratic Alliance (DA)'s Federal Legal Commission after she tweeted that the legacy of colonialism was not only negative.

During a discussion at the Knysna Literary Festival on Friday, the premier reiterated she was not defending colonialism but rather pointing out how Singapore has built a successful economy despite being affected by imperialism.

In a video taken by the Knysna-Plett Herald, Zille addressed the issue, saying she doesn't understand why people were angry.

"The independent Judiciary is an extraordinary bulwark against power abuse. The separation of powers, the very concept is colonial legacy. I didn't think that was controversial. An independent Judiciary took a thousand years to develop in the most advanced countries."

Zille also told the gathering she was hoping to ignite a debate on the matter not attract controversy.

"When I go abroad and see a whole

new world debate around these issues and see the entire literature out there, this entire literature on colonialism by different countries and what it meant and what the legacy was. I think can't we actually engage these discussions?"

Meanwhile, DA Federal Chairperson Athol Trollip on Friday was the latest to distance the party from comments made by former leader Helen Zille

Trollip said public figures have to be aware of people's sensitivities.

"Remember that we are a very diverse society and we need to be

sensitive and mutually respectful towards each other. If you are a public representative, whatever you say or write down, you need to take responsibility for it."

He also warned of the dangers of 140-character tweets because there's not room for context.

"The tweets have caused a lot of offence [as] colonialism was a phenomenon in the world at a certain time and it came with a lot of prejudice, oppression and a lot of exploitation. It also left a bitter taste in many of people's mouths."

The convention was first disrupted after students refused to let AfriForum speak first as per the prior agreement that all stu-

dent delegations will have a turn to talk in alphabetical order.

Moseneke said in his opening address that they are serious about creating a safe space for dialogue, but this requires a certain level of discipline and pre-

paredness to listen to others.

EFF Ekurhuleni Chairperson Mampuru Mampuru told News24 that ANC approached the party's members after they started singing on the council floor.

"The Speaker was trying to push

through a vote by [show of] hands, to keep the mayor in his position, without EFF and DA councillors voting," he said.

"It was then when the [ANC]

councillors charged at us."

Ekurhuleni ANC spokesperson Thabang Mashiyane said the confrontation followed an EFF member disrupting the voting procedure. "Let us be quite clear that it [the confrontation] was not initiated by the ANC," Mashiyane said. *News24*

Mantashe adamant Lungisa should resign

OHANNESBURG - Andile Lungisa's ambitions to lead the ANC in Nelson Mandela Bay could be dead in the water.

ANC Secretary-General Gwede Mantashe is sticking to his guns in the party's stand-off with the newly elected Nelson Mandela Bay chairperson.


The party awaits Lungisa's response to its demand for him to step down.

Mantashe has warned that allowing him to stand for election to a structure lower than the ANC provincial executive committee (PEC) on which he serves would set a precedent that would deplete the party's leadership at various levels.

Mantashe said the ban on PEC members standing for election to lower structures is not spelt out explicitly in the ANC constitution.

"That constitutional provision talks of one way, it doesn't say you have a choice of resigning in the lower or higher," said Mantashe. "It says you will resign in the lower organs. That's what the constitution says.

"Then you go to the NEC [national executive committee]. We give it a meaning that says nobody in higher organs should be allowed to stand for election in lower organs and that interpretation

has been tested, it is now practice."

Mantashe said it was that interpretation that had previously scuppered NEC member Bheki Cele's ambitions to lead the Ethekwini region.

Lungisa's election violated the party's constitution and there was a very good reason why Lungisa couldn't be allowed to get away with it, he said.

"I'm the secretary-general of the ANC, there's a conference in December. I can read the balance of forces and see that I have no chance of being re-elected general secretary of the ANC. I go stand in a provincial structure, I get elected to the PEC," Mantashe explained.

"By the time we arrive in that conference in December, there'll be nobody left in the NEC because people will preempt that situation, go to the provinces and disappear.

"An 86-member NEC will arrive in the December conference being a 40 member NEC. It can't be allowed, it just can't be allowed, it's bad practice."

GHANA PRESIDENT DEFENDS APPOINTMENT OF 10 MINISTERS

CCRA - Ghanaian President Nana Akufo-Addo has ▲defended his controversial decision to appoint a 110-minister government, calling it a "necessary investment" in the small west African country.

The new government nominated on Wednesday -- which includes dozens of lower-level and regional ministers -- is a record for Ghana and has sparked a storm of commentary on social media and radio talk shows.

"I'm aware that people are concerned about what they see as maybe the cost of this large government," Akufo-Addo admitted in an interview on national television on Friday.

"It is a necessary investment to make." Akufo-Addo, who was elected in December on a promise to fix a host

of economic problems and fight corruption, stressed that his ministers "are coming to work, it is not going to be a holiday".

And he insisted the cost would not be as high as people might think. "The number, for instance, among

the deputy ministers - 42 out of 50 are all parliamentarians and, in effect, AFP

converting them from parliamentarians into ministers, the marginal cost of that transformation is minimal in terms of the public exchequer," he said.

The ministers were needed for the "rapid transformation of this country", Akufo-Addo said.

George Lawson, Deputy General Secretary of the opposition National Democratic Congress (NDC), told AFP that the increase in the number of ministers was "not proper" and charged that Akufo-Addo was giving out "jobs for the boys".

"It's a drain on the Ghanaian economy," he added.

Akufo-Addo came to power in January after beating the NDC's John Dramani Mahama in December's election.

Man whose brother 'killed in Zim election violence' manhandled

ARARE - If you want evidence that Zimbabweans are united in their hopes for change and justice, this is not where you're going to see it.

"Appalled", "This is what happened in my village" are some of the reactions to a video posted to Facebook by opposition MP Jessie Majome that shows the silencing in public this week of a man whose brother was killed by alleged ZANU-PF supporters in Zimbabwe's 2008 election violence.

The clip shows the man - named by Majome as Hilton Chironga - trying to speak during a public hearing of the National Peace and Reconciliation Commission Bill in the northern town of Bindura.

He is pulled by the belt and made to sit down "and thereby shut up and blocked from presenting his views," Majome wrote. She said the group that turned on Chironga

on Thursday were ruling party councillors led by the Bindura deputy mayor.

Chironga's brother (some reports say it was his father) Gibbs was a just-elected opposition councillor when he was killed in June 2008. Violence hit Zimbabwe's rural areas after President Robert Mugabe's loss in the first round of presidential elections in March of that year. Opposition leader Morgan Tsvangirai pulled out of the second round of voting but was later brought into a power-sharing government.


MP Majome, who has been travelling around Zimbabwe as part of a parliamen tary team conducting public hearings on the Bill, said the manhandling of Chironga left her fighting tears and "almost unable to function as an MP."

Uganda's Museveni slams top cop assassination

KAMPALA - Uganda's second most prominent policeman was shot and killed in his car on Friday, along with two other officers as he left his home in Kampala, police

Assistant Inspector General of Police Andrew Kaweesi served as the force's spokesperson and was one of the country's most high-profile officers. "He was shot dead this morning as he was leaving his home coming to work," Inspector General Kale Kayihura told AFP. "Kaweesi had two police officers guarding him who were also killed. The motive is yet to be established," he added. Police killings are rare in Uganda, and the murder resembles the assassinations of an army officer in November last year and a senior public prosecutor in March 2015. A large crowd of local residents gathered at the scene where the officers' dead hodies were slumped

inside a black vehicle, blood pooling under shattered glass alongside the car. The bodies were later taken away. A local resident described seeing four men on two motorcycles attack the car the police officers were travelling in at around 06:30GMT as they left for work. "They shot very rapidly with guns that looked

like AK47s," said Mohammad, a motorcycle taxi driver who lives and works in the area.

"The motorbikes came from behind as the car was leaving Kaweesi's house. The car driver tried to increase speed but they drove past the car and shot into it," said the 30-year old who declined to give his surname. AFP

Mauritanian Senate votes against own abolition

OUAKCHOTT -Mauritania's Senate rejected a contentious constitutional amendment on its own abolition and the alteration of the country's flag to better represent those who battled for independence from France.

Thirty-three senators out of 56 voted against the amendment package, Senate President

Mohsen Ould El-hadji said. The rejection by the Senate

came after lawmakers in the lower house of the west African Islamic Republic passed the measure earlier this month.

But the amendment, which would see the Ssnate replaced by regional councils, must be passed by both lower and upper houses to become law.

The government has a major-

ity in both chambers.

"The amendment is therefore definitively defeated by the senators.

(It is up) to the president to decide whether to continue by way of a referendum," another option to get the measured passed, constitutional expert Vadhily Ould Rayess told AFP.

Angola wants 10 years in prison for abortions

LUANDA - Angola's Parliament votes next week on a proposal to imprison for up to 10 years women who have abortions and people who perform them, angering the president's daughter and others in the former Portuguese colony. Amnesty International and Human Rights Watch were urging authorities to allow a protest yesterday in the capital, Luanda, calling on the country to decriminalise abortion, saying organisers have informed Governor Higinio Carneiro but received no reply. AP

Man found with human bones of dead albino

LILONGWE - Police in Malawi say investigations have revealed that human bones found with a man arrested in Lilongwe last week were those of a person with albinism, who died in Mchinji last year, a report says.

According to Malawi 24, police spokesperson Kaitano Lubrino said that preliminary findings indicated that the recovered bones were those of an albino person Spiriano Felix who was buried on April 20 last year, but his grave was tampered and exhumed by unknown criminals on May 6. NEWS24

Shooting in Libya's Tripoli during anti-militias demo

TRIPOLI - Gunmen opened fire in the Libyan capital on Friday as hundreds of people demonstrated against the presence of militias in Tripoli, where armed groups are key power brokers, witnesses said.

There were no immediate reports of casualties and the identities of the gunmen were not clear, but the shooting forced demonstrators off the streets. AFP

Zim 'bumper harvest': Minister credits land reforms

HARARE - Zimbabwean Agriculture Minister Joseph Made is confident the country will have a bumper harvest, amid revelations government has stopped the importation of grain.

Made predicts Zimbabwe will attain more than two million metric tons of grain, including small grains such as sorghum and millet.

"We predict that we will have food sustenance. The fact is that the crops as well as the quality of livestock pasture are looking good," said Made in an exclusive interview with News24. News24

South Sudan buys weapons during famine: UN report

JUBA - South Sudan's government is spending oil revenue on weapons as the country descends into a famine largely caused by President Salva Kiir's military campaign, a confidential UN report

The report obtained by AFP on Friday calls for an arms embargo on South Sudan -- a measure that has been backed by the United States but was rejected by the Security Council during a vote in December. AFP

OTTAWA - Canada on Friday formally apologised to three Canadian men of Arab descent who said they had been tortured in Syria and blamed Canadian secret services for their ordeal.

Tensions show as Trump, Merkel meet for first time

WASHINGTON - Stark differences between President Donald Trump and German Chancellor Angela Merkel on everything from trade to immigration were in full view during an icy first meeting at the White House Friday.

