1. Determine your theme. Make sure it is reasonably limited.
2. Each day when specified on the syllabus, submit a short summary—two to four sentences—of 3 bibliographical entries. You may have read something on-line, or a chapter in a book, etc.
3. Make sure the bibliographical entry uses standard citation practices.
4. Keep a copy of the articles or chapter you read.

The final presentation will have two parts: oral and written.

Oral Presentation: On Session 12, each student will prepare (in Spanish) a 7 min. oral presentation with 3-4 minutes for questions.

The Criteria for Evaluation for Oral Presentation

Structure

Logical organization pattern

Powerful Introduction

Clear key message

Use of transitions

Powerful conclusion

Use of evidence for support

Visual Aids: Only use Powerpoint to enhance your oral presentation or to emphasize a few facts. **Do not include your narration in a Powerpoint presentation.**

Written Project:

The written project is due two days after the last class. I hope that most of you will have it the last day of class—but two days afterwards is absolutely the last day it can be submitted. It will consist of a two to three page, double-spaced, 1” margin summary of what you learned about your topic with reference to Post-Franco Spain. It should have a point of view. It should consist of:

- a) a title page
- b) your two-three page summary that should be constructed within the framework of post-Franco Spain.
- c) An annotated bibliography: bibliographies are organized alphabetically according to author. You just need to cut and past the entries I have already corrected into this list.
- d) If possible, a copy of the materials on which your annotations were based. Of course you cannot include a book, but if it is an article, simply include it.

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