In a frequently awkward joint press conference, Trump and Merkel showed little common ground as they addressed a host of thorny issues including NATO, defence spending and free trade deals. AFP

Rebels turn in first 140 weapons in peace deal

BOGOTA - Colombia's largest rebel group has handed over 140 weapons to United Nations observers as part of an historic peace agreement. Under the accord, the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia agreed to turn over 30 per cent of its arsenal by March 1. But delays in setting up the 26 rural camps where nearly 7 000 rebels are now gathered meant not all the containers designed to hold the weapons were ready.

Denmark to extradite S Korea 'Rasputin' daughter

COPENHAGEN - Danish prosecutors said on Friday that they would extradite the daughter of Choi Soon-Sil, the woman at the centre of a corruption scandal that led to the impeachment of South Korea's president.

Tillerson to face Chinese ire over blame for North Korea tensions

TOKYO - US Secretary of State Rex Tillerson arrived in China yesterday for what is likely to be a prickly visit, with Beijing angry at being told to rein in nuclear-armed North Korea and Washington repeatedly demanding it do more to control Pyongyang. China is also expected to voice its stong opposition to this month's deployment of a sophisticated US missie defense system in South

Tilerson issued the Trump adminisation's starkest warning yet to North Korea on Friday, saying that a military response would be "on the table" if Prongyang took action to threaten South Korean and US forces. He was speaking in South Korea, the second leg of his first visit to Asia since taking office. AFP

TRUMP DEFIANT OVER WIRETAP ROW WITH BRITAIN

ASHINGTON President Donald Trump defiantly refused to back down on Friday from his explosive claim that Barack Obama wiretapped his phones, and sidestepped any blame for the White House decision to highlight an unverified report that Britain helped carry out the alleged surveillance.

In brushing off the diplomatic row with perhaps America's closest ally, Trump also revived another: the Obama administration's monitoring of German Chancellor Angela Merkel's calls.

"At least we have something in common, perhaps," Trump quipped during a joint news conference with Merkel.

Merkel, who was making her first visit to the White House since Trump took office, looked surprised by the president's comment, which he

appeared primed to deliver.

The Obama administration's spying infuriated Germany at the time and risked damaging the US relationship with one of its most important European partners.

Trump's unproven recent allega-

tions against his predecessor have left him increasingly isolated, with fellow Republican as well as Democratic lawmakers saying they've seen nothing from intelligence agencies to support his claim. But Trump, who rarely admits he's wrong, has

been unmoved, leaving his advisers in the untenable position of defending the president without any credible evidence.

On Thursday, spokesperson Sean Spicer turned to a Fox News analyst's contention that GCHQ, the British electronic intelligence agency, had helped Obama wiretap Trump. Fox News anchor Shepard Smith said on Friday that the network could not independently verify the reports from Andrew Napolitano, a former judge and commentator who has met with Trump.

The GCHQ vigorously denied the charges in a rare public statement, saying the report was "utterly ridiculous and should be ignored."

According to a Western diplomat, Britain's ambassador to Washington, Kim Darroch, had told the White House on Tuesday that Napolitano's assertions were not true. AP

Have 5 kids not 3, Erdogan tells Turks in Europe

NKARA - President Recep Tayyip Erdogan on Friday urged Turks resident in Europe to have five children, telling the millionsstrong diaspora they were the continent's "future" as a bitter dispute festered between Ankara and Brussels.

Turkey and Europe are locked in a diplomatic crisis after Germany and the Netherlands blocked Turkish ministers from campaigning for a "yes" vote in next month's referendum on expanding Erdogan's powers.

Erdogan has repeatedly accused EU states of behaving like Nazi Germany over what he sees as discrimination against Turks, in comments that have caused outrage across the continent.

"From here I say to my citizens, I say to my brothers and sisters in Europe... Educate your children at better schools, make sure your family lives in better

areas, drives in the best cars and live in the best houses," said Erdogan. "Have five children, not three. You are Europe's future." "This is the best answer to the rudeness shown to you, the enmity, the wrongs," he said in a televised speech in Eskisehir, a city south of Istanbul.

Some 2.5 million Turkish citizens resident in Europe are eligible to vote in elections in their homeland. But millions more people living in EU states have Turkish origins.

Erdogan, a father of four, has previously urged women in Turkey to have at least three children to help boost the population, in comments denounced by women's rights activists.

Last weekend, just days before the Dutch election, police in Rotterdam used horses and dogs to disperse pro-Erdogan protesters demonstrating against the ban on Turkish ministers.

Erdogan said there was no difference between the tactics used by the police "and the gladiators in ancient Rome'

Several days later, Dutch Prime Minister Mark Rutte saw off a challenge from Far-Right politician Geert Wilders at the ballot box, to the relief of other EU

But Erdogan said there was to be no reconciliation with The Hague. AFP

'Franco-British links will survive Brexit'

ARIS - Britain's Prince William pledged Friday that his country will retain close links with France despite Brexit, as he and his wife Kate began a two-day visit to Paris.

It is the prince's first official visit to the French capital since his mother Diana died there in a car crash in 1997.

William, who is second-in-line to the throne, and his wife are acting as goodwill ambassadors for Britain just as the country prepares to trigger the formal process of leaving the European Union.

At a reception for young French entrepreneurs to launch a celebration of Franco-British links called "Les Voisins" (Neighbours), the 34-year-old prince said the two countries had much in common.

"This partnership will continue despite Britain's recent decision to leave the European Union," William said.

"The depth and the breadth of our cooperation will not change."

The couple met French President Francois Hollande soon after arriving in the capital and yesterday they were due to meet victims of the November 2015 terror attack on the Bataclan concert hall in Paris.

UN Haiti cholera fund still falls short despite British aid

-ASHINGTON - A new appeal by UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres for funding to help Haiti's cholera victims has fallen short, with only Britain responding to the call. UN officials said Friday.

With only two per cent of the needed \$400 million(R5

billion) raised, Guterres had written to all member-states last month to appeal for aid to Haiti, where more than 9 000 people died of cholera in a 2010 epidemic.

Pledging

Britain was the only country to come forward, pledging \$622 000.

That amount will be added to earlier contributions to the UN fund from South Korea, France, Liechtenstein, India and Chile -- totalling about \$2 million.

Canada and Japan have separately granted about \$7 million to help Haiti.

he question has to be asked if our Cabinet still has its eye on the big goal, let alone if they as individuals are the rightful people to deliver on the national vision of transforming this country to a first world status by 2022.

In order for this country to have a chance at achieving this ambitious target, or getting closer to it, we need ministers and politicians who appreciate that achieving that status depends heavily on what and how we do things now.

It is not what we do in the year 2022, as that can only mean the vision would have to be shifted to another year. This Cabinet was to help set the tone for achieving the target, and lay the background for the incoming Cabinet to usher us into an improved Swaziland by 2022.

But, with just over a year to the end of their term, one is getting a troubled sense that things are not progressing in the way we expect. In fact, I am beginning to get worried that Cabinet seems preoccupied with something else other than to deliver on their collective mandate, which is to ensure an efficient and vibrant government. I started having this sense that Cabinet is losing its focus when it failed to prioritise the State Funerals it had pronounced, for two former prime ministers of the crown. This shameful decision has not been explained, or justified by Cabinet—and probably because it never will be. The less said about Percy Simelane's attempt to defend this the better. In fact, I decided the day I read his comments in the paper that his responses did not warrant that we pay any attention to them.

Cabinet must have felt so embarrassed, I thought, they could not even conjure up a legitimate response. The government spokesperson, so often eloquent with his remarks, failed to spin this one. It left me dismayed.

Since then I have wondered if our Cabinet is not distracted altogether, although if you ask me by what I would never tell you. Perhaps it is that they are tired. Perhaps they are running out of steam. Maybe, just ayde, they are lacking inspiration. It could be that towards the end of their term, they are beginning to have other priorities, which are causing such a distraction.

My gut feel is that the Prime Minister needs to shoulder the blame for the inept performance that is coming from Cabinet, because so often he has been the one to lead from the front. So often, they look up to him. My sense, and I could be wrong, is that there is no one offering Cabinet a refreshing perspective to what they are doing now, hence it now seems as though everything is slacking.

Let me justify this position. Let us start with the issue of the travel doc-

uments, which, five months later, people are kept grounded because government does not have travel documents. Firstly, not only that we ran out of these, but that we were never told the truth. No one has ever bothered to inform the nation at the severity of this situation—so that people could plan too. Instead, the nation was told half-truths, and it led to so much frustration. Not only have other programmes been affected here; schools can't take trips; people are forced to cancel standing commitments and students studying outside of this country had to undergo this frustration at the South African High Commission, but there is no alternative, whatever that may be. The reality is that for five months, this government is without travel documents. This at the time people are travelling more and more is a major scandal. It is the kind of scandal for which people pay with their jobs. It is the kind of scandal for which heads roll. Nothing is rolling from Home Affairs, or at Hospital Hill. This past week, the minister informed Parliament that we have to wait till April before the travel documents arrive. I am not holding my breath. Last year when this madness started, we were told that passports would be available before Christmas; then it was just before New Year. Then they ran out of excuses and offered give monthly updates. Shameful.

I will not go into the argument of why in this day and age, when we are pursuing a first world status as a country, we still have to have a restrictive travel document. This government would never look that far. For now, I would only worry about how this came about, and

what Cabinet did about it.

This travel documents shortage was a sign of the times. It was followed by the scandal of the State Funerals. Then it was the Christianity directive; Cabinet instructing all schools that it was changing the syllabus from Religious Education to Christianity. Just like that. Within a week or so of opening of schools.

There was no suggestion that this was thought through, except that Cabinet had decided. There was no consideration of how this would be rolled out or in fact, the confusion that it would cause, if not an outright commossion. This change in the syllabus comes with a lot of things attached to it, such as readiness, preparedness and application. It also obviously comes with stationery, which needs to be considered before we dive into things headstrong.

But, Cabinet was not about to care. The decision was taken, and when the reality of what it meant to change the syllabus without the necessary dialogue, consultation and everyone's approval came, only then did they realise it would need to do mo than force a change of syllabus.

The decision of course is not wrong. The change is accepted as sensible. But, the manner it is being effected is outrageously wrong. It is the kind of decision for which people pay with their jobs. It is the kind of decision for which heads roll. Except being made to attend the State Funerals Phineas Magagula is still the minister in charge of Education and Training.

As if this was not enough, Cabinet woke up to another great decisionthe SiSwati language directive. This was announced by the Prime Minister, who said that children in primary

schools were to learn SiSwati. This is a good decision. But just as the Christianity directive, it came like a bolt of lightning and did not take anything else into consideration.

For me the signs that something is not going right is the issue of the E20m set aside in Martin Dlamini's budget for the Christianity syllabus. This is clearly an attempt to make up for the decision and the manner it is being imposed. It is in my books a bribe for a bad decision. It is an attempt to silence the public from criticising this decision.

More importantly, this E20m is to pay for the cost of changing this syllabus, especially in the manner that it is being shoved down the education system. It is to pay for the books and other educational materials that have to be replaced as a consequence. It is a damning indication that this decision was not thought through.

This is evidence that Cabinet is slacking so badly they are taking taxpayers' money to finance their bad decisions. This, with a year to go, is shocking. At this point, you expect that Cabinet would be fired up and improving service delivery. What we are getting out of them is not what we deserve, or what we need with the economy needing individuals who are focused on delivery.

The question therefore is what has happened? What is preoccupying them? Is this the end of the road for many of them in politics? Should the appointing authority bother with them? I have mentioned just a few incidents this past few months, and we have a year to go, what lies ahead is frightening if this is anything to

The elections can't come soon enough.



SWAZILAND HOSTS SADC ANNUAL QUALITY AWARDS

he Kingdom of Swaziland was honoured to host the SADC Annual Quality Awards held at the Royal Villas on Wednesday.

Whilst the Voice of Business and her members was also invited to witness this prestigious event that aimed at recognising and appreciating organisations and individuals who are contributing to quality advancement in all sectors of business, it is unfortunate that the invitation was received late and not enough members of the private sector could witness this event.

The concept of Quality Awards was born way back in the 1980s by the Deming Prize (the first of its kind) and the EFQM Excellence and Malcolm Baldrige National Quality Awards. After the success of the Deming Prize in Japan, many local, national and transnational quality awards have been established.

The SADC Annual Quality Awards forms the second level of recognition within the SADC Region for demonstration of quality improvement efforts. The first level is at member states level where all SADC member states are expected to implement the Awards. Historically Swaziland has not taken part, because we have no National Quality Awards. The Voice of Business was informed that the Ministry of Commerce Industry and Trade (MCT&I) together with other relevant stakeholders were putting in place logistics to ensure the inaugural Swaziland National Quality Awards later

on in the year.

Given the wide spectrum of industry, the awards are classified into various distinct categories aligned to specific operational standards. Some of the categories for which awards were conferred were the Quality Systems of the Year and the Product of the Year awards, aiming to recognise businesses that have product, quality systems, processes and procedures that are in line with local as well as international best practice. These businesses use quality principles as a tool for competitiveness for national and regional economic development. Zimbabwe was the overall winner, followed by Namibia as they took five of the seven awards. These winners are expected to be ambassadors for the awards both in their domestic economies and in the region. They have the duty to represent the SADC Annual Quality Awards and keep doing more to continue to stand as deserving winners.

But the main focus of today's edition, is that during the Dinner, it was noted that a number of African countries do not have comprehensive Quality Infrastructure Policies in place to ensure supply of safe and quality products in the market. The SME Sector, especially, faces formidable challenges at the technical and quality level, over and above dealing with other issues such as logistics, financial challenges and management issues.

Hence, in order to develop and produce products that are competitive and meet technical regulations in the regional and international markets, the industry needs services of accredited national/regional quality infrastructure institutions that can provide the required independent evidence of compliance to quality and technical requirements. The same quality infrastructure also needs to support the industry in developing these products. It is imperative to put in place measures and institutional mechanisms to ensure that all goods and services for domestic and international markets meet the required quality, environment, health and safety standards through appropriate production technologies and other value addition processes. This will significantly increase the producers, processors, traders and consumers' safety, health and welfare; thereby strongly contributing to government's sustainable development efforts to eradicate poverty through wealth creation and stimulate prosperity for all. This is in view of the fact that in the present age of globalisation, market access requires compliance to domestic and international requirements through the adoption of internationally recognised systems. This entails the development and promotion of internationally recognised infrastructure that is compliant to the production of competitive, safe, reliable and cost-effective goods and services.

This is a key prerequisite for enhancing the industry's competitiveness and export market share in tradable goods and services. There is, therefore, an urgent need to protect the rights of the consumers and establish a strong and effective regulatory mechanism using accredited laboratories, certification bodies and inspection agencies to control the use of substandard products and services in the market in terms of World Health Organisation (WTO), Technical Barriers to Trade (TBT)/Sanitary and Phytosanitary (SPS) measures. The changing face of international trade has led to the requirement by manufacturers and processors to have a harmonised, single, globally accepted technical standards and conformance tests. Poorly designed technical regulations and standards have been identified as a barrier to deeper trade and integration in Africa.

With the different Regional Economic Communities (SADC, COMESA), African countries face the challenge of variation in certification, testing, inspection practices, and standards used by different countries on the basis of the WTO obligation, and rights. The divergence of standards and technical regulations make trade between African countries difficult, contentious and expensive, hence low intra-African trade.

Therefore, an accessible and efficient Regional Quality Infrastructure Policy is needed to support and strengthen

businesses' ability to improve the quality of goods and services. In addition, a regional approach of harmonised Common Free Trade Area will increase competitiveness of goods and services, and promote sustainable development by enhancing innovation and transfer technology. This will enhance our businesses' capability to effectively engage in trade on the national, regional and international levels, and make a direct contribution to achieving economic growth. Moreover, enablers, such as institutional capacity building and cooperation, are central to achieving this continental objective. Having stated the purposes of the Quality Awards, the Voice of Business believes that through Swaziland's participation, our SME's, in particular, will get to stretch themselves to deliver goods and services that are of sustainable quality, enabling them to penetrate new markets and to withstand the fierce competition that exists around the globe. Swaziland has the potential of exporting more goods made in the country only if it would comply with internationally accepted quality standards. The Voice of Business looks forward to the Standards, Quality, Accreditation and Metrology (SQAM) institutions to raise more awareness to businesses in Swaziland about the importance of developing standards and adhering to such standards in order to increase the level of Swazi exports.

Will women's rights ever be recognised?

We seem to be always excited by these International commemorations, even when there are pressing issues needing urgent attention locally. Passing the Sexual Offenses Bill remains a dream yet we seem to be forever carried away with winds of such celebrations. Women in this country are not adequately represented in decision making positions, country are in majority. GIRL CHILD FOREVER DIS-CRIMINATED

Those who have sired and mothered only baby girls are forever worried about inheritance issues, when family discussions are held. It is very rare to have girls benefit from family assets in inheritance rights, and this remains a big problem within the traditional set-up. We have read disturbing accounts regarding family wars where even uncles are dragged into such inheritance rifts to ensure that girls are never beneficiaries.

Just as if that is not enough, when a woman gets married one is exposed to ill-treatment where your in-laws will make it a point that you do not enjoy the benefits of your husband fully if he

We certainly need to balance up the scales and ensure that women are seen as full humans enjoying all the entitlements without discrimination and segregation.

The girl-child should be seen enjoying her rights of being human and no one should dictate terms and conditions around inheritance rights to her

seclusion.

We come from a terrible history where the girl-child has been sacrificed even in attaining education, just because the boys were always seen as better to continue the family name, whilst she on the other hand was born to leave her own family to go add numbers in her in-laws. We have destroyed such great potential just because of being so gender blind and use our biases to favour

WOMEN IN POLIGAMOUS RELATIONS

Swazis respect their traditions and customs with fanfare and religiousity. One issue that has continued to be practised is polygamous relations. Traditionally in a polygamous marriage the senior wife remains the most important wife and the rest are basically seen as ordinary wives who should recognise her seniority status.

Depending on the status of a given clan, *Indialifa* (the heir) comes from the senior wife.

There has been an argument regarding status of women who come from Royalty in some instances, where she is quickly elevated to seniority status because of her blue blood. Well we can go to town arguing about this arrangement, but the undeniable reality is that we are talking about human beings who should be treated equally by virtue of being human.

What remains even a great challenge within the Swazi traditional value system is the pivotal role played by paternal aunts, who continue to wield so much power in their own families. Aunts always call shots on family decisions because their voice carries much weight (livi labo lidvuna).

There is need to educate ourselves about the status of women married in polygamous families, because there is some injustices when it comes to administration of the estates.

The family (lusendvo) holds meetings after the husband is long gone and this tends to create more family rifts as some wives end up unjustly treated by some decisions taken regarding the distribution of the estate. Unfortunately very few men plan their lives accordingly. Women within a polygamous relationship do need to discuss such issues because once the husband is no more, inheritance rights of the wives and their children are violated with impunity.

FAMILY ESTATES AND WOMEN

Depending on the type of marital status, family estates are handled by the Master of the High Court, who by law is responsible for distribution and administration of such estates. It has always puzzled me that families are often called to such meetings to confirm the status of women beneficiaries.

There seems to be always doubts about the status of women, who have to fight wars to get what rightfully belongs to them. There are moments when some children who were never known, who mushrooms after a thunderstorm claiming their in the estate of the late

Women who might have worked so

hard for the betterment of the estate are given a raw deal as they forego certain portion of the family assets to cater for these illegitimate children by the

While we do admit that such children have rights to needing protection but why should this be at the expense of the muscle and toils of the women? Imagine the poor women who might have worked so hard to improve the welfare of the family, ensuring that they build quite a reasonable estate, only to discover these hidden children who just appear from nowhere. It is always the family that fights for the recognition of such children. Perhaps it is high time that people write their will testament while still alive to ensure that such things are discussed way beforehand. We certainly have violated women rights during the distribution of estates and this is a great frustration.

SINGLE WOMEN VIEWED NEGATIVELY

Whether by default or design, single women's rights continue to be violated with impunity by almost every institution

As for their assets, they have accumulated, there are always vultures including even their own families standing ready to pounce on them like hungry hyenas should death strike. Unless they protect themselves by writing a will testament, they are forever vulnerable.

Accessing land in Swazi nation land for instance, they still cannot acquire it easily unless there is a male figure in the background to seek permission on their behalf.




> "We worked so hard on creating the Sihlongonyane family in 'Human' without relying on what they were saying or doing.


We used costumes to show who they are and how they see them-

FROM THE

EU FILM FESTIVAL

Before the arrival of the EU Film Festival (EUFF), the Swazi film industry had almost nothing it could point at to convince everyone that Swaziland had the talent to produce 'quality' films.

Even though those working in the filmmaking industry have always known that the spirit of greatness lives within them, everyone else seemed to believe otherwise. Every corner we turned as Swazis all we ever seemed to hear was how inferior we were, accompanied by dismissive suggestions that the Swazi film industry did not exist. The arrival of the EU Film Festival (EUFF) has been a game changer for the Swazi film industry and art. Not only has it taken the existence of the industry out of the shadows and brought it into the light, it has also served to confirm two fundamental truths: That Swazi talent is inferior to no one, and that Swaziland can produce quality films.

To the uninitiated, the EU Film Festival is an annual cultural event that brings together Europeans and Swazis to celebrate the bond that exists between the European Union and the Kingdom of Swaziland. Showcasing short films from Europe and Swaziland, the festival seeks to promote cultural understanding between European and Swazi cultures, as well as support the development of the Swazi filmmaking industry. Initiated in 2014, the festival has, over the past three years, facilitated the production of seven local films; has empowered 50 aspiring filmmakers with filmmaking knowledge; has provided 15 'in development' filmmakers with the opportunity to produce their first professional film; and has provided work experience to about 80 actors and industry technicians who have previously lacked the opportunity to practice their chosen craft. Today we are celebrating other home brewed films, Human and 'Liphupho Lami' (My Dream).

SETSABILE TSELA: MAKE-UP AND SPECIAL EFFECTS ARTIST

ho would have thought we'd live to see authentic ageing, third degree burns, scars, severed limbs, pimples and blood flow on our screens..

Jackson on Tyler Perry's Why did I get married? Matt maroon lipstick nicely pasted on vast lips, make up perfectly applied on flawless skin, eyebrows nicely done, high volume lashes and the Mohawk seals the whole look.

The lady behind our films, the lady who specialises on effects, the lady who transforms faces into something incredible. Every time she walks by, I am sure the ladies quickly revisit the powder room to retouch their faces to level up with the country's stop make-up and special effects artist Setsabile Tsela.

Table laden with countless make-up items from regular powder to Yardley mascaras to Avon matt lipsticks, lip glosses, elegant face wipes, classy large make-up cases with drawers. As if the table is not enough, the floor is neatly laid with fancy fabrics and more of face sprays, lavish nail polishes, all sorts of make-up brushes and loofas.

It's clear this is not your typical makeup artist and we can't wait to see cast members being transformed to look like Hollywood A-list celebrities.

"I fell in love with beauty and fashion when I was young and I remember I made my cousins my guinea-pigs. I would steal my mother's face powder and sponges and get down to work. Obviously they would laugh at me after seeing the results in the mirror," chuckles the cheerful make-up artist.

"Straight long black eyeliner that goes all the way to the ears and so many mishaps that I observe on the street make me want to offer make-up classes for the dear ladies," says Tsela.

For a while we feel outdated as we thought that was the right way to do one's eyebrows. "Rather keep your eyebrows as they are," Setsabile reasons

Her obsession with make-up exposed her to the film sector. Film special-effects is a far cry from the frivolous 'make me pretty' world of simple make up. In Setsabile, the local film industry has scored the jackpot. Who would have thought we'd live to see authentic ageing, third degree burns, scars, severed limbs, pimples and blood flow. This is just a tiny bit of her resume in



the local scene.

"I watch a lot of horror movies, I used to be so scared as a kid but I realise now that such films are not pure entertainment for me. I learn a lot from them, I don't cringe at blood and gore, I actually pause and study the image. 'Wrong Turn' has to be one of my favourite films because of the craftsmanship on that film," explains the make-up and special effects artist.

A couple of sips of chilled Orange juice, as if to gear herself up for the challenging work that lies ahead. She confesses "I just love juice and cocktails, that's my coffee."

On the second film, 'Blessed', she brings on her A-game with beauty make up for the extras. The Nyakatfo resident had manna from Hollywood and glamour as some had the chance to have the taste of the red carpet feel as they lined up for Setsabile's touch."Ngitawufana nebantfu bakuGenerations vini mntfwanami" (Am I going to look like those people on Generations?) asks an excited woman of Nyakatfo as Setsabile neatly applies lipstick on her. In this instance makeup becomes a tool that can easily transform and up lift one's mood and confidence. It is evident as the old woman walks away with a spring in her step. Tsela thrilled the residents further when she made a 30-year-old cast member to look like a 50-year-old man. When the actor finally sits in front of the rolling camera, many of the young extras can't help but be envious of this seamless transformation and the opportunity to experience old age, if only for a moment.

There are endless possibilities in the craft of make-up and special effects. With each film, he Film Lab Initiative has managed to push boundaries with Setsabile leading the way in the SFX department.

Have you ever wondered why in the movies people step out of the shower with their make-up still intact? We will pardon you for thinking they didn't actually get in the water. With the prevalence of technology these days, one can never know. When SCENE finally asks the make-up artist, she just gives a huge smile and patiently explains the trick behind this look. "I want to see the film industry in the country grow to the level of Hollywood and to know that I was part of that epic progress," says Setsabile. We let her continue with her impressive work on a host for a talk show that the Film Lab Initiative is producing for the local public broadcaster. We just look at her in amazement knowing that the film industry has landed itself a big fish in Setsabile.



SHADOWS AND THE LIGHT

- THE DIRECTOR

[I speak through my clothes" if these words by world renowned academic and fashion designer Umberto Eco's are anything to go by, then I am lost in translation as I try to understand the playful statements on the various T's this first time director wears on set.

Manqoba Shongwe's demeanour is serious and borders dangerously on cold as he regularly recesses to caucus with his directing mentor and actors. With an air of dissatisfaction and a hunger for perfection these 'side bars' seem to take a bit of a serious and an intellectual tone that thankfully yields the right results each time.

An avid lover of computer gaming who enjoys nothing more than a can of cool Fanta grape at the end of each shoot, Manqoba seems to possess contrasting attributes to direct "Human"; an intense and sometimes tear jerking human rights film. "I am an eclectic. I love a lot of things both serious and very playful" he says, as he casually dips his margarine pasted white bread into a steaming cup of coffee.

Even as we enjoy our hot beverages on this chilli night, there are sporadic technical conversations between the director and his cinematographer.

"This is my favourite meal. It brings back such great childhood memories" he chuckles upon seeing the shock on my face and I openly label this as "sikhaya". It would seem I am not the only one surprised at this casual and carefree side to Manqoba as his Mentor Director also quips "I wouldn't do that in front of people."

We all laugh at the gleeful smile on this young director who seems to be in heaven if only for a minute as he takes another bite.

He spent his formative years participating in minor roles in school plays never knowing that this was only the beginning of a journey that would place him at the helm of big film productions in his later years.

Talking about subject matter of his film, Manqoba is quick to say he is shortcomings in the way we treat those simply inspired by "... a great story. that are different from us. It is a story Whether you are a director getting a that needed to be told and I can only



unfold. That generally is an inspiration," he says.

He admits though that no matter how great the story is, any director's interpretation will have a nuance of their personality, experience or understanding of the subject. The casting is one moment that stands out, he says, referring to his choice for the main actor 'Phiwayinkhosi'.

"When I had to choose my actor for Phiwayinkhosi, I felt we needed to have a bubbly kid playing that role regardless of the character's circumstance. There was something that resonated with a part of me; I couldn't put my finger on it. It was just a 'knowing' and Emmanuel Hillary's aura was just right," he adds.

As we continue our chat, it is clear why a cheerful child would appeal to Manqoba as his alter-ego slowly emerges and it is something akin to the playful, childlike Disney personalities we watch on television. It is a side that many here on set rarely see.

The film has really taken a lot out of the director and his cast and from whom he demands a stellar perfor mance and product.

For the director the most important element was to capture the story right, and interpret it in a way that will foster social transformation. A story is for nothing else if not to yield a positive mind shift in audiences. These are Manqoba's sentiments when he talks about the film's message.

"It's a reflection of our society. Our good script or a scriptwriter seeing life hope I did it justice as a director. I hope

people walk away from this film having learnt something about acceptance.'

So, can we hope to get more stereotype busting, mindset shifting films from this up and coming director?

"I'd like to direct one of two types of films. Something like 'Fight Club' or 'Inception'; something which leaves audiences with their jaws on the floor because of the crazy twists in the plot. They never see what's coming and are still somewhat in the dark about the true nature of events.

Then because I am such a huge fan of superhero films, I'd like to direct one. Something like 'Captain America: Civil War'."

Mangoba's love for the industry and desire for its development is unquestionable as he mentions rather 'unknown' directors as his inspiration.

"I have quite a number of directors that I think are great but I look up to directors such as Ryan Connolly and our very own Samkeliso Nxumalo, whose time and effort is channelled towards teaching others the craft, for the betterment of the industry as a whole".

As we wrap up the interview and he takes a final sip of his now cold and oily Milo with soggy bits of bread, Mangoba promises that as time goes by he will treat his fans to a Biopic of

"I think that things that happen to you as a person are probably things that impact you the most and what you most want to share with the world. It's like a piece of your soul, and nothing could be more sincere than that," he states.





MIND THAT **ERROR**

hat we refer to here as COP is that very fascinating phenomenon in grammar: Case Of Pronoun.

Catching an errant case of pronoun is something we must know how to do as good writers or knowledgeable readers. Like most grammatical errors, faulty case of pronoun shows that a writer has a weak grounding in the fundamentals of grammar.

To be sure, case is a matter that falls under that vital aspect of grammar known as inflection, and it pertains to the forms which nouns and pronouns take according to what they are in a sentence, that is, the role they play. In sentences, nouns or pronouns may be one of three things: subject, object, or owner. Respectively, these are the nominative or subjective case, the objective case, and the possessive case.

"Who's fooling who about king's jet?" is the headline of a news story which runs across two inner pages of the Times of Swaziland, March 15, 2017. The lead of the story reads, thus: "Members of Parliament (MPs) were yesterday reminded of Double You's song lyrics 'who's fooling who' when two Cabinet ministers gave different versions about the whereabouts of the King's jet."

Well, as the saying goes, anywhere there is a pronoun, there is a case. Like the headline of that story, the lead has two pronouns; so each has a case to answer, so to say! The two pronouns in the headline are "who" and "who." The same two pronouns are repeated, albeit in a quote, in the lead of the story.

Double "who" in one sentence is signal enough that something is amiss, for you cannot have two captains in a ship. Since one of the two pronouns must be a noun, the other cannot also be a noun.


Whereas the first "who" is correct, because that is the form it should take in the subjective or nominative case, the second "who" is incorrect, because that is not the form it should take in the objective case. The correct form of this demonstrative pronoun in the objective case is

Accordingly, the headline may be revised, thus: "Who's fooling whom about king's jet?" And the lead of the story may be revised to read, "Members of Parliament (MPs) were yesterday reminded of the lyrics of the song by Double You, 'Who's fooling who?' when two Cabinet ministers gave different versions of the whereabouts of the King's jet."

The title of an article in the Sunday Times of October 12, 2016 is an example of the correct case of this pronoun.

It reads: "Who's fooling whom? Why tip-

GOOD WEEK FOR FREEDOM OF EXPRESSION is the title of an opinion piece in the Sunday Observer of March 20, 2016. The third sentence of the article's opening paragraph reads, thus: "Makhubu, spent 15 months behind bars for expressing himself, and was released after the State dropped its charges against him, took serious offence with the minister's statement who he accused of threatening those people he disagreed with - and people who, as the minister had stated earlier, were protected in the forums at which they spoke freely.'

In that sentence we find the pronoun, "who," occurring two times, again. Yet, again, it is its second appearance that is incorrect. In this instance, "who" is a relative pronoun, and its correct case should be the objective case, not the nominative. With regard to the element of interest to us, here, the sentence may be revised, as follows: "Makhubu...took serious offence with the statement of the minister whom he accused of threatening those people he disagreed

The culpable use of the nominative case, "who," instead of the objec-

tive case, "whom," is something that may be rightly characterised as pervasive. Most of what we may call "who-errors" are due to non-use of the objective case. We find another case in this headline: RESPECT FOR WHO? This is the title of an opinion piece in the Swazi News of January 23, 2016.

The fault in that headline may be better seen, if we change the case of the demonstrative pronoun, "who," to the case of its personal pronoun, "he." Imagine this for a title: RESPECT FOR HE? Surely, this would amount to a piece of illiteracy.

A preposition always comes before the objective case of a noun or pronoun, but this is not obvious when the element is a noun, since its spelling or form does not change. Take the following two sentences, for example. "Maxwell loves Maxine" and "Maxine loves Maxwell."

In both sentences, neither noun changes its form or spelling. But once we change the two nouns to the pronouns, "he" and "she," the story changes.

We can no longer have these sentences, "He loves she" or "She loves he." Instead, the sentences should read, "He loves her" or "She loves

him" - "her" and "him" being the correct case of the pronouns, "he" and "she," respectively.

Such juxtaposition, some gurus of grammar would say, is the formula for catching the culpable COP. All said and done, the aforementioned title with an incorrect case of pronoun should be revised to read, RESPECT FOR WHOM?

In The Star of December 3, 2014 was a news story with the headline, "You raped me, Bill Cosby." The fourth paragraph of the story reads, thus: "She said she had suspected Cosby, who she now considers a 'monster', of ill-intent as he was mar-

Clearly, the "who" in that sentence is not the subject, so it should not be in the subjective or nominative case. If you apply the juxtaposition test, this is what you would get: "She now considers he a 'monster'." That would be a grammatical atrocity, no doubt!

Properly revised, the relative pronoun, "who," should be in the objective case, and the sentence should read, "She said she had suspected Cosby, whom she now considers a 'monster', of ill-intent as he was mar-

"People are free to worship who-

ever they want but the God of the universe warned the children of Israel and us, through His written Word, that He had put life or death before them and us, and they must choose whether they want to do His will or the devil's by running after other gods - gods these false prophets rep-

That rather long sentence is an excerpt from an article in the Times of Swaziland SUNDAY, September 28, 2014, with the title: TB JOSHUA A MAN OF GOD?. And lurking therein is the culpable COP, "whoever." In the construction, "People are free to worship whoever they want," the pronoun is the object, not the subject. And as the object, it is supposed to be in the objective case, which is "whomever."

In The Citizen of February 24, 2016 was a caption-like identification that followed this quoted statement, "He is more qualified than any minister I have ever appointed in the finance ministry." And the identification reads, thus: "President Jacob Zuma on Monday about David van Rooyen, who he appointed to replace Nhlanhla Nene as finance minister last year."

Check out the "who" in the construction and you would find that it is not playing the part of a subject, that of an object. Accordingly, its correct case is the objective one, 'whom.'

Call the following sentence our parting pot-shot for today, if you like. It reads, "Does anybody in this room really believe that Hillary will be tougher on Putin than me?" Speaking, of course, is the President of the United States of America, during a press conference on January 11, 2017.

In correct Queen's English or traditional, prescriptive grammar, the pronoun, "me," which is in the objective case, is incorrect – a good case of a culpable COP!

The sentence should be revised to read, thus: "Does anybody in this room really believe that Hillary will be tougher on Putin than I (will be)?"



Spitting fire Mxolisi S.(TEATQ Member) youth are from Simunye, Mhlume, Vuvulane, Tshaneni and Tambankulu.

These programme comes with a seed capital to be shared by three winning business concepts.

Our previous experience in dealing with out of school youth has taught us the importance of putting in place a proper screening process to select young people who demonstrate the entrepreneurial sharpness and drive to be part of the programme.

This is to ensure that we minimise the attrition rate and we increase the impact, hoping to realise the returns on the investment in the long run.

The screening process has given us an interesting picture of the youth that are participating in the programme. The average age is 25 and 53 per cent are already in business. This is an indication that there are young people that are not sitting down waiting for handouts, and this is the caliber of young people that need all the support. What is even more interesting about this particular group is that 63 per cent of the participants are young women.

This is a very encouraging statistic given that we have seen young women shying away from such programs in the past.

The participants have gone through the first stage of the programme, which is a three-day bootcamp training.

This is a motivational training aimed at instilling the entrepreneurial mindset. The beauty of this programme is that it brings local entrepreneurs who share their experiences to inspire the young entrepre-

In the case of this this project, one of the entrepreneurs who came to share his experience is Khulekani Msweli who has made a mark in the fashion industry as a designer. He is a young person from the same community, Vuvulane, and he shared his personal journey, encouraging the youth to have a clear vision to stay focused on their set goals. He further addressed the issue of funding and the difficulties in accessing start up capital. He put emphasis on the importance of networking and discouraged the tendency of pushing blame to the government.

Conclusion

With youth unemployment becoming a heightened concern we all have a role to play. At JA Swaziland we believe in the power of partnership. Young people need the motivation, training, guidance and financial resources to succeed in business. Corporates need to make a deliberate decision to invest in the youth.

"Hi friends, sawubona! It has been another amazing week here in Swaziland, full of ancient caves, unique and special crafts, and preparing for a big celebration, so I'm glad you're visiting again to share all of this with me!

After the beautiful canopy tours and wildlife preserves I got to see last week, the next exciting spot I wanted to see was the bushman caves of Swaziland. For the very adventurous, there are cave systems made by a river that flows between a couple of mountains at a place called Gobholo.

There are special trained guides who can take you through the 800 metre, nearly half a mile, course that goes down 90 metres, or almost 300 feet. Wow!


For me though, I wanted to see more of the bushman cave paintings, so I headed to the Nsangwini cave shelter, a preserve in the northwest area of Swaziland.

There I got to see the ancient cave paintings that were discovered in 1955. The amazing thing is, no one really knows how old the paintings are - they could be 400 years old, or maybe even as old as 4 000 years! They weren't all painted at once though, many generations of natives painted them long before Swaziland was a colony of Great Britain. By the way, Swaziland won its independence in 1968 and became its very own country then! Oops, I got distracted, hee hee...I just get so excited when there is so much to learn!

On the rock paintings I could see all sorts of interesting animals, like elephants, lions and even a wildebeest, which is interesting because there are no other wildebeest cave paintings other than this one south

of Zambezi, Mozambique, about 1000 km, or 620 miles, north of here. The factory then breaks it and melts it down, then uses it to make beautiful works of art like tableware, glasses, vases, and little decorations like African animals! They even work with local schools, getting the children involved in cleaning up and recycling in exchange for sponsorship of their sports teams.

Do Primary Teachers' Deserve such Treatment?

spend sleepless nights thinking about the plight of Degreed primary teachers in the . Kingdom of eSwatini.

It is a known fact that we as a country once witnessed an exodus of professionals to countries abroad, mostly to neighbouring South Africa for they were lured by better pay and better working standards.

These teachers I am referring to here (Degreed teachers teaching in primary schools) remained child accorded quality education as is our dream for such an act of patriotism? The sad response

They stayed and never left even though they saw their friends who migrated outside the country showing life changing differences with the justified pay they got.

Were these Degreed teachers not tempted to leave the country themselves for these riches? The answer is simple: yes they were, but why did they stay to be robbed their monies and benefits?

Isn't such a sacrifice a sign of loyalty and patriotism? It undoubtedly is.

What are these loyal educators or sculptures of society getting for such loyalty? What is the

in the country for they want to see every Swazi government doing to show it's appreciation to such is; sadly nothing. Before 2009 degreed teachers teaching in primary schools were paid according to their qualifications and all was well in a way, except for a few glitches.

id you know that the National Maize Corporation does not just deal with maize only, but also trades in other grains and cereals? Guided by the vision and mission statement, NMC has found quite a lucrative market in Red Speckled Sugar Beans. Not just lucrative to the company only but also the farmer, which are potentially you and I, really. National Maize Corporation's Farmer Development officers bring us some crucial information that we need to know in order to produce quality red speckled beans or any other dry beans for that matter. Enjoy the read.

Currently, dry beans (Red Speckled Sugar Beans are categorised under) are regarded as one of the most important field crops in South Africa on accounts of its high protein content as well as dietary benefits.

Within each species there are many seed types which differ in size, shape and colour. Within each type there are different cultivars and the seeds of these cultivars differ very little from one another. However, considerable differences may occur in adaptability, growth habit, disease resistance and many other characteristics.

CLIMATIC REQUIREMENTS

The dry bean is annual crop which thrives in a warm climate. It grows optimally at temperatures of 18 to 24 °C. The maximum temperature during flowering should not exceed 30 °C for P. vulgaris and 26 °C for P. coccineus. High temperatures during the flowering stage lead to abscission of flowers and a low pod set, resulting in yield loss. Day temperatures below 20 °C will delay maturity and cause empty mature pods to develop. Hence the current season; January to April make this the perfect time to produce Red Speckeled Sugar Beans or dry beans in general.

Cultivated under rain fed conditions the crop requires a minimum of 400 to 500 mm of rain during the growing season, but an annual total of 600 to 650 mm is considered ideal.

SOIL REQUIREMENTS

Beans have to be planted in warm soil after all danger of frost has passed.

They grow well in soils with a depth of at least 90cm that have no deficiencies, and are well drained. Sandy loam, sandy clay loam or clay loam with a clay content of between 15 and 35 per cent is suitable. With sandy soils, problems of low fertility or nematode damage may occur.

Beans prefer an optimum soil pH (H2O) of 5,8 to 6,5, and are very sensitive to acidic (pH (H2O) < 5,2) soils (acid saturation above 10 per cent). They will also not grow well in soils that are compacted, too alkaline or poorly drained.

EVERYTHING WE NEED TO KNOW ABOUT DRY BEAN PRODUCTION

Growing Season

Temperatures, especially during the night, determine the length of the growing season of a cultivar:

- short (85_94 days)
- medium (95_104 days)
- long (105_115 days).

SEED QUALITY

For successful production, it is important that high-quality (certified) seeds with a high germination percentage (80 per cent or higher) be used. This production cost factor is slight when compared to probable yield losses due to disease or poor stand. Low-quality seed can cause a poor and an uneven stand, resulting in uneven maturity, harvesting problems and yield losses. Using disease-free seed will reduce the incidence of seed-borne diseases such as bean common mosaic virus (BCMV), bacterial diseases (common blight, halo blight and bacterial brown spot) and the fungal disease, anthracnose.

Other benefits of disease-free seed are that it is:

- labelled to indicate germination percentage
- guaranteed true to type and ensures homogeneity
- guaranteed free of weed seeds and foreign matter.

SOIL PREPARATION

Seedbed preparation for the planting of dry beans follows the same pattern as that for any row crop planted in the spring. The seedbed must be deep, level and firm because this ensures better surface contact between the seed and the soil, increasing the absorption of moisture. A level seedbed also facilitates planting to a uniform depth.

FERTILISATION

It is recommended that beans be planted on soils which have been previously well fertilised. General fertility is more advantageous than direct fertilisation, because beans are sensitive to high concentrations of mineral salts.

SOIL ACIDITY (pH)

The optimum soil pH levels for dry beans are:

- pH (H2O): 5,8_6,5
- pH (KCl): 4,8_5,5.

The percentage of acid saturation has to be lower than 10 per cent for the cultivation of dry beans. The soluble aluminium content has to be less than 25 to 30 per cent.

The pH can be raised (acid saturation reduced) by applications of agricultural lime.

These applications to acid (low pH) soils can make certain micronutrients, such as molybdenum, more available to the plant. The availability of phosphorus is influenced by the pH. It is readily available at a pH (H2O) of six to 7.

Calcium and magnesium deficiencies can be alleviated with agricultural lime. High pH i soils are often associated with an excess of sodium salts which reduce nutrient uptake. Beans will tolerate a sodium saturation percentage of up to eight or 10 and an electrical conductivity of up to 1 mmho/cm.

PLANTING DATE

The most suitable planting date is determined by the following factors:

- Correct soil temperature
- Probability of heavy rain which may lead to soil crusting and restrict seedling emergence
- Possibility of high temperatures later in the season which may cause blossom drop
- Length of the growing season (high temperatures during flowering, rain during harvest and frost damage should be avoided)
- Crop rotation programmes (position of the bean crop in the total crop setup, i.e. planted after another crop, such as maize).

Planting dates are mainly restricted by the possible occurrence of frost (planting too late), and rain at harvesting, resulting in poor quality (planting too early). Planting dates range from November to mid-January in areas where frost occurs. In frost-free areas, March and April are the best months for planting beans.

SPACING, PLANT POPULA-TION AND PLANTING DEPTH

The between-row spacing for all types of beans under commercial production is 900 mm because dry beans are usually cultivated in rotation with maize. For early maturing cultivars, especially those with a determinate growth habit, a row spacing of 750 mm is recommended if mechanisation is practical.

Planting depth is determined by the soil texture and its moisture content. Generally the seeds are placed 2,5 to 5,0 cm below the soil surface.

IRRIGATION

Irrigation offers the potential for increasing yields and enabling production in otherwise unsuitable soils. Sprinkler irrigation is the most frequent means of irrigation for dry beans. The system used is determined by the size and shape of the lands, as well as available labour and capital.

In areas where water is unrestricted (not merely supplementary irrigation), the soil should be wet to field capacity to the depth of the 1 m root zone before planting. As soon as the soil is sufficiently dry, the seedbed should be prepared and planted and thereafter the field should not be irrigated until the seedlings have emerged.

Irrigation scheduling is essential for optimum yield per unit of water. The critical, moisture-sensitive growth stages are flowering and early pod set which occur at 40 to 50 per cent and 50 to 60 per cent of the growing season.

It is important that irrigation cycles be correctly scheduled, because excess moisture can create conditions conducive to root rot and Sclerotinia. Moisture stress can also aggravate some root rots such as Fusarium

oxysporum. Irrigation should cease when a quarter of the bean pods have turned yellow. For the correct irrigation scheduling, expert advice must be obtained.

HARVESTING

Dry beans have a moisture content of about 50 per cent at physiological maturity.

The beans, however, are only ready for harvesting when the moisture content drops to 16 per cent, the ideal being 15 per cent. Seeds may split during threshing when the moisture content is less than 12 per cent and such seeds are rejected by canners and seed companies. It is difficult to clean without further seed split or broken seed coats. Dry beans should be harvested when all the pods have turned yellow, but before they have become so dry that the pods begin to shatter. Dry beans can be harvested as follows:

- Hand pulling and threshing by driving a tractor over them on a threshing floor. Smaller volumes can be threshed by hand by beating with a stick covered in a hessian sack. The wind can be used to separate the seed from the chaff
- Partially mechanised systems, where the plants are pulled up by hand, placed in windrows and threshed with a harvester or stacked, where after they are threshed with a stationary threshing machine
- Fully automated system with mechanical pulling. The beans are raked into windrows and threshed by means of an automated combine.

Tips

- Pulling of beans should start when the moisture content of the pods is temporarily high (to prevent shattering), i.e. early in the morning before the dew has evaporated.
- Mechanised harvesting must be done when there is no danger of crop damage by rain.
- To prevent cracking and splitting beans should be threshed at slow cylinder speeds with a machine equipped with an axial flow threshing mechanism.

WEED CONTROL

Effective weed control is a prerequisite for high dry-bean yields. Dry beans, being low-growing plants, struggle to compete with or overshadow weeds. Early control is extremely important, because the root system of the plant develops at this stage and some weeds secrete chemical inhibitors which limit plant growth. At a later stage weeds hamper the harvesting and threshing processes, adversely affecting the quality of the crop.

DISEASES AND PESTS

Diseases and pests may have been partially responsible for the unstable production that has been experienced in the past. Incidence and severity vary between seasons because of environmental and management practices. Integrated disease and pest management, using all suitable control measures, is recommended.

Currently, dry beans (Red Speckled Sugar Beans are categorised under) are regarded as one of the most important field crops in South Africa on accounts of its high protein content as well as dietary benefits.

Within each species there are many seed types which differ in size, shape and colour. Within each type there are different cultivars and the seeds of these cultivars differ very little from one another. However, considerable differences may occur in adaptability, growth habit, disease resistance and many other characteristics.

CLIMATIC REQUIREMENTS

The dry bean is annual crop which thrives in a warm climate. It grows optimally at temperatures of 18 to 24 °C. The maximum temperature during flowering should not exceed 30 °C for P. vulgaris and 26 °C for P. coccineus. High temperatures during the flowering stage lead to abscission of flowers and a low pod set, resulting in yield loss. Day temperatures below 20 °C will delay maturity and cause empty mature pods to develop. Hence the current season; January to April make this the perfect time to produce Red Speckeled Sugar Beans or dry beans in general.

Cultivated under rain fed conditions the crop requires a minimum of 400 to 500 mm of rain during the growing season, but an annual total of 600 to 650 mm is considered ideal.

SOIL REQUIREMENTS

Beans have to be planted in warm soil after all danger of frost has passed. They grow well in soils with a depth of at least 90cm that have no deficiencies, and are well drained. Sandy loam, sandy clay loam or clay loam with a clay content of between 15 and 35 per cent is suitable. With sandy soils, problems of low fertil-

ity or nematode damage may occur. Beans prefer an optimum soil pH (H2O) of 5,8 to 6,5, and are very sensitive to acidic (pH (H2O) < 5,2) soils (acid saturation above 10 per cent). They will also not grow well in soils that are compacted, too alkaline or poorly drained.

EVERYTHING WE NEED TO KNOW ABOUT DRY BEAN PRODUCTION

Growing Season

Temperatures, especially during the night, determine the length of the growing season of a cultivar:

- short (85_94 days)
- medium (95_104 days)
- long (105_115 days).

SEED QUALITY

For successful production, it is important that high-quality (certified) seeds with a high germination percentage (80 per cent or higher) be used. This production cost factor is slight when compared to probable yield losses due to disease or poor stand. Low-quality seed can cause a poor and an uneven stand, resulting in uneven maturity, harvesting problems and yield losses. Using disease-free seed will reduce the incidence of seed-borne diseases such as bean common mosaic virus (BCMV), bacterial diseases (common blight, halo blight and bacterial brown spot) and the fungal disease, anthracnose.

Other benefits of disease-free seed

- labelled to indicate germination percentage
- guaranteed true to type and ensures homogeneity
- guaranteed free of weed seeds and foreign matter.

SOIL PREPARATION

Seedbed preparation for the planting of dry beans follows the same pattern as that for any row crop planted in the spring. The seedbed must be deep, level and firm because this ensures better surface contact between the seed and the soil, increasing the absorption of moisture. A level seedbed also facilitates planting to a uniform depth.

FERTILISATION

It is recommended that beans be planted on soils which have been previously well fertilised. General fertility is more advantageous than direct fertilisation, because beans are sensitive to high concentrations of mineral salts.

SOIL ACIDITY (pH)

The optimum soil pH levels for dry beans are:

- pH (H2O): 5,8_6,5
- opH (KCl): 4,8_5,5

The percentage of acid saturation has to be lower than 10 per cent for ans The solthe cultivation of dry be uble aluminium content has to be less than 25 to 30 per cent.

The pH can be raised (acid saturation reduced) by applications of agricultural lime.

These applications to acid (low pH) soils can make certain micronutrients, such as molybdenum, more available to the plant. The availability of phosphorus is influenced by the pH. It is readily available at a pH (H2O) of six to 7.

Calcium and magnesium deficiencies can be alleviated with agricultural lime. High pH I sous are often associated with an excess of sodium salts which reduce nutrient uptake.

Beans will tolerate a sodium saturation percentage of up to eight or 10 and an electrical conductivity of up to 1 mmho/cm.

PLANTING DATE

The most suitable planting date is determined by the following factors:

- Correct soil temperature
- Probability of heavy rain which may lead to soil crusting and restrict seedling emergence
- Possibility of high temperatures later in the season which may cause blossom drop
- Length of the growing season (high temperatures during flowering, rain during harvest and frost damage should be avoided)
- Crop rotation programmes (position of the bean crop in the total crop setup, i.e. planted after another crop, such as maize).

Planting dates are mainly restricted by the possible occurrence of frost (planting too late), and rain at harvesting, resulting in poor quality (planting too early). Planting dates range from November to mid-January in areas where frost occurs. In frostfree areas, March and April are the best months for planting beans.

SPACING, PLANT POPULA-TION AND PLANTING

The between-row spacing for all types of beans under commercial production is 900 mm because dry beans are usually cultivated in rotation with maize. For early maturing cultivars, especially those with a determinate growth habit, a row spacing of 750 mm is recommended if mechanisation is practical.

Planting depth is determined by the soil texture and its moisture content. Generally the seeds are placed 2,5 to 5,0 cm below the soil surface.

IRRIGATION

Irrigation offers the potential for increasing yields and enabling production in otherwise unsuitable soils. Sprinkler irrigation is the most frequent means of irrigation for dry beans. The system used is determined by the size and shape of the lands, as well as available labour and

In areas where water is unrestricted (not merely supplementary irrigation), the soil should be wet to field capacity to the depth of the 1 m root zone before planting. As soon as the soil is sufficiently dry, the seedbed should be prepared and planted and thereafter the field should not be irrigated until the seedlings have emerged.

Irrigation scheduling is essential for optimum yield per unit of water. The critical, moisture-sensitive growth stages are flowering and early pod set which occur at 40 to 50 per cent and 50 to 60 per cent of the growing season.

It is important that irrigation cycles be correctly scheduled, because excess moisture can create conditions conducive to root rot and Sclerotinia. Moisture stress can also aggravate some root rots such as Fusarium oxysporum. Irrigation should cease when a quarter of the bean pods have turned yellow. For the correct irrigation scheduling, expert advice must be obtained.

HARVESTING

Dry beans have a moisture content of about 50 per cent at physiological maturity.

The beans, however, are only ready for harvesting when the moisture content drops to 16 per cent, the ideal being 15 per cent. Seeds may split during threshing when the moisture content is less than 12 per cent and such seeds are rejected by canners and seed companies. It is difficult to clean without further seed split or broken seed coats. 

few weeks ago South African DJ Phat Joe, who works for East Coast Radio in KwaZulu Natal, commented that he kept making the same mistake on air because he was feeling "a bit down syndromish." Listeners were offended and complained to his employers, who consequently took him off air.

Next Tuesday is World Down Syndrome Day, observed on 21 March every year. This is a global awareness day which has been officially observed by the United Nations since 2012. This year's commemoration will be the fifth, and it looks like there is still a lot of awareness to be raised if people like Phat Joe, who people look up to and expect to know better, are still passing such irresponsible

Down syndrome is a set of physical and mental

traits caused by a gene problem that happens before birth. Normally, a person has 46 chromosomes. But most people with down syndrome have 47 chromosomes. In rare cases, other chromosome problems cause down syndrome. Having extra or abnormal chromosomes changes the way the brain and body develop. Although there are no local statistics at hand, down syndrome is regarded as the

most common chromosomal condition in human beings. Sources say about 6 000 babies with down syndrome are born in the United States each year. Children who have down syndrome tend to have certain features, such as a flat face, a short neck, low muscle tone, small stature, an upward slant to the eyes, and a single deep crease across the center of the palm - although each person with down syndrome is a unique individual and may possess these characteristics to different degrees, or not at all. Because these features may be present in babies without down syndrome, a chromosomal analysis called a karyotype is done to confirm the diagnosis. To obtain a karyotype, doctors draw a blood sample to examine the baby's cells. They photograph the chromosomes and then group them by size, number, and shape. By examining the karyotype, doctors can diagnose down syndrome. People with down syndrome also have some degree of intellectual disability.

This varies from person to person, and in most cases it is mild to moderate. down syndrome is a lifelong condition. But with care and support, children who have down syndrome can grow up to have healthy, happy, productive lives. Because of their distinctive physical features, their disability is usually almost immediately picked out unlike that of people with no visible features. This makes unfortunately exposes them to unfair discrimination, yet individuals with down syndrome are becoming increasingly integrated into society and community organisations, such as school, health care systems, work forces, and social and recreational activities.

Experts don't know the exact cause, but some things increase the chance that you'll have a baby with down syndrome. Your risk of having a baby with down syndrome is higher if you are older when you get pregnant. Many doctors believe that the risk increases for women aged 35 and older. Other risk factors are if you have a brother or sister who has down syndrome or if you had another baby with the condition.

If you've had a baby with down syndrome and are planning another pregnancy, you may want to talk to your doctor about genetic counselling. Your doctor may suggest that you have tests if you are already pregnant to find out if your baby has down syndrome. You may decide to have screening tests, such as an ultrasound or a blood test during your first or second trimester. These can help show if the developing baby is at risk for down syndrome. These tests, however, sometimes give false-positive or false-negative results. You can also opt to have a diagnostic test, such as amniocentesis. This can show if a baby has down syndrome. You may want to have these tests if you have abnormal results from a screening test or if you are worried about down syndrome.

Starting soon after birth, a baby with down syndrome will be tested for health problems. Many children with down syndrome are born with heart, intestine, ear, thyroid, or breathing problems. These health conditions often lead to other problems, such as respiratory infections or hearing loss.

Most of these problems, however, can be treated. Regular doctor visits can help the child stay in good health. Most children with down syndrome need speech therapy and physiotherapy. Teens and adults with down syndrome may need occupational therapy to learn job skills and learn how to live on their own. Earlier this month we discussed what occupational therapy and speech thera-

py entailed, and will make an effort to run something on physiotherapy soon. Counselling may help with social skills and emotional issues.

Because children with down syndrome sometimes have low muscle tone, they may need help at home to strengthen their muscles through directed play. As the child gets older, you can work with a physiotherapist and doctor to design an exercise programme to help your child maintain and increase muscle strength and physical skills.

In other countries, individuals with down syndrome have the opportunity to participate in a variety of postsecondary education programmes, such as academic programmes or courses at colleges or universities, vocational or training programs, such as apprenticeships and trade schools, or innovative programmes that combine these two types of education. Successful transitioning will not only depend on a good understanding of the individual's personal strengths and interests, but also on knowledge of what options and services are available in the community. And herein lies our problem in Swaziland. There aren't many choices for people with down syndrome in terms of schools, let alone career opportunities. Earlier this year we published an article about a Cape Town coffee shop, Downies & Brownies, which trains young adults with fown syndrome for retail and hospitality industries. It is an initiative that would certainly change many lives if it came to

I stood for a moment, to soak everything she said in. I then realised, that everything she said was true.


I also got to really understand that these recent act by the Executive arm of government brings back the old debate on the legislative arm of government's role under the Tinkhundla system of governance.

COUTINHO'S FORM H BEEN 'UP AND DOW

ONDON - Liverpool Manager Jurgen Klopp has no concerns about the form of Philippe Coutinho despite the Brazilian struggling to recapture his best since returning from an ankle injury.

The 24-year-old was one of the standout performers during the first four months of the campaign, scoring six times in his first 12 appearances and creating numerous other chances.

However, he missed seven weeks with an ankle injury sustained at the end of November, and since returning he has not rediscovered the same level.

His only goal in the dozen matches he has played since coming back was a consolation effort in the shock 3-1 defeat at Leicester.

He was substituted after an hour following an anonymous performance in last weekend's win over Burnley, but Klopp is prepared to be patient with his playmaker.

"That's the life of an outstandingly good football player like Phil," he said.

The influence of him on the game is really big. If he is not at 100 per cent you miss something, that's how it is.

"But two weeks ago, we played Arsenal and he did really well. Yes, Burnley again was not the best game, but he misses in this moment – which is pretty normal after a long injury - this kind of consistency.

"But the training week so far was perfect, he presented himself really well; it was fluent, confident and looked really well.

There are always steps in this direction. Sometimes it works. It's about, in this moment, consistency but he is in a really good way."

Klopp will hope for a big performance

from Coutinho against top-four rivals Manchester City at the Etihad Stadium today, especially with fitness doubts hanging over his compatriot Roberto Firmino and striker Divock Origi. With Daniel

Sturridge still not recovered from a hip injury which has kept him out since early February and fellow striker Danny Ings ruled out for the season with a serious knee problem, Liverpool's forward line is looking a little bit light.

Captain Jordan Henderson is not expected to return from a foot problem until the Merseyside derby after the international break, but on the positive front defender Dejan Lovren is fully fit after a 75-minute run out for the Under-23s on Monday.

Klopp does not believe fatigue is catching up with his players heading into the final 10 matches of the campaign.

"It's an intense season and things like this can happen. All the injuries we had were different, different players had a few more during the season," he said.

"Dejan Lovren had, for four weeks, a knee issue - nothing was fatigue. It's kind of (because) the body is a very

complex thing and sometimes a

little thing has a big influence. "We took a little time to find the cause, a lot of specialists were looking for it, then he was fit again and he got a knee in his back when we trained set-pieces. That happens too. "There are different reasons for it, for all of us, it's a long season and especially players who play for their national teams. 'No breaks, it's always: 'Go, go, go'. That makes it more likely that you pick up a few injuries."

'Facing Guardiola motivates me'

ONDON - Manchester United star Zlatan Ibrahimovic admits that he is extra motivated and gets adrenaline when facing former coach Pep Guardiola.

The duo were together at Barcelona for a season in 2009-10, but their relationship was notoriously fractious and the striker made the move to AC Milan after only one season at Camp Nou.

Ibrahimovic and Guardiola find themselves in the Premier League, the striker at United and the manager at Manchester rivals City.

The 35-year-old Ibrahimovic said taking on Guardiola's teams gave him more inspiration, although

he insisted it was nothing personal.

"When I play against his team, it's something that motivates me, it gives me adrenaline," he told Fox Sports Italia.

"It's not personal what I have. It's part of the game."

Ibrahimovic and Guardiola won the Spanish title in their season at Barca, with the Swede scoring 16 league goals.

He Swede explained that his relationship with the former Bayern Munich coach changed quickly.

"First he called me every day to have me and from one day to the next I didn't play anymore,' Ibrahimovic said.

Redknapp, 70, "is interested in returning to management with Middlesbrough should Steve Agnew's spell in charge prove unsuccessful", report the Daily

The former Spurs boss has not worked in the Premier League since leaving QPR in 2015 but he is apparently keen on succeeding Aitor Karanka, who was axed this week. Redknapp's assistant at Tottenham, Joe Jordan has been named Boro's assistant manager and he will offer advice to Steve Agnew who is in caretaker charge.

Boro owner Steve Gibson wants Agnew to take the reins until the end of the season and if he can manage a positive result against Manchester United tomorrow then he may well find himself in pole position for the permanent

Speaking in The Times today Gibson suggested Agnew is a serious contender for the post.

"I've known Steve a long time," said Gibson. "He's a very good coach and a very good number

"There's more to him than people know and a bit more steel. Steve could be a surprise number one.

"That may disappoint those people who want glamour and somebody to come in ready-made, a sexy name, but that's now what we need at this point.'

Redknapp however is believed to be keen to get back into the game having recently been in charge of Jordan and having a spell as Derby's football advisor during Darren Wassall's spell as interim

Memphis had only been at the Red Devils 12 months longer, but he felt it was the right time to bring his stay to an end and is pleased with the start he has made at Lyon.



"I haven't really run a fast time early in the season, so for me to a run 9.7 would be very good and I think that would be sufficient enough to say that's a very special time," added the man who won the 100m and 200m at the past three Olympics.

Coach Glen Mills has little doubt Bolt will be ready to give his home fans a siz-

zling farewell.

"Based on the standard he (Bolt) sets himself I'm sure he'll be in good shape to give the people a performance," Mills told Reuters. Bolt will end his career at the world championships in London in August.

He will share the spotlight at the Kingston meet, at least partially, with a decorated group, including two-time Olympic 800m champion Rudisha of Kenya.

Briton Farah, double Olympic gold medallist in the 5 000m and 10 000m,

will also be in action, along with American dual Olympic triple jump champion Christian Taylor. Also scheduled to compete will be South African Van Niekerk, who electrified the Rio Olympics with a world record of 43.03 in the 400m.

Bolt hinted that his 200m world record of 19.19 could one day be under threat from van Niekerk, whose best mark is

Federer to face Sock after ailing Kyrgios withdraws

NDIAN WELLS - Roger Federer reached the 10th Indian Wells Masters semi-final of his career by walkover on Friday as Australian Nick Kyrgios withdrew from their highly anticipated quarter-final with food poisoning.

Federer, a four-time champion in the California desert, will take on 17th-seeded American Jack Sock, who toppled fourth-seeded Kei Nishikori of Japan 6-3, 2-6, 6-2. "Unfortunately I am unable to play today due to sickness," Kyrgios said on Twitter. "At this stage we think it's food poisoning, and I'm praying it's nothing more."

Kyrgios had been due to face Federer after knocking out Novak Djokovic in the last 16 on Wednesday.

The Australian's illness is a cruel twist of fate for the talented 21-yearold, who has shown signs of finally starting to deliver on his promise in recent weeks after a young career marked by controversy.

His stylish win over Djokovic was the second time in as many weeks he had beaten the former world number one after also defeating the Serb in Acapulco.

In his statement on Friday, the world number 16 said he had taken the decision to pull out in California

with a heavy heart.

"After a restless night of being sick, I have nothing left and to play a great champion like Roger I need to be at my best to have a chance," Kyrgios said. "I don't take this decision lightly, these are the matches we train for, but I'm in no fit state to take to the court," he added.

"I'm sorry to the fans... but I have to put my health first and I hope you understand."

Federer, meanwhile, tweeted his support to the Australian youngster. "Hope you feel better @NickKyrgios," said the Swiss ace, who took the court briefly on Friday to speak to disappointed fans. "I was actually really looking forward to the match," said Federer, who had looked sharp in a 6-2, 6-3 dismantling of Rafael Nadal in the fourth round — a reprise of his thrilling five-set victory over his old foe in the Australian Open final.

Federer's 18th Grand Slam title in January came after a frustrating 2016 campaign marred by injury. "I think the six months of last year was really difficult," Federer said. "I played one tournament where I felt normal. All the other tournaments either I was sick, hurt or injured." AFP

Kuznetsova, Vesnina set up all-Russian Indian Wells final

NDIAN WELLS - Svetlana Kuznetsova toppled world number three Karolina Pliskova 7-6 (7/5), 7-6 (7/2) on Friday, to book an all-Russian Indian Wells final against Elena Vesnina.

Vesnina powered past France's Kristina Mladenovic 6-3, 6-4, continuing a sparkling campaign that has seen her shock German's soon-to-be world number one Angelique Kerber in the fourth round and seventime Grand Slam champion Venus Williams in the quarter-finals.

more chance at 6-5, and she grabbed it with a forehand passing shot.



Hoffman finished one stroke ahead of Argentina's Emiliano Grillo - who had two eagles, two birdies and two bogeys in a round of 68 - and two in front of Britain's Matthew Fitzpatrick, who had shared the 18-hole lead with

Northern Ireland's McIlroy, preparing for his bid at a career Grand Slam in three weeks at the Masters, fired a 71 Friday to stand 11 adrift on 145.

McIlroy, a four-time major champion, opened on the back nine with back-to-back bogeys, sending his first tee shot way left and his second into a fairway bunker.

The world number three birdied the par-5 12th, sank a 30-foot eagle putt at the par-5 16th, then sent his tee shot at the par-3 16th into the water on the way to a double bogey.

McIlroy, 27, completed the rollercoaster opening nine with a nine-foot birdie putt at 18 before closing with eight pars and a birdie at the par-5 fourth.

World number two Jason Day of Australia was in a pack on 141 shooting 71 Friday, a nine-foot eagle putt at 16 his highlight.

POGBA INJURY GIVES JOSE MOURINHO FRESH HEADACHE

ANCHESTER - Paul Pogba's absence has given Jose Mourinho another headache as Manchester United look to revive their Champions League qualification hopes at managerless Middlesbrough today.

United midfielder Pogba will miss the Premier League fixture, plus France's forthcoming matches against Luxembourg and Spain, with a hamstring problem sustained during Thursday's 1-0 Europa League victory over Rostov.

Mourinho is hopeful Pogba, who has had an inconsistent season following his world record move from Juventus, will be ready after the next international

But the United manager will have to rejig his midfield as he attempts to boost his team's challenge for a place in next season's Champions League.

In truth, their best hope of qualifying for that competition may be to win the Europa League, given that they go into the weekend in sixth in the table, six points behind fourth placed Liverpool.

United must face Middlesbrough not only without Pogba, but also minus top scorer Zlatan Ibrahimovic and midfielder Ander Herrera, both suspended, and they may also be missing defender Daley Blind, who suffered a head injury against Rostov.

Thursday's win set up a two-legged Europa League quarter-final tie against Anderlecht next month, but also added

to the fixture congestion that has left Mourinho deeply unhappy.

The Portuguese coach was not pleased that their FA Cup quarter-final defeat at Chelsea, originally scheduled for last weekend, was moved to Monday so it could be televised.

He has also criticised the Premier League for ordering the match at Middlesbrough to kick-off at 1200 GMT, again to suit the demands of television, arguing that a later kick-off today would have given his players a crucial extra few hours to rest.

"We have lots of enemies. It's difficult to play Monday with 10 men, it's difficult to play on Thursday, it's difficult to play 12 o'clock on Sunday," he said.

"I don't think it's

a funny situation. When I watch marathons and people go to their limit, I don't think it is funny, and I don't think it's funny some of my players in six weeks play 11 match-

"Play on Monday with 10 men, enjoying five hours on the M6 coming back to Manchester.

"We are living all these things and let's see if Sunday we get a point. That would be great result.

United captain Wayne Rooney, left out of the England squad for the forthcoming matches against Germany and Lithuania, has declared himself fit after a recent knee injury, and may be recalled.

Meanwhile, Steve Agnew insists he can fill the void left by the sacking of Middlesbrough boss Aitor Karanka.

The club's assistant manager has stepped in as caretaker after the Spaniard's stormy three-and-a-half year reign was brought to an end with the Teessiders secondbottom of the Premier League and in danger of an immediate return to the Championship. Goal

Fernandinho hopes City can bounce back against Liverpool

ANCHESTER - Midfielder Fernandinho has urged Manchester City to cast aside their painful Champions League exit at the hands of Monaco and make a swift return to winning ways in today's Premier League clash against Liverpool at the Etihad Stadium.

"We have two competitions to play -- the league is not finished yet and we have the semifinal of the FA Cup so we are looking forward to that," the 31vear-old Brazilian added.

Arsenal star a victim of of his own reputation

ONDON - Arsenal Manager Arsene Wenger believes Granit Xhaka has become an easy target for referees and fears his tough-tackling reputation now precedes him.

The 24-year-old Switzerland international arrived at the Emirates Stadium last summer as Wenger shelled out in excess of £30million to prise Xhaka away from Borussia Monchengladbach.

Despite such a fee, Xhaka found himself in and out of the Arsenal side at the beginning of the season and had only started four games before October.

The former Basle youngster came with a reputation for collecting red cards and was given his marching orders by referee Jon Moss in the 3-2 win over Swansea later that month.

Xhaka established himself in Wenger's side over the Christmas period before another sending-off against Burnley on January 22 saw him become the player in Europe's top five leagues with the most red cards since the start of last season

- and he has racked up nine in three

Although there have been no further dismissals since, Wenger admitted he is concerned about Xhaka being a marked man after seeing him cautioned in each of his last five games. "I believe he is now in a position where on the first foul he gets a yellow card. For example on Saturday (against Lincoln) - first foul, soft yellow card," the Arsenal boss said.

"So he is a victim a little bit of his reputation. You see tackles of some players who are much worse than what he did who don't even get a yellow card and he got a straight red and because he had a history of that in Germany, I think he is a bit of a victim of that.

"Overall he is quite in a positive way, he masters himself much better. He was maybe a little bit before looking too much to impress but overall he has to stay on this ground because it is tackling that can get him sent off. When he defends well, staying on his feet he is a fair player." Goal

Pochettino expects Spurs to thrive without Kane

ONDON - Mauricio Pochettino believes Tottenham are better dequipped to cope without star striker Harry Kane than they were earlier this season, as they approach the defining point in their campaign.

Kane is sidelined for several weeks with ankle ligament damage sustained against Millwall in the FA Cup quarter-finals last

But Kane, who has 24 goals in all competitions this season, is confident he will return from injury ahead of schedule, according to Pochettino, and play some part in the run-in.

"We need to assess him day-by-day. He's very positive, he's always joking about being fit after the international break or in three or four weeks," Pochettino said.

"He's very positive and that is good, but at the same time we need to be careful with his injury.

ARCELONA - Ivan Rakitic has revealed that Luka Modric tried to talk him into a move to Real Madrid before he took the decision to join Barcelona.

Having impressed with his creativity and consistency at Sevilla, the Croatia midfielder was a much sought-after talent in the summer of 2014.

The scramble for his signature was ultimately won by Barca, with a big-money agreement taking him to Camp Nou.

His career path could have been markedly different, though, had he listened to an international team-mate.

Modric had already been in Madrid for two years by the time Rakitic was presented with a big future call, and the former Tottenham playmaker was hoping to be joined by a familiar face.

Rakitic, though, has seen his decision to head for Catalonia justified by two La Liga titles, two Copa del Reys and a Champions League triumph, and the 29-year-old admits there is no way he could cross the divide now.

He told Cadena Ser when pressed on whether Modric had asked him to join Madrid: "Before, when I was with Sevilla, he did. It would be more difficult now!

"He's a person I respect a lot. Of course, he's capable of playing for Barca because for me he is one of the top three players in the world in his position.

"I enjoy playing with him a lot and, with complete respect to everyone else, we see a different Madrid when he's there and when he's not." GOAL

'Man City want to be a winning machine'

ANCHESTER - Yaya Toure insists Manchester City can still become a "winning machine" like Manchester United and Barcelona, despite their dramatic exit from this season's Champions League.

Leaderless on and off the pitch, it is no wonder fans are confused. Aeroplanes had been hired to trail banners, with one demanding 'No contract, Wenger Out',

another stating 'In Arsene we Trust.' It looked to be a familiar Arsenal tale of woe when Craig Dawson headed home Nacer Chadli's delightful in-swinging corner on 13 minutes. Arsenal had already been exposed when Allan Nyom had charged down the right wing, leaving Granit Xhaka and Shkodran Mustafi in his wake. ONDON - Gary Cahill's 87thminute effort sent Chelsea 13 points clear at the Premier League summit with a 2-1 victory over Stoke City in a tempestuous encounter at the bet365 Stadium.

Chelsea looked set to miss the chance to extend their advantage over the chasing pack, but Cahill atoned for giving away a penalty by pouncing after a tactical switch from Antonio Conte to pile more pressure on Tottenham, Manchester City and Liverpool - all of whom play today.

With the teams level after 70 minutes, Conte - who was without star forward Eden Hazard due to a reported muscle injury - changed his much-vaunted 3-4-3 formation to a 4-2-3-1 and Chelsea responded by upping the pressure to force a late winner.

The Blues led after 13 minutes when Willian caught Lee Grant out with a near-post free-kick for his first top-flight goal since scoring a double in the reverse of this fixture in December.

After having a goal ruled out for

Lukaku ends 31-year wait as Everton destroy 10-man Hull

ONDON - Lukaku ended the week how he had started it – in the headlines – with two goals in the 4-0 win over 10-man Hull.

On Tuesday the Belgium international told the club he would not be signing the new £140 000-a-week contract to make him the highest-paid player in their history as he questioned whether they had the ability to reach the Champions League.

His double yesterday, with both goals in added time, may not have been the decisive factor in putting the Toffees level on points with fifth-placed Arsenal, but it at least showed his professionalism cannot be called into question.

The platform had been laid by a first goal for 20year-old Dominic Calvert-Lewin, in his sixth Premier League appearance, and, after Tom Huddlestone's red card, another from Enner Valencia. Lukaku then took centre stage to register his 20th and 21st league goals of the season, the first time an Everton player has reached that tally since Gary Lineker in 1985-1986 – 31 years

The win puts Everton tantalisingly close to the top four, five points behind Liverpool with the Merseyside derby at Anfield up next after the international break.

Lukaku's comments angered Koeman, but the Dutchman knew only too well dropping the Premier League's top-scorer would amount to cutting off his nose to spite his face. *Teamtalk*

Leicester continue good form with dramatic win at West Ham

ONDON - Leicester City made it three league wins on the spin as they beat West Ham United 3-2 at the London Stadium.

The visitors struck twice inside the first ten minutes to stun the Hammers. Firstly they opened the scoring on five minutes through Riyad Mahrez, and just two minutes later it was 2-0 thanks to Robert Huth.

Manuel Lanzini got the home side back into the game with a quick reply, but Jamie Vardy netted before the break to put the Foxes firmly back in control.

Andre Ayew reduced the deficit to a goal once again in the 63rd minute but it was not enough, with Andy Carroll missing a huge chance to level late on.

The Foxes showed no signs of a European hangover following their epic win over Sevilla, and although they may have a quarter-final meeting with Atletico Madrid on their minds Shakespeare knows they still need to get their domestic affairs in order.

Fortunately they faced a West Ham side playing as though they just want their 'historic' first season at their new stadium to end as quickly as possible.


